The more pressure the more my unchristlikness is revealed, we are not more of a Christian then we are in the hardest, most difficult situation, when the suffering is so much we can not bare it any long er, beyond that moment. How we react there in that spot, that is how real we are. When everything is nice and flowery a nd joyful and so on. Then it is easy to be Christian, it is easy to praise God. Even a "wordly" unconverted person can be a "christian" then. I dont meen they are but i hope you understand my point.

But in that dark place, when heaven seem closed, when temptations and sufferings abound in multitudes. How real are we? Tests of our faith and obedience.

Can we praise God in the midst of suffering?

I believe there is power in the breaking, the death, we see over and over again,

Joh 12:24 Verily, verily, I say unto you, Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone: but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit.

Luk 22:44 And being **in an agony** he prayed **more** earnestly: and his sweat was as it were great drops of blood falling d own to the ground.

2Co 4:17-18 For our **light affliction**, which is but for a moment, worketh for us a far more exceeding and **eternal weigh t of glory**; While we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen: for the things which are seen are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal.
