I have been going to a local church for about 2 years now; it's an Assembly of God church. I know practically everyone t here (it's a smaller church), and I have been involved in the Youth Ministry for over a year. Since the beginning of 2007, I 've had many troubling issues with the church that are driving me in different directions, and ultimately making me frustra ted. Since I am married, and have a baby on the way, I am trying to make the best decisions for my family. Because of t he issues I have with this church, I don't want me family to be put into confusion as well with the teachings and other vari ous things found at this church. To name a few things that bother me:

1. I don't agree with their doctrine of tongues.
2. Since our congregation is growing, spirit of pride has come up. The pastor has said quite a number of times "Can I pre ach or what?" or other similar things. The elders have also said "Isn't our church great?"
3. There is a huge lack of biblical teaching in that place. People get their teaching 100% from the Pastor, and have no sp irit of discernment.
4. In relation to #3 above, the church sometimes is treading grounds of "Word of Faith" teaching. The ideology that throu gh faith God will give me what I want.
5. The Pastor teaches large abstractions from a few verses. Such as the idea of joy based upon a verse in a Psalm, and then the rest of the sermon is generalities and stories.
6. The Worship team acts like their on concert. They frequently add members to their band, and sing songs that are ofte n found in concerts (like Hillsong United). The songs don't seem nearly as powerful as songs like "Amazing Grace." Whe n I write this, the band has 13 members on stage, and more for backup. Our congregation is only about 100 people. It fe els like most of the church is on stage!
7. In relation to #1 and tongues, this is hugely emphasized during worship, alter call, and prayer. I have brought question s to the Pastor before, but he acts as if I am ignorant and points me at Acts 2:4.

These things have been brewing in my spirit for a long time now. I feel like everyone at that Church doesn't know God's word, therefore doesn't know how to discern truth. This became especially obvious during a Sunday school class when t he topic of the "floating Axe head" came up in a lesson. Only the Pastor's wife and I knew anything about that story. We were trying to figure out which prophet that was, but everyone else (about 10 other people) were literally clueless. This is one example of many.

I simply do not know if it is time to leave this church, or if I am simply being judgmental and need to let it go. I do know o ne thing, that I need to discern teachings to find the truth, and by that standard this Church doesn't match up well someti mes; in key areas.

Seriously, there are many Assembly of God churches which seem to be headed in that direction. However, let me make it clear: This problem is not confined to just the Assemblies of God. There are many churches from multiple denominations which are caught up into the same "happy church" quagmire. It just seems that the Assemblies of God, with their unique local "constitutional" setup, provides an opportunity for straying from the simple principles set up when the church began.

Many of these "modern" AG churches are caught into the church growth, seeker and/or health/wealth prosperity movements.

They mistake church population and congregational involvement for success.

They mistake visible manifestations (supposed miracles, organized or spontaneous dancing, worship "concerts," manifestations of the gifts of the Spirit, involvement by the congregation, etc...) as SIGNS of a "healthy" church. Because of this, the pastors often fail to notice the inner decay of the congregation.

These pastors also mistake "submission to authority" (the old "You're under the umbrella of your pastor" rhetoric) for obedience to God. They force the congregation to adhere to their own sense of right and wrong, truth or lie. They fail to realize that the devil and "wolves" don't care about such "umbrellas."

They mistake "true spiritual liberty" as an excuse for the "anything goes" mentality of some of the congregation.

These type of churches replace sound Scriptural "teaching" that is meant to provoke with sound bites that are meant to unoffensively encourage the congregation.

The music is no longer measured by the depth of intimacy or sincerity, but by how well the congregation emotionally responds to the songs and music.

These modern churches are filled with programs, programs, programs. While there is nothing wrong with programs, most of them are designed to promote involvement rather than change lives (even though they claim that these are designed to "reach out").

Evangelism has changed from one-on-one interaction to mass, media-inspired events (such as dramas, plays, concerts, food giveaways, or visual spectacles). They trade promotion and advertising for inspired evangelism.

The pastors report that "multitudes" are saved, yet have a difficult time understanding why their churches don't grow by the same number.

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These churches dismiss the discrepancies by simply claiming that they "don't care which church these people eventually attend." Yet true "follow up" shows that most of these people don't go to church at all -- and that many of them simply don't even take their "decisions" seriously.

The congregation is encouraged to "claim" the "blessings" that God "has for us." Yet this is typically confined to measures of health/wealth. They equate spiritual happiness and success with the temporary pleasures of this life. How often do you hear the pastors of such congregations remind the congregation that everything will one day burn with fire? How often do they preach against greed or lusting after the things of this world?

MetaCipher, I would encourage you to speak privately with your pastor. If he is sincere, he will understand and perhaps share many of your own concerns. In fact, there are some pastors who feel "trapped" into these sort of church setups. They are approved for their position, and then fall into the cycle of "seeker church" leader. They fear the repercussions from changing the status quo. As a result, the church proudly breaks "tradition" and continues along the same ant paths as most modern, seeker churches. While the newcomers and church hoppers are happy, the sincere and more mature believers tend to leave.

You are in my prayers.

- Unlike Krispy, I'm persuaded that tongues IS indeed the initial evidence of the "baptism of the Holy Spirit" (which I believe is a completely separate experience from salvation). However, I don't enjoy the "forced" tongues mentality or how many modern AG churches are encouraged to publicly speak and pray in tongues (as if they can turn it on and off at will) during services. I'm pretty much convinced that the vast majority of such people really do not truly speak in tongues in the first place (*ducking as I look around for shooting darts).

If someone believes that speaking tongues is the initial evidence, I wouldn't consider that a separation issue, because a lot of people get their doctrine from their experience, and not from scripture. you just have to be careful if people's experiences won't stand up to scripture at all and become heretical. Leading us from Christ.

If you enjoy your fellowship and can ignore some issues, Just keep going and praying, but if you become confrontational about tenants of faith, you will just be asked to leave.

I say this because when we see some things going on that we don't agree with, we can, and I don't mean your are, but we can sometimes have a religious spirit or be overly prideful.

My problem with my first church was that I went to bible college and started seeing too much, and im a little over zealous and my pride killed me and my relationship with my pastor, I sure wish I would have prayed a lot longer, and tried to use a lot more grace when talking to him.

And never, ever talk to other church members about your doctrinal issues, you will be perceived as trying to cause division, or division..

If you have to discuss your issues, stick only to the leadership, and If you don't get peace then you will quietly leave... why quietly leave.

Thanks for your post. I find you have been given helpful advice here already. You are pretty much in the same situation we have been a while ago.

We just left our local charismatic church for similar reasons.

- 1) There is no preaching that convicts, people are only being encouraged and affirmed in their ways, no mention of sin and sinners, only "hurting" people.
- 2) Manipulated manifestations of the Spirit.

- 3) WoF teaching, Kingdom Dominion and other questionable doctrines.

I had a number of discussions with our elders about that. One of them really went out of his way to visit me a couple of times. I could not convince him but he was kind hearted and courteous while listening to my explanations. We even prayed together before we parted.

For a couple of months I thought I can help to get the church back on track. When I tried to start conversations about subjects of the faith, I hardly found anyone interested. Then I felt to follow the example of those Jews who left Babylon to build the temple in Jerusalem in Ezra 1.

We now started attending a Pentecostal church 10 miles away. We feel it was the right step.
