Rick Warren Tells Pastor To Get Rid Of Â"TroublemakersÂ"

In the November 14 issue of his Ministry Toolbox, Rick Warren told pastors to get rid of troublemakers. He begins with th e erroneous statement that the Bible "talks more about the unity of the church than it does about either heaven or hell."

The truth is, the Bible speaks more about heaven and hell than about unity and it speaks far more about the importance of sound doctrine and practice and separation from error than it does about unity. Warren makes no distinction between trouble that comes because of heresy and self-will and trouble that comes because of the truth.

God's people are nowhere instructed to blindly follow pastors or to accept a "unity" based on anything other than the trut h. They have an obligation before God to "prove all things" (1 Thess. 5:21) and to "earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered to the saints" (Jude 3).

In a fashion that is one of his fearful trademarks, Warren lifts Scripture out of context to prove his point. First he uses 2 T imothy 2:23-26, which only deals with how to handle "foolish and unlearned questions" asked by those who are in the sn are of the devil. It has nothing to do with legitimate biblical questions asked by sincere Christians who care about God's Word.

Next he uses 2 Timothy 2:14, which is a warning about striving about "words to no profit, but to the subverting of the hea rers." Again, this is a warning about false teaching, and it has nothing whatsoever to do with sincere biblical challenges.

He also uses Titus 2:15, which is an exhortation to preachers to be bold in preaching the truth but which says absolutely nothing about kicking people out of the church because they love the truth.

He also uses Titus 3:1, which is an exhortation to be subject to the authorities that God has put in this world, but by com paring Scripture with Scripture we know that it does not entail blind submission (i.e., Acts 5:29).

Finally Warren uses Titus 3:10-11, which contains instruction about how to deal with heretics or false teachers who are c ausing division on the basis of their heresies. It has nothing whatsoever to do with those in the church who love the truth and who are sincerely trying to be faithful to the Bible.

Rick Warren is the heretic who is causing divisions among God's people through heresies. It is he that should be rejecte d. The fact that his Southern Baptist Convention keeps its mouth shut in the face of his heresies is irrefutable evidence t hat it is deeply compromised and is not faithful to God's Word.

What the Bible says about handling disunity

ThereÂ's an unseen factor in Saddleback ChurchÂ's growth that most people overlook – church unity. God blesses a u nified church. Many churches have tremendous potential, but they never achieve what God desires because the members spend all their time fighting with one another. All of the energy is focused inward.

The Bible talks more about unity of the church than it does about either heaven or hell. ItÂ's that important. Churc hes are made up of people, and there are no perfect people. So people get into conflict with each other. As pastors, we need to learn how to deal with those situations. Specifically, weÂ're called to do these six things when disunity threatens our church.

1. Avoid situations that cause arguments. The Bible says in 2 Timothy 2:23-24 (NIV): "Don't have anything to do with foo lish and stupid arguments, because you know they produce quarrels. And the Lord's servant must not quarrel; instead, h e must be kind to everyone, able to teach, not resentful." Pastors should avoid causing arguments. As a leader you need to set the example for your whole church on this issue. When a minor argument comes along, refuse to get in the middle of it. You donÂ't need to have an opinion on everything. Some discussions donÂ't deserve your participation. Focus your

conversation on topics that matter.

- 2. Teach troublemakers to repent. 2 Timothy 2:25-26 (NIV) says, "Those who oppose him he must gently instruct, in the hope that God will grant them repentance leading them to a knowledge of the truth, and that they will come to their sens es and escape from the trap of the devil, who has taken them captive to do his will." Most pastors donÂ't like confrontatio ns. But we canÂ't run from them. As the pastor, you must gently instruct those creating dissention and opposing the teac hing in the church.
- 3. Warn those causing trouble that their negative words hurt others. 2 Timothy 2:14 (NIV) says, "Keep reminding them of these things. Warn them before God against quarreling about words. It is of no value and only ruins those who listen." P eople need to know that their words have consequences.
- 4. Make a plea for harmony and unity. Paul did this in Philippians 4:2 (NIV). He said, "I plead with Euodia and I plead with Syntyche to agree with each other in the Lord." There were two very strong willed women in the church named Euodia s and Syntyche who were causing so much friction in the church that PaulÂ's plea for them to stay united is in the Bible. Fighting in a church doesnÂ't just affect the combatants; it influences the whole church as people start taking sides. Just like Paul did, at times, youÂ'll need to make a plea for unity directly to those causing problems.
- 5. Rebuke with authority if necessary. Paul says in Titus 2:15-3:1, "These, then, are the things you should teach. Encour age and rebuke with all authority. Do not let anyone despise you. Remind the people to be subject to rulers and authoriti es, to be obedient, to be ready to do whatever is good." You may need to confront the contentious person as well.
- 6. Remove them from the church if they ignore two warnings. Titus 3:10-11 says, "Warn a divisive person once, and the n warn him a second time. After that, have nothing to do with him. You may be sure that such a man is warped and sinfu I; he is self-condemned." No pastor wants to do this, but at last resort you may need to remove the contentious person fr om the church. YouÂ've got to protect the unity of your church. If that means getting rid of troublemakers, do it.

The Bible teaches that as the church grows, Satan will do everything he can to cause division. Even well meaning people, even believers, can be used as tools of Satan to hurt the body of Christ. As pastors, as shepherds of GodÂ's people, itÂ's our job to protect our congregations from SatanÂ's greatest weapon — disunity. ItÂ's not always easy, but itÂ's what weÂ've been called to do.
