Covetousness ('the love of money') is the root of all evil: (1 Tim. 6:10)  
The Tenth Commandment extremely important. It is important because:  
1. It goes to the heart, the inner man. (1Sa 16:7) (Psa 5:9) (Luk 11:39)  
2. It is spiritual. (Rom. 7:14)  
3. It teaches us how the other commandments are meant to be interpreted; that is, the others are not just dealing with externals—they deal with thoughts as well as acts. (Heb 4:12)  
4. It has convicting power. It was the commandment that God used in Paul's conversion. (Rom. 7:7-9)  
5. It reveals that all sins come from within. (Mark 7:21-23)
