2Jn 1:11 For he that biddeth him Godspeed is partaker of his evil deeds.

Jesus tells us that we should salute more than our brethern only. John tells us not to bid someone Godspeed that doesn't bring "this doctrine." I realize that salute and Godspeed are translated from two different words. I was wondering if anyone could give any insight on what exactually is the difference.

A primary verb; to be full of Â"cheerÂ", that is, calmly happy or well off; impersonal especially as a salutation (on meetin g or parting), be well: - farewell, be glad, **God speed**, greeting, hail, joy (-fully), rejoice.

Is 'aspazomai' a mere 'hello', while 'chairō' is 'I wish the best for you'?
