Brother, if you can somehow deny flesh and get up to study the Word and pray early in the morning, you will make great strides in your walk, and make them very quickly. The best way to get up in the morning is to let God wake up you. Before you go to bed tonight, ask the the Holy Spirit to awaken you early in the morning for this very purpose. He will wake you up...but you must then *get up* or you will quickly fall back asleep.

The mornings are the best time to seek God for strength to overcome the wicked day. Persistence is the secret, brother. Meet God in the secret place, early. Confess your weaknesses, your utter worthlessness and how much you need Him. If you can somehow wait for Him, and finally break through, He will touch your inner man according to the riches of His glory and strengthen you with might. The Word will suddenly come alive on the page, and your prayer will take wings upward to the throne of God.

Tremendous topic Sean. I love your transparency.

When I do not persist, I also feel it throughout the day. Yesterday the Christian was abiding in Christ, feeding on the bread of life as Paul West says, and so today he feels he can "take a break" and try to live off of yesterday's taste. But in his own strength, the deicietfulness of a spoiled nature can surprise him with unexpected ambitions, easily hurt feelings, fear, political gossip. It's awful...and not a break at all for the Christian but actually quite draining.

But you know all of that ...I am just sharing my own failures with you so that you do not feel all alone and defeated in this area.

I mentioned a similar theme in the recent Healing of the Soul thread...I liken putting on Christ as part of getting dressed for the day. Afterall, being properly clothed is important! Those who are looking to be strong enough that they no longer need to rise each day desperate for a touch from the Lord are under basic misgivings about the Gospel. (I believe) Better we limp feebly and painfully to Christ everyday, then run away like those healed lepers satisfied with their own strength. Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they?"

Quote:

-----Persistence is the secret, brother.

There is no shortcut to this one. Yet I do have one general tip that I have found helps: stay close to the Lord throughout the day. Prayer is not wearisome, except when we make it so by neglect. This business of entering and exiting is what makes prayer wearisome. Keep your heart well oiled in the Spirit during the day and it will not creak when you open it in the morning.

We might say that a prayer life grows tenderly but steadily like so many flowers. Your morning prayer and devotions is like a well kept garden you tend to. You break the soil, you plant the seed, and water the buds, and with God's blessing, their colors break forth! Yet we cannot stay in our private gardens all day. Abiding in the lord throughout the rest of the day is like walking among the wild flowers. This is my Father's world, and to my listening ears all nature sings. How wonderful, and timely, I are exchanges with the lord while working or driving--- I'm sure many of us can remember some were so natural, growing in unexpected and wild places more beautiful then any man-made garden. Behold the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin,... I need to keep in mind, that I ready myself for prayer best by staying in prayer. "Abide in me, and I in you."

Here is another very practical tip that might help: being that I am an impulsive creative night owl with about 15 ideas in my head all the time, mental discipline for waiting on the Lord in the morning is one of the hardest battles I have had to fight. (alot...) So I stopped beating myself up about it, got myself a cheap mp3 player, downloaded some great bible studies (such as the Zac Poonen through the bible series)...or even some audio scriptures themselves, get up early and jump on the treadmill. After about 20-30 minutes my mind and body are revived, and through listenin to the Word, my heart and spirit is focused intently on spiritual concerns. So once I shower, I'm wide awake, and more ready for prayer! Sometimes I need to leave the house, because it becomes noisy even at 5:00 am with the kids waking for school... I'll take my mp3 player to the gym and then get to the office well enough before everyone where it's still quiet and draw close. I think it sweetens the air there...

I really admire those men who can readily roll out of bed, alert. I've always been somewhat of a night owl...but if I get physical first I can be up and at 'em by 4:30 or 5:00.

Hi Sean,

It's been a process of sorts as most things are in the kingdom of God. I used to attend a Korean church most early mornings for prayer but heard back in early 2004 that I needed to pray at home. I had no idea of how to begin and actually the first time I fell asleep for a couple of hours.

Ask God to do whatever He needs to do in your life to bring you a place where you can seek Him early in the morning and ask Jesus to order it and He will do it! When I entered into covenant with the Lord about this and was serious about it, He stepped in so I would encourage you to do the same. It's not been a pretty process for me but I can testify that the Lord has been faithful. He's been faithful when I've rolled over, when I've missed it and has lovingly disciplined me when I simply chose to stay in bed because it was warm and I was too tired or too whatever...

When I started getting up to pray, I put my cellphone under my pillow and this worked for a while. Later I heard in prayer not to set my alarm any more. I simply ignored this and said that couldn't be God and begin to miss my early morning time with the Lord when I realized that I failed to obey Him. Once I repented and obeyed, the Holy Spirit has been faithful to awaken me for several years without an alarm clock. If He orders my steps, I don't need to use an alarm clock.

To get up in the morning, requires that I go to bed when the Lord requires as well and I've struggled at times because I didn't want to go to bed early, sometimes quite early. Allow the Holy Spirit to order your steps and he'll tell you what to do.

Here's answers to the specific questions you raised.

Starting your day with the Jesus is the only way to go. You need that daily manna that only Jesus can give you as you seek His face in prayer and in reading the scriptures. There's no substitute for that.

Reading the scriptures will increase your desire to read them and as you spend more time in prayer, you will desire more

e time in prayer. He began to bring more conviction about my ways and began to open the scriptures up to me as I submitted to this discipline. It's not a quid pro quo deal but He will meet you as you obey Him.

For a season, the Lord allowed me to return to bed so I would spend a couple of hours in prayer and the scriptures and then take a short nap before I had to go work. It was a wonderful season of time.

Those days are behind me and if I don't pray and read the scriptures when He directs it, there's no time to do it. The walk is progressive and Jesus has been extraordinarily kind to me but has forced me to become more disciplined.

Begin the Day with Prayer

I ought to pray before seeing any one. Often when I sleep long, or meet with others early, it is eleven or twelve o'clock before I begin secret prayer. This is a wretched system. It is unscriptural. Christ arose before day and went into a solitary place. David says: "Early will I seek thee"; "Thou shalt early hear my voice." Family prayer loses much of its power and sweetness, and I can do no good to those who come to seek from me. The conscience feels guilty, the soul unfed, the lamp not trimmed. Then when in secret prayer the soul is often out of tune, I feel it is far better to begin with God -- to see his face first, to get my soul near him before it is near another. -- Robert Murray McCheyne

THE men who have done the most for God in this world have been early on their knees. He who fritters away the early morning, its opportunity and freshness, in other pursuits than seeking God will make poor headway seeking him the rest of the day. If God is not first in our thoughts and efforts in the morning, he will be in the last place the remainder of the day.

Behind this early rising and early praying is the ardent desire which presses us into this pursuit after God. Morning listlessness is the index to a listless heart. The heart which is behindhand in seeking God in the morning has lost its relish for God. David's heart was ardent after God. He hungered and thirsted after God, and so he sought God early, before daylight. The bed and sleep could not chain his soul in its eagerness after God. Christ longed for communion with God; and so, rising a great while before day, he would go out into the mountain to pray. The disciples, when fully awake and ashamed

d of their indulgence, would know where to find him. We might go through the list of men who have mightily impressed the world for God, and we would find them early after God.

A desire for God which cannot break the chains of sleep is a weak thing and will do but little good for God after it has indulged itself fully. The desire for God that keeps so far behind the devil and the world at the beginning of the day will never catch up.

It is not simply the getting up that puts men to the front and makes them captain generals in God's hosts, but it is the ardent desire which stirs and breaks all self-indulgent chains. But the getting up gives vent, increase, and strength to the desire. If they had lain in bed and indulged themselves, the desire would have been quenched. The desire aroused them and put them on the stretch for God, and this heeding and acting on the call gave their faith its grasp on God and gave to their hearts the sweetest and fullest revelation of God, and this strength of faith and fullness of revelation made them saints by eminence, and the halo of their sainthood has come down to us, and we have entered on the enjoyment of their conquests. But we take our fill in enjoyment, and not in productions. We build their tombs and write their epitaphs, but are careful not to follow their examples.

We need a generation of preachers who seek God and seek him early, who give the freshness and dew of effort to God, and secure in return the freshness and fullness of his power that he may be as the dew to them, full of gladness and strength, through all the heat and labor of the day. Our laziness after God is our crying sin. The children of this world are far wiser than we. They are at it early and late. We do not seek God with ardor and diligence. No man gets God who does not follow hard after him, and no soul follows hard after God who is not after him in early morn.

Hi Sean. I have a word for you and I have decided to post it here, publicly, because I believe it is what the Lord has instructed me to do.

I awoke very early this morning and you immediately came to my mind. I wasn't praying for you, I was just thinking about you and this thread that you started a few days ago with a question to the saints here on SI.

As I lay there, God spoke to me. He told me to share with you publicly, here on this thread, something which I believe is a huge revelation in God's word that is overlooked quite often.

Proverbs 18:21 says, "Death and life are in the power of the tongue: and they that love it shall eat the fruit thereof."

But in a way I did try this; when I was in phoenix I woke up early and hiked with friends before I prayed; and I was no longer sleepy. I've made vows to God about my life, career goals, dress, and especially devotional time and broke them ALL. Its just lip service with me and I don't want to add to my condemnation.

You know, often in the forum here we do our best to give only the information and testimonies we believe has led to our successes, discarding anything that has led to failure. It's an unconscious filter we apply to our testimonies, but one that perhaps leaves out the information that would be most helpful.

The bottom line is that discipline, for me at least, is not an effortless habit but a battle of gaining ground, losing ground, and then surging forward again. If we are honest...we are ever balancing ratios in our lives. For instance, we might notice spiritual areas that need tending to and so we surge forward in prayer, bible study, and the like...but soon find our work duties need increased focus. So we turn our attention to learn more about project management, take on a second job, or spend extra time getting our heads around some new piece of software for a couple of weeks, all the while still mindful of holding ground on our spiritual fronts. Perhaps it's not too long afterwards we begin to notice that all of this intellectual and spiritual activity is leaving our bodies flabby and unenergetic so we begin a program of physical fitness. Perhaps with enough discipline and focus you manage to achieve results in all three of these areas, but to your dismay you realize your valient efforts have made you a totally self-absorbed person, working from morning to night on self-maintenance...leaving nothing for other people, including your own family.

Arrggg! Brother, I've learned to see God's grace reflected in the seasons. Not every day offers the same ratio of warm sunshine, and not everyday offers the same volume of refreshing rain. Indeed, if it weren't for the biting cold to come around every year, the old diseases and germs wouldn't be killed off and spring wouldn't be fresh but stagnant. Seasons take time to work through...they do not cycle every single day but over periods of time. Once you are in summer you may feel tempted to believe you will always be in summer, and to become quite intolerant of those who are in winter. Yet I believe the seasons reflect the Lord's patient renewal, just as all of creation reflects something about the Creator.

What I am saying is to not get caught up in daily regiment, which requires more then character, but also fortunate circumstance. Financial instability, extra duties, and sickness are only a few of the external factors that can bring winter upon you...do not imagine the Lord will leave you in these times! Daily regiment is not the greatest evidence of maturity, but growing in love perhaps is.

And if you feel compelled to seek God just to avoid condemnation, then prepare yourself for a long loveless road of failure and frustration. In my experience, Christians who feel they must be in summer all their lives are not under grace, but under the law...and under a heavy burdensome misconception.

Another analogy: to avoid mistakes and reduce inefficiencies, our small business is beginning a process documentation project, to help distribute the best processes and procedures. So, in my typical fashion, I began by trying to find the best examples of Operations Manuals to learn from. I asked a trusted friend "Have you ever come across an operations manual that was so complete and well written that it anticipated every possible mistake and helped the employees all work from the same perspective consistently?" He answered without hesitation, "Yes. It's called the bible and even it is full of grace." Point taken...business can be boiled down to processes buttoned together by people with vaying personalities and dispositions...success is not just the processes themselves. Relationships, whether business, or spiritual, human or divine, are still based on trust. Yet, we saints can sometimes emphasize spiritual principles and processes to the point where we have a hard time simply trusting the Lord.

I'm not discouraging your "Prayer Process Implementation Procedure"...I am only reminding you that Jesus promised he will never forsake you or leave you. Sure, if there is something in your character that needs work, he is working on your behalf...you can trust in him. And if you miss your morning devotionals and prayer because you were up all night studying or meeting a deadline, then feel free to look for time elsewhere to meet with the Lord.

I know some here may be wary of my advice...but I give such grace to my own spouse and children, because I know they still need my support even when their duties keep them from spending regular family time. I do not expect the relationship I have with any of them to be the same 10 years from now. At times we luxuriate in hours of fellowship, and at other t

imes we chat briefly to each other before heading out the door in the morning. Yet never once do they feel my condemnation...I know they are all working hard! How is it that the Lord would have less grace towards his children and bride than me?

And one day, after passing through the fire or through the flood of trials, you find a rich prayer life, don't become tempted to believe you have mastered yourself, and start writing new laws for other weaker saints to follow. Just be thankful that the Lord has brought you to a wealthy place and luxuriate in His fellowship.
