I suppose that the question should be in regard to just what evidence that these "theories" are based upon. While the Mayans were pretty intelligent when it came to math (compared with contemporaries in the New World at the time), their religions were quite pagan (to say the least).

During a portion of our honeymoon a couple of years ago, my wife and I toured the lost Mayan city of (<http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Tulum>) Tulum. Our tour guide was Mayan in ethnicity and a professor from a local university. He explained that the "2012" merely represented the end of a calendar cycle. This professor explained that the Mayans have never placed much importance on the date, other than that it is the end of another calendar cycle. He pointed out that nothing "major" happened at the end of any of the previous Mayan calendar cycles. The only difference is that this is the last cycle that has been found. He explained that this could be due to the mathematicians growing tired (thinking that they had counted far enough), or that they might actually have continued counting with another cycle but that the evidence was lost. Either way, he explained that there is no evidence that the Mayans gave any significance to the year (other than it is just the end of another cycle).

I believe that the Scriptures warn us against giving heed to such thing. I Timothy 4:6-7 says, "If thou put the brethren in remembrance of these things, thou shalt be a good minister of Jesus Christ, nourished up in the words of faith and of good doctrine, whereunto thou hast attained. **But refuse profane and old wives' fables, and exercise thyself rather unto godliness.**" In this same passage, the NIV calls them "godless myths" and the NASB calls them "worldly fables."

Besides, even in all of the events that will Scripturally comprise the end, we are encouraged to not worry but to keep our faith in Christ Jesus. We should trust in Christ...while we watch...and remain ready...at all times.
