If there is stagnation spiritually, never allow it to go on, but get into God's presence and find out the reason for it. Possibly you will find it is because you have been interfering in the life of another; proposing things you had no right to propose; advising when you had no right to advise.

When you do have to give advice to another, God will advise through you with the direct understanding of His Spirit; you r part is to be so rightly related to God that His discernment comes through you all the time for the blessing of another so ul.

Most of us live on the borders of consciousness - consciously serving, consciously devoted to God. All this is immature, it is not the real life yet.

The mature stage is the life of a child which is never conscious; we become so abandoned to God that the consciousne ss of being used never enters in. When we are consciously being used as broken bread and poured-out wine, there is a nother stage to be reached, where all consciousness of ourselves and of what God is doing through us is eliminated.
