"And he took and sent messes unto them from before him: but Benjamin's mess was FIVE TIMES so much as any of the others. And they drank, and were merry with him." (Gen 43:34)

FIVE WOUNDS

Jesus had 5 WOUNDS (two hands, two feet and side).

FIVE HUSBANDS

Jesus in John 4 spoke to the Samaritan woman about her 5 HUSBANDS and showed her grace (He is Grace!). Moses brought the Law (5 books of the Bible are called the Pentateuch) but Jesus Christ brought grace and truth (4 Gospels and book of Acts known as NT Pentateuch).

(Many believed and said this to the Samaritan woman) "And said unto the woman, Now we believe, not because of thy saying: for we have heard him ourselves, and know that this is indeed the Christ, the Saviour of the world." (John 4:42)

FIVE PORCHES

In John chapter 5, the story of the pool of Bethesda with 5 PORCHES.

John 5:2 Now there is at Jerusalem by the sheep market a pool, which is called in the Hebrew tongue Bethesda, having FIVE PORCHES.

John 5:4 For an angel went down at a certain season into the pool, and troubled the water: whosoever then first after the troubling of the water stepped in was made whole of whatsoever disease he had.

GENESIS 5 and LUKE 5 and WALKING

This is the only time recorded in the Gospels that Jesus caused a man to "rise up and walk". In Genesis 5, Enoch walked with God and was not.

"Whether it is easier, to say, Thy sins be forgiven thee; or to say, Rise up and walk?" (Luke 5:23)

The NUMBER 5 and LIFE

On the 5th day in Genesis, God brought forth life.

In John 5:24 - The Lord talks about what men need to do to have everlasting life.

"Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that heareth my word, and believeth on him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life. Verily, verily, I say unto you, The hour is coming, and now is, when the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God: and they that hear shall live. For as the Father hath life in himself; so hath he given to the Son to have life in himself; And hath given him authority to execute judgment also, because he is the Son of man. Marvel not at this: for the hour is coming, in the which all that are in the graves shall hear his voice, And shall come forth; they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evil, unto the resurrection of damnation." (John 5:24-29)

There is a relationship with life and grace, the number 5, 5th day, 5th commandment (long life) and Romans 5 (the grace of life) and John 5 (everlasting life). There is much more, too.

"Therefore being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ: By whom also we have access by faith into this grace wherein we stand, and rejoice in hope of the glory of God. (Rom 5:1-2)

"Honour thy father and thy mother: that thy days may be long upon the land which the LORD thy God giveth thee." (Exo 20:12)

NOAH and RUTH and GRACE

Also, check this out, Noah's name was mentioned many times in the Bible, but the 5th time his name was mentioned it was associated with grace. "But Noah found grace in the eyes of the LORD." (Gen 6:8)

Look at the 5th time that Ruth's name was mentioned.

Ruth_2:2 And Ruth the Moabitess said unto Naomi, Let me now go to the field, and glean ears of corn after him in whose sight I shall find GRACE. And she said unto her, Go, my daughter.

THE FIFTH HEBREW LETTER

The letter Hei is the fifth letter in the Hebrew alphabet, as well as a number of other Semitic languages' alphabets. Through the ancient Phoenician language, the letter Hei actually became the modern letter 'E' in the English and Latin alphabets. The original meaning of the letter Hei is shrouded in mystery as it has been interpreted as everything from 'thread' to 'fence' to 'window' in ancient Semitic languages. <http://www.hebrewtoday.com/content/hebrew-alphabet-letter-hei-%D7%94>

"And when he had said this, HE BREATHED ON THEM, and saith unto them, RECEIVE YE THE HOLY GHOST:" (John 20:22)

THE CROSS, FIVE BOOKS and GRACE

There are 5 books in the New Testament that begin with the letter "T" (cross). There is grace at the cross.

FIVE SPARROWS

The human body is probably not worth much in terms of dollars for all the minerals in our body. But what is our worth to God? Our life is none other than Jesus Christ, Himself.

"Are not FIVE sparrows sold for two farthings, and not one of them is forgotten before God? But even the very hairs of your head are all numbered. Fear not therefore: YE ARE OF MORE VALUE THAN MANY SPARROWS. (Luke 12:6-7)

The point is that God cares for little birds but no matter how many you want to count, God cares more for you.

And of course, how could you not love this verse?

Psalms 84:3

Even the sparrow has found a home, and the swallow a nest for herself, where she may have her young a place near your altar, O LORD Almighty, my King and my God.

I was just noticing in the 5th book of the Bible (Deuteronomy) that God extended grace and life to the Edomites and Moabites. He told Israel not to distress them or meddle with them because He is sticking to his promise and the land He gave to Lot's and Esau's descendants so He tells Moses to leave them and their land alone. (Another interesting "coincidence")

"And the LORD spake unto me, saying, Ye have compassed this mountain long enough: turn you northward. And command thou the people, saying, Ye are to pass through the coast of your brethren the children of Esau, which dwell in Seir; and they shall be afraid of you: take ye good heed unto yourselves therefore: Meddle not with them; for I will not give you of their land, no, not so much as a foot breadth; because I have given mount Seir unto Esau for a possession." (Deut 2:2-6)

"And the LORD said unto me, Distress not the Moabites, neither contend with them in battle: for I will not give thee of the land for a possession; because I have given Ar unto the children of Lot for a possession." (Deut 2:9)

"And when thou comest nigh over against the children of Ammon, distress them not, nor meddle with them: for I will not

give thee of the land of the children of Ammon any possession; because I have given it unto the children of Lot for a possession." (Deut 2:19)

Surprised to see this? No one merits God's grace, right? But, you can find God extending His grace and mercy to different people groups in the OT.

The Edomites were the descendants of Esau, and the Moabites and Ammonites were descendants of Lot. These people groups were not Canaanites. They were people who had a blood connection to the covenant head, Abraham. But of course, we know that the only blood connection that counts today is the blood of Jesus which is applied to us through faith in Christ. The same faith as the "faith of Abraham".

"But as many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on his name: WHICH WERE BORN, NOT OF BLOOD, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God." (John 1:12-13)

Could it be that (righteous) Lot valued the things of God (angels) to whom he played host even above his virgin daughters and tho they (angels) were powerful enough in themselves to handle the mob, Lot offers his "best" to preserve them? Hence his righteousness being displayed in his belief that God could protect/spare them, which He did, as well as the parallel between Ezekiel 9:4 and 2 Peter 2:7-8. This is where the scriptures seem to teach on why Lot was considered righteous before God.

I wonder if we (like Abraham and Lot) value the things of the Lord above our own so much so to offer them up as they did-

It also stuck out that tho these men were very powerful Angels, Lot nonetheless knowingly put himself and his whole household at risk by contending with them to enter his house that he may play host to them and comfort them out of what God had given him. It seems as tho he (Lot) wasn't completely aware these men were angels until after the incident when they revealed that the Lord had sent them to destroy the place.

Another thing that struck me was this act (on God's part) speaks of His integrity as He put eyes on the ground as it were to be witnesses as to why judgement would be passed, again being patient and merciful not wanting any to perish but all to come to repentance. Having said that when I was questioned/pressed on this by some unbelievers, my response was that the judgment itself was an act of God's mercy as they had gotten so far gone that it would be unmerciful to not only allow it to continue but to allow children to be born into and raised according to these practices being themselves corrupted by the wickedness of them and infecting the surrounding areas like a cancer.
