Now, I understand that some people hastily can make a decision for Christ resulting from coercion on the part of over-zealous evangelists wherein the eventual result turns out to be a false conversion as the proclamation of faith was forced via the flesh and not the Spirit.

However there are no doubt cases wherein there seems to be some form of pre-conversion experiences which eventually lead to the point of a full committal.
