Oh if we could only hear this preached.

A book by Richard Owen Roberts, I think it is called Repentance, really opened my eyes. Over the years, IÂ've given two away, even my own Â"loanedÂ" copy that had a list of the Bible verses making clear what God hates. The meaning of repentance is not understood. The work of God, in our hearts, in repentance, is not understood.

If God does not hate the sinner, then why, when the Blood cleanses his sin, does he need to die the death that Paul speaks of? Why is there such a deep change after that death? And many other true things you point out. You donÂ't have to be a theologian to see that we donÂ't get it today.

Even as a new believer, the first time I heard "God hates the sin but loves the sinner", and every single time there after, I heard a lie in it. But often the ones who said it were leaders. And sometimes they said it after another believer was speaking the word of God in a way that I could see/hear there was little Divine Love or Grace (Truth in Love and Truth and Grace). The sentence was said in order to correct another brotherÂ's sin in the Spirit but it did not use the Word of God. Whatsmore, I knew myself as a sinner that found the Love of God. I could only keep silent but I could never say th at sentence. The only thing I knew, and could not well articulate was that John 3:16 says "the world," what He created and that had been terribly changed including man.

I think the "well-meaning" ones who say, "God does not hate the sinner," do not want to offend the sinner. (You can write your own paragraph here.)

I think they are deluded into thinking that by saying, "God hates the sin but loves the sinner" the hearer will be drawn to God rather than eased about their sin. I know that believers are eased about their sin when they hear that.

They distort and weaken Grace. (You can write your own paragraph here.)

If you cannot say the Truth, at least donÂ't say the lie.

I thank God, that when He showed me a specific sin, and cleansed me, and I called a brother to tell him, this brother sai d "Oooooh!" with great understanding of that horror. This brother grieved with me over my sin. And when I shared the forgiveness and my obedience, and all that God did, this one could rejoice with me. I look for Christians like this to sha re my growth in Christ with.

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Contrast that response with the usual response of even leaders in the church, or a Bible study, when they hear convictio n and of sin forgiven: "Oh thatÂ's OK, we have all done that." This is a similar example of "well-meaning, well-intenti oned" distortion of Truth. I think it is crippling. I can see that they want to give comfort. But who wants to trade even a shred of the cleansing of God for the comfort of man. This is crippling. Weep with those who weep.

What a blessing when the Holy Spirit convicts us of sin. The way is open. We should point to it. We should go in. What d oes God think when we shut up that way? What did Jesus say about the relationship between loving God and forgivenes s? Luke 7:47 Wherefore I say unto thee, Her sins, which are many, are forgiven; for she loved much: but to whom little is forgiven, loveth little. No wonder our first love grows cold and is lost in these days. Little love, little love, little love!

OK, I can see this post has touched me. It deeply touches our need for God to come in Revival to set things straig ht. Prayer for the conference last night touched on these things.

Instead of the single word "sin" or "sinner", there should be a long, long paragraph that no one could finish reading with out becoming extremely sick. Maybe that is what happened in Jonathan EdwardÂ's meetings.
