Christ mass is the calling down of god from heaven transforming the wafer into the literal body of the messiah at the communion table. This is a continual "unbloody" sacrifice for sin in contradiction to Heb.10:10, 12, 14

abomination - Greek: bdelugma - a detestation;

idolatry; a stinking unacceptable sacrifice; abhor; unholy

I Corinthians 2:14 - The natural man recieveth not the Spirit of God: for they are foolishness unto him:neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned.

natural - Greek: psuchikos - sensitive; animate;

sensual; non-spiritual The pagan festival of the Christmass is a tradition that is "highly esteemed" among the peoples of the world. If it were of God (spi ritual), the world would look upon it as foolish. The gangster, the thief, the

homosexual, the prostitute, the abortionist all hate the word of God when He said "Thou shalt not", yet they will party and involve themselves in the wic kedest immoral acts while embracing the traditions of the Christmass. Many who attend church regularly, while refusing to live righteously, keep it as the ir favorite festival and holiday. The business person who is unethical and immoral in business dealings, at

Christmas time, will disavow their marriage to have a sexual encounter at a "Christmas party" while getting drunk, all in the name of Jesus' birth. It's a t ime of compromise for many who call themselves "Christian", setting aside witnessing and calling men to repentance

"till January". Playboy magazine has their "Christmas issue", while liquor stores decorate with wreaths and "holiday cheer". Christians are commanded to separate from such ungodliness (II Cor. 6:14-17). Celebrants

stuff and glut themselves with material things and all kinds of delectable foods, while the world is destitute and starving, physically and spiritually.

Christmas is a time when true believers are expected to sit down at a family gathering passing out "free forgiveness" to unrepentant sinners as they curse and tell their off color stories. Forgiveness is never an initial act. It is always a response to repentance.

Paul said we are not to eat or communicate with

brothers living in rebellion against God. We are not to partake or walk with these unfruitful works of darkness as they walk disorderly and not in the ways of God (I Cor. 5:9, 11; Eph. 5:11; II Thess. 3:6,14).

(We will be persecuted for this kind of testimony).

The United States comprises approximately 4.6% of the world's population. This minute segment of the world is partying and lulling themselves into an easy religion with no striving or wrestling over sin at the Christmas season, while the world is dying in starvation, squalor, and disease without Christ. To celebrate Christ is to honour him. To honour him is to keep his sayings (John 14:23). If we are to honour

him, we will dispense with vain traditions. We will get Christ out of the mass. We will rid ourselves of the heathen festival of the mass (Christmass). We will throw out the pagan birthday of Hercules (December 25th). We will remember (celebrate) Jesus' birth everyday and never will we separate it from the resurrection. There is only one pure ritual. It is not

Christmas, Easter, or Valentines. James tells us,

"Pure religion (threskeia - ritual or ceremony) and undefiled (uncontaminated) it to visit the fatherless and widows "in their affliction" (the church under persecution) and keep yourselves unspotted (holy-pure-unmixed) from the world (James 1:27)."

Jesus said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the

least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me (Matt. 25:40)." This is the true ritual (religion) with which we are to celebrate Jesus daily. All the things that man esteems: positions, awards, money, titles, recognition, tradition, material things, and the seeking of self is an abomination to God. The only

thing that honours Christ is a seeking and concern for others (spiritual and physical) and never self (Phillipians 2:4,5; I Cor. 10:24). The "natural" (sensu al-sinful) man who loves and highly esteems the traditions of this world, always despises the atoning blood of Christ. They hold Jesus' words in contempt, refusing to live in daily repentance and submission to

the commandment of God. Man will not cease from sin until God moves on his heart to live holy (pure-unmixed) before him throughout the year.

The Christmas tree now so common among-us, was equally common in Pagan Rome and Pagan Egypt. In Egypt, that tree was the Palm Tree; in Rom e it was the "fir".

The mother of Adonis, the sun god and great

mediatorial divinity, was mystically said to have been changed into a tree, and when in that state to have brought forth a divine son. If the mother was t he tree, the son must have been recognized as "Man the Branch" (a corruption of Zechariah's prophecy concerning Christ, the branch of God - Zech. 6

:12)

This accounts for the putting of the yule-log into the fire Christmas Eve and the appearing of the Christmas tree the next morning. As Zero-Ashta, "the seed of woman," which name also signified "born of the fire" (the fire god), he has to enter the fire on "Mother night" (December 24th in the ancient world), that he

may be born the next day (December 25th) out of it, as the "Branch of God", or the Tree that brings all divine gifts to men. Thus, we see on Christmas morning the gifts under and around the tree as his gifts to his worshipers. December 25th was known far and wide throughout the pagan world as the exact birthday of Adonis the tree god (Allah) of Babylon. This Venus-Tree worship, along with her consort Baal (the sun), corrupted Israel, invoking the wrath of God for their idolatry. This goddess of the groves was

imported from Babylon (Iraq) into Israel upon the

marriage of Ahab, King of Northern Israel, to Jezebel, the daughter of Ethbaal, a priest of the Ashtoreth of Babylon (I Kings 16:31). God's judgement for such wickedness has been to purge Israel for 2600 years with sword, famine, and pestilence (Jer. 29:17-19).

Jesus was born of a virgin. He was God in the flesh. He died and shed his blood as an atonement for sin that all who believe in him will have eternal life

Hey there, HE\_Reigns and Miccah. The three of us seem to be talking a bit a lately.

Ironically enough, this winter season will be the first in which I do not go out of my way to celebrate the advent of Christ. I cannot deny that some of this change is for the sake of that word "Christ Mass", which is especially repugnant to me, given the deceit which hangs upon my catholic family. But neither is that the greatest motivator.

It is true, many of the Yule-tide traditions are retrofitted pagan rituals. (Although, depending who you ask, there is a large degree of variation about which false deity is related to what aspect of the day: You say Hercules, he says Mithra.) Never the less, it is shocking to see how many folkloric falsehoods we support throughout the event. We all agree that Jesus Christ was not born on December 25th. No wise men attended his birth, nor did the shepherds witness any star. There is also no indication that the angels sang choruses in the field.

Never mind the supposed omniscience and omniPRESENTS of Nicholas, patron saint of commercialism, who yearly sets himself up as God in the temples of God; namely to be worshiped in the little hearts of children as the supreme gift-giver. Although he wants kids to live by a system of law, he can be appeased on that night by six-billion glasses of milk and cookies, glutton that he is.

Meanwhile, the monetary engine of holiday spending drives the nation to lavish millions of needless trinkets, gadgets, and vanity-pieces upon people who are already rich, compared to the millions who will this year die of starvation and neglect without having heard the hallowed message of Christ's first coming to the world. I don't fault anyo ne for those honorable motives. Nevertheless, I have made a personal determination to separate from the corruptions th at are inherent to the seasonal gift system, the folklore, and that old tempter, mistletoe. I will not be relenting, however, fr om egg-nog, which I regard as a "winter drink" with no direct ties to Christmas, itself.

Jokes aside, the most greivious issue of all is that Christmas offers Christ without repentance or cost for most of those w ho celebrate the day. I would rather astonish my relatives with a card in June, explaining my sincere desire for them to jo in in thanksgiving for the first coming of Christ. A gift delivered in August, with the words, "Christ taught me to love you all year," may in the end be much more meaningful.
