And so we are left with two grieving mothers who did nÂ't know about enemies, politics, treachery and murder. All they knew was that they had sons they loved with all their h earts.

The more I thought about the juxtaposition of these two broken hearts the more I was impressed with how finally futile sc hemes are. In the end, beginning and middle, life comes down to mothers and fathers and children--and love and faithful ness and hope. This is the common bond among us all: love and a Father who loves us beyond measure, even to the Cr oss. What a pity human nature intervened on GodÂ's perfect plan for our happiness!
