I feel that we came a long way in the Â"Women are not to teach menÂ" thread, but a great deal of related Biblical truth h ad not yet been touched; or maybe it got obscured in the smoke.

Of course we ALL know PaulÂ's famous words: Â"I forbid women to teach men.Â" from 1 Timothy. But there are many references we do not know nearly as well. ex: A"A...teach older women to A.... TEACH what is good.A" Titus 2:3 Sinc e we havenÂ't progressed to that reality, there has been a tendency towards knee-jerk reactions: a gender war, a long s tring of defenses by either gender, or a false sense of relief: Â"Phew, we women donÂ't need to teach. So I wonÂ't both er assertively learning the things of God.Â" However, these attitudes are lethal to the church and to our families.

I believe that PaulA's exhortation will never be understood as long as we think like the world. For example: how does the world view authority? - more like dominance and forced servitude. The world Â"fixesÂ" threatening people groups by squ elching them Â- including their autonomy and their freedoms. You dominate them in order to keep them in their Â"place " (ie to keep YOUSELF on top) That is the way of international politics. So it should not be surprising that such a philos ophy trickles down to the smaller units of relationship Â- like gender relationships, parent-child relationships, and of cou rse, playground dynamics.

Here are two more problems caused by viewing scripture from a worldly frame of mind, or by failing to consider the WH OLE counsel of the Word:

The ones in authority tell their subordinates what they are NOT allowed to do, but they fail to TEACH them what they A RE to do. Correction is achieved by pushing down from above. Really, this just makes things worse. The subdued ones then feel a need to employ all their energies in order to rise above their Â"oppressorsÂ". You end up with a lot of reveng e and conflict and power struggles. This I believe explains such movements as WomenÂ's Lib, Free Choice, Equal Righ ts. etc etc.

There also seems to be a faulty understanding of the relationship between teaching and hierarchy Â- as if teaching puts you a notch above someone. That is also the worldly way. And it is deadly too. I know of some churches where women were not to speak or teach in the presence of men. I never saw such dysfunctional organizations. Abuse was going on, unchecked. Men were hiding their sins of adultery and wife-abuse. Women had no voice, and if they spoke out they wer e merely told they were Â"unforgivingÂ" and Â"unsubmissiveÂ". I know a few marriages that fell apart because of Biblica I misuse of PaulÂ's teachings on gender roles. You see, without considering the WHOLE counsel of God, we go off the rails. When we apply any biblical law to an unregenerate or worldly mindset we have a formula for disaster. We will NE VER get it to work right, even if we follow it to the letter of the law.

If we donÂ't understand the Biblical perspective of authority and teaching, we certainly canÂ't understand much of Paul Â's teachings re gender responsibilities or any Biblical teaching, for that matter. It all starts with our orientation to the aut hority of God, his Son, and his Spirit.

Before proceeding, IÂ'd like to include PaulÂ's words to Titus:

Â"But avoid foolish controversies andÂ... arguments, and quarrels ABOUT THE LAW, because these are unprofitable a nd useless. Â"Warn a divisive person once, and then warn him a second time. After that...:-? Â" Titus 3:9

First things first, what does God teach about our submission to HIM?

HereÂ's my attempt:

As I read through the "T" epistles (Thes/Tim/Titus), certain truths leap from the page: qualities that deeply influence our effectiveness as servants of Christ, regardless of gender. In fact, without these qualities all of our words, our teachings and our preachings, have no weight. Before considering the issue of teaching in the church, these factors must first be taken into account:

- 1. Character
- 2. Works
- 3. Relationships
- 4. Reputation

Character:

Â"You became imitators of us 1 thes. 1:6

you became a model to the believersÂ...Â" 1 Thes.1:7

"We Â... notÂ... impure motivesÂ... trick, greedÂ... please men.. flatteryÂ...1 Thes.1:3,4"Â...

Works:

Your work produced by faith, your labor prompted by love, your endurance inspired by hope in our Lord Jesus Christ.Â" Â"Â...we worked night and day, laboring and toiling so that we would not be a burden to any of you.Â" 2 Thes. 3:8

Relationships:

Â"We loved you so much that we were delighted to share with your not only the Gospel of God, but our lives as well, because you had become so dear to us.Â" 1 Thes.1:8

Â"Â.... Gentle, like a mother caring for her little childrenÂ" (the value of a maternal quality)

Â"intense longing Â..... to see you.Â" 1 thes.2:17

Â"Â... encourage one another, and build each other up Â... Â" 1 Thes. 5:11

Reputation:

Â"Your faith in God has become known everywhere .Â" 1 Thes.1:8

Â"Make it your ambition to lead a quiet life, to mind your own business and to work with your handsÂ... so that your dail y life may win the respect of othersÂ...Â"

Â....and much more! It looks like a fair bulk of Apostolic teaching focuses on the conduct of our lives – qualities that ar e expected of all believers. There are also specific directions for each gender regarding our conduct in the context of rel ationship.

Hi, Beenblake,

A long time ago I promised you that I would post a thread called "GodÂ's Job, Our Job" - to help us avoid waiting on God to do what we are supposed to be doing. This present thread topic, for me anyway, seems to tie in: learning what i s OUR JOB. Indeed, women are required to teach, so it is OUR JOB to find out what God commands. If we fail, the g ospel is hindered. Ex:

though by this time you aught to be teachers—you need someone to teach you the elementary truths Â... But solid food is for the mature who by constant use have trained themselves to distinguish good from evilÂ" Heb. 5:12

And who are they who canÂ't teach yet and havenÂ't trained themselves to Â"distinguish good from evilÂ"? Some of the em are mentioned in the epistle to Timothy: Â"Weak-willed womenÂ":

There will be terrible times in the last days. People will be lovers of themselves, Â.... having a form of godliness but den ying its power. Â... They are the kind who worm their way into homes and gain control over weak-willed women, who a re loaded down with sins and are swayed by all kinds of evil desires, always learning but never able to acknowledge the truth. 2 Tim. 3:1-7 (so they are never able to teach!)

I realize that some women are offended by what Paul has to say about their gender. However, letÂ's admit, many wome n these days really are prone to follow after preacher/celebrities, televangelists (who have wormed into their homes via t he TV). I wonder how many of those fellows get rich mainly by being able to convince weak-willed women to send in the ir donations (playing on their guilt).

Even from my own observation, I know that there are women who are ever- seeking truth, but never really learning. The y attend every special church or ladies function that is around. But they never think about their responsibility to teach the important matters of the Gospel in the context of relationships. They canÂ't, because, really, they fail to accept the Gospel. Paul was quite insightful.

Consider this compliment that Paul gave to TimothyÂ's mother and grandmother:

"from infancy you have known the scriptures." 2 Tim. 3:15

What could this mean? Maybe there is something to be said in the quote, Â"The one who rocks the cradle rules the worl d.Â"

Did you notice that I embolded the word "homes" earlier? In Bible times religious life was centered in the home, but n ow our institutions along with their paid professionals have become the center. So of course, the Biblical understanding and value of teaching in the home has been usurped.

Luther may not have spoken the best about women, but at least he said this: Â"The woman in the home can do more with the children with one finger than the husband with both fists.Â" Durant, The Story of Civilization Vol.6, The Reform

The short epistle of Titus is packed with insight on subject of teaching Â- right from the onset: Â"... knowledge of the truth that leads to godliness Â...Â" 1:1 The final words of the letter reinforce this aim: Â"Our people must learn to devot e themselves to doing what is good in order that they may provide for daily necessities and not live unproductive lives. 3:14

People whose teaching does not achieve godly living "…reject the truth… have corrupted minds and consciences, s timulate "foolish controversies" and arguments.. and ruin households ..". These we must learn to recognize, and the church leaders must "refute" 1:9, "rebuke sharply" 1:13 "avoid" 3:9 "warn" 3:10 and "have nothing to do with" 3:10. These ones "must be silenced".1:11

Of course divisive people donÂ't necessarily appear divisive. It may be a long time before the fruit of their faulty doctrine s becomes apparent, maybe long after they are gone: The unity of the Body becomes damaged. Legalism is a good ex ample. That is the issue addressed in Titus 1:10 regarding those who Â"ruin whole householdsÂ" and Â"must be sile ncedÂ". Our present day church is littered with the fruit of legalism: self-centeredness, competitiveness, arguments over detail of law, calloused hearts, pride, emotional illness, shame, addictions, bitterness. It all leads to fractured relationshi ps, broken marriages, church splits etc. I believe that these problems are rooted, not only in the sin nature, but also in the cradle where teaching begins.

Godliness is the outcome of Â"a faith and knowledge resting on the hope of eternal lifeÂ...Â" 1:2

According to the epistle to Titus, how does good teaching in the Body foster unity and relational harmony? How does it help us achieve GodÂ's purposes for the church?

Some interesting points in this thread. Especially interesting personally because I was a woman minister! The Lord bro ught me out of it, but not because of this particular question.

Maybe a few thoughts, (some aspects have been already touched on):

1. The central issue is what is in our hearts, not what or when or where, or if women are to teach. Are we seeking to usu rp authority, or simply to fulfil what the Lord is leading us to do? Or do we have some other "hidden agenda" such as "ne eding to be needed" (been there, done that - but the Lord took away the T shirt and I'm slowly learning to do without it!)

Similar questions could equally be asked of a man who aspires to be a teacher.

- 2. Teaching the Bible (even a woman before men)doesn't necessarily go together with authority in the church. I saw my ministry rather as that of a mother who has authority to feed the little ones on the "milk of the Word". There was no desir e for any other kind of authority, let alone be some kind of "boss" figure, only to exercise a gift from God for the benefit of others (at the time I was unaware of the "ulterior motive" in my heart).
- 3. Although I believe it is usually more fitting and scriptural for leadership to be male, there are exceptions in Scripture. Someone pointed out that of all the Judges in the book of Judges only one was a woman. To show that it shouldn't be the norm. But that one shows that it is possible for a woman to lead even a nation in Deborah's case.

An interesting example is in the account of Martha and Mary. Mary sat at Jesus' feet and listened to His word.

Was Martha shocked as well as over-busy? Sitting at the Master's feet was putting oneself in the position of a disciple. It was the custom for disciples of a particular rabbi to then go out and preach to the people, with the authority of their master, what they had learned.

Horrors! A WOMAN teaching! In that society?!!!

Yet Jesus refused to condemn or correct her.

I suspect that Mary didn't stop to think that she was upsetting all the social conventions - she just wanted to get as close to Jesus as possible and listen to what He had to say.

So her heart was right, whatever her actions...
