What troubles me is that Christianity today is so focused on what is in it for me (Believe me IÂ'm including myself when I say this). Rather than just Jesus, we focus on what can we get (e.g. money, healings, etc.). Not all of these things are b ad in and of themselves but if they're more important than Jesus himself, than there is a significant problem. When we f ocus solely on these things are we not like the priest who was looking to see what he could get from God, versus giving himself to God, not because of what we could get but because of who He is?

I'm not trying to convict anyone of this. That's the Holy SpiritÂ's job, not mine. I'm simply convicted by the Holy Spirit of my own desire to be blessed, comforted, etc. versus giving myself fully to Him, without any expectation of return. To be primary focused with being comfortable and blessed and all the rest while those around me are lost and dying and going to an eternal hell is something I can no longer do.
