The best thing we can do is live out our lives in Christlikeness as a model for our children. And love them unconditionally . I am not saying to be permissive but to let them know that they are loved and wanted no matter what they do.
"If we are to be Christian parents, our focus must be on Jesus Christ, rather than on family dynamics or on parental pr ocedures. We are to "fix our eyes on Jesus, who is the author and finisher of our faith" (Heb. 12:2), which includes our fa ithful parenting. When Jesus Christ is allowed to function in the family, and His life is lived out through the parent, then w e will see the family function as God designed it to function; not by formula, but by faith which is the receptivity of His activity.
As Christian parents we must recognize that "we are not adequate in ourselves to consider anything as coming from our selves, but our adequacy is from God" (II Cor. 3:5). Jesus said, "Apart from Me, you can do nothing" (John 15:5), and that certainly applies to successful parenting. When we acknowledge our inability and weakness, then the strength and power of Christ becomes operative, and the grace of God is sufficient (II Cor. 12:9) in our parenting. Many a parent has come to that exasperating point where they cry out, "God, unless you do something in this family, it is going to be a total fia sco and failure!" God loves to hear that cry, for then He can begin to function as He desires.
Only God can do what really needs doing in the child's life anyway. Only God can convert and regenerate a child spiritu ally. Only God can save and sanctify a child, making them righteous and holy. Only God can make a Christian disciple o ut of your child, and develop His character in the child's personality.

Campbell Morgan used to draw attention to the fact that this verse is not a universal pattern but a pointer to individual training of each child. Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it. (Pro 22:6 KJV

But look at that a little care fully. On another note, every child is so different. I have 3 that are so different and my husband and I handle their discipline, et c.. very differently. One is very sensative but more of a follower, one is independant but sold out to the Lord, and another is a bundle of fire wrapped in love (but the fire gets the best of her many times:).

It takes time, and more time to pray and figure out what each one needs. My one who is sensative and more of a followe r- he has never needed a spanking in his life. (just some slaps on the hand when he was very small). You just look at hi m the wrong way and he goes crying to his room and locks himself in his room. But he does tend to do what the other ki ds do. So I have to talk to him over and over about how the things of this world are really meaningless. Does he care? P robably not right now, he's only 8. But I also make sure from the time he (and the others were small) that they know what 'fear of the Lord' is. When they sin or follow the crowd or whatever. I always remind them that it makes the Lord very sad - it grieves Him. If they learn this early, they'll never forget it.

It is not our children's fault that there is temptation. We can't get angry with them about the fact that there is that temptati on to be 'someone' in the eyes of others. They want to be someone to somebody. Let's make sure they are someone to us. Someone important and cherished. We can discipline and get upset with their wrong behaviors- but not the fact that t hey want to be someone. Each one has such a different temperament and personality.

I think that phariseeism and hypocrisy from the parents is the quickest faith smotherer. As Jeff, mentioned, kids see thro ugh adults in a second. What we say we believe, we better be doing- because as soon as our children see that we don't 'love our neighbor' like we claim to- they reason to themselves "why should I do such and such?" If we are critical of othe rs, they know we are critical of them and are not being like Jesus. It must seem like we are picking and choosing what we, as adults obey. If we as parents, are fully surrendered and obey the Lord in everything- then hopefully the children learn this as a lifestyle.
