The Real Presence by A. W. Tozer ~

Whatever else it embraces, true Christian experience must always include a genuine encounter with God. Without this, r eligion is but a shadow, a reflection of reality, a cheap copy of an original once enjoyed by someone else of whom we have heard. It cannot but be a major tragedy in the life of any man to live in a church from childhood to old age and know n othing more real than some synthetic god compounded of theology and logic, but having no eyes to see, no ears to hear, and no heart to love.

The spiritual giants of old were men who at some time became acutely conscious of the real Presence of God and maint ained that consciousness for the rest of their lives.

The first encounter may have been one of terror, as when a "horror of great darkness" fell upon Abram, or as when Mos es at the bush hid his face because he was afraid to look upon God. Usually this fear soon lost its content of terror and c hanged after a while to delightsome awe, to level off finally into a reverent sense of complete nearness to God.

The essential point is, they experienced God. How otherwise can the saints and prophets be explained? How otherwise can we account for the amazing power for good they have exercised over countless generations? Is it not that they walked in conscious communion with the real Presence and addressed their prayers to God with the ar tless conviction that they were addressing Someone actually There?

You've mentioned the one main "how" --- to seek Him until you Love Him with all of your heart, soul, mind and strength and others as yourself.

Tozer put it across rather well I believe.

Sis, "salt" makes people thirsty for HIM.

We must watch our words in order to make anyone thirsty for that actual "personal relationship with Him and a reality of 'experiencing' having been in His Presence."

Just capitalizing "DIE" won't help Sis. But to draw us to The Lovely One, so that we want to be with Him in the closest way and in that way, we will desire nothing less but to be in His Presence and transformed into His Image.

One cannot "die" until we fully Love Him more than ourselves and not until we've sought Him with all of our might.

Since Deut. 6, our relationship with Him has all hinged upon our Love for Him.

And walking in the spirit is just that stopping and waiting to ask His will, moment by moment or minute by minute. It's not just the cesstation of what most call "sins". The goal is to be like Him, in the Holy Spirit's power. Without Him, we can do nothing.

Well, "The Lord knows them that are His."

By His Foreknowledge, He knew who would seek Him until they love Him and be faithful unto the end, because of that love.

He knows all of our hearts and how we each individually feel about Him or how much we experientially Know Him.

His Sheep that "hear His Voice and Follow and will not follow another."

I don't believe He is nervous at all.

He knows already who are His and who will follow Him until their death or the resurrection.

He said, "If you Love Me, you'll keep my commandments." How much more simpler could He have said it? But He is als o the Author and finisher of our faith and He who began this good work, will finish it, in those whom He did foreknow, He did predestine to come into the Image of The Son and who would have a heart that seeks Him out until they truly 'find' Him.

Heb 5:11 Of whom we have many things to say, and hard to be uttered, seeing ye are dull of hearing.

Heb 5:12 For when for the time ye ought to be teachers, ye have need that one teach you again which be the first principles of the oracles of God; and are become such as have need of milk, and not of strong meat.

Heb 5:13 For every one that useth milk is unskillfull in the word of righteousness: for he is a babe.

Of being salt, that makes all people thirsty for more of JESUS-Himself.

If we're still struggling, we just need to ask ourselves if we've sought Him hard enough to find Him, because if we have, we'd Love Him with a passion and desire to be more and more like Him. The beatitudes speak of this process. That's the/His Goal - to be like Him and not just some sort of moral code only.

If it's done in the flesh alone - who gains?

Being careful not to throw out His Word, that He *will* have a people and how He works to keep them His own and His pla n to transform them into His Image.

He already knows 'who' will be faithful unto the end, by love/spirit and not by the flesh. Gal 3.

Php 3:10 That I may know him, and the power of his resurrection, and the fellowship of his sufferings, being made conformable unto his death;

Php 3:11 If by any means I might attain unto the resurrection of the dead.

Php 3:12 Not as though I had already attained, either were already perfect: but I follow after, if that I may apprehend that t for which also I am apprehended of Christ Jesus.

Php 3:13 Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended: but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are be hind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before,

I have struggled for a long time with the Romans 7:14-25 question. There are good points for both sides of the argument, and men of God whom I greatly respect on both sides as well. But, as it has been mentioned here, we need to look to Scripture first, and be willing to lay aside our preconceived ideas and just take the text for what it says. A good guideline to remember is to judge and examine Scripture in the light of its *context*, and not by our own experiences.

And having done just that with Romans 7, I have become utterly convinced that Paul is NOT speaking of himself as a re generate, born again believer. Now please...it's not my intention to cause any strife or more locked threads. Before you d isagree with me at least take the time to hear me out.

I challenge everyone reading this to please look at Romans 7:14-25 in its proper context, and if possible, it would be ver y helpful to have a Greek dictionary/Strongs numbers (E-Sword really helps). I believe that if you take an honest look, yo u will be convinced as well.

But just to clear something up before I continue--I am NOT an advocate of what's comonly called "sinless perfection." S O I'm not coming from that biased viewpoint. I stand more with Wesley's view of Christian perfection which is different (O NLY because I can see it in Scripture), but that's a whole other issue.

Am I a wretched man still? I'm going to recommend an article and 3 sermons that will explain it way better than I can. T hey hold to the same viewpoint as myself, that Paul is speaking as an unregenerate man in Romans 7:14-25. **BUT** the w ierd thing about these is that they were not preached or written by men of the Wesleyan/holiness persuasion...but by Cal vinists, and very staunch ones at that!

And I must say, it is probably the most honest and balanced look on Romans 7 I have ever come across.

Please take the time to read and listen to these. Even if you disagree, it might broaden your view a bit more on this highly controversial topic.

The article is actually a chapter from the book *Justification and Regeneration* by Charles Leiter. Heartcry Missionary Soc iety (Paul Washer's ministry) sells this book on their website. The sermons are by Tim Conway, a preacher from a Baptis t church in Texas.

And there's the point. And to bring that point out all the more, is the Greek, the grammar and that Romans is normally al ways taught "with Galatians" in Bible Colleges. Just as it was always, "Daniel & Revelation" that were taught as one class

Context is the whole of the book, and not just verses and chpt.s and then also, bringing Galatians in, especially chpt. 3.

Paul is trying to teach the Gentiles in Rome, what he also had to teach the Gentiles in Galatia --- that we are not and can not be saved or walk in obedience to God by the flesh.

Both Rom. 8 and Gal 3 insist that we must "walk in the spirit".

Because the church does not understand what that means, they insist on doing exactly what Paul warned against in Romans and Galatians.

Very disheartening.

People read all the "thou shall nots" that are in the N.T. and try to fulfill these in their own strength and fail miserably. That is the struggle that Paul was discussing in Romans 7 and Galatians 3.

The solution, Romans 8.

If anyone denies that there is not a battle within them - that's fights their ability to "resemble Christ", in word, thought, or deed - then I'd like to meet such a human.

To 'battle' is not to "excuse sin" in one's life.

Paul shows the battle of trying to fulfill this law in the flesh in Rom 7. You'll fall flat on your face or become the worst of the em in self-righteousness. Have seen both.

Hi sister. Perhaps I gave off a wrong impression here. Maybe I should have framed my words a bit differently. I recogniz e all these things and was actually trying to make the point that there is often a great difference in how the Lord will take us through matters. There is no boasting whether the Lord might deliver instantaneously or protracted, it is glorious in the e former as in the later and even if a season of suffering is what it takes to accomplish the purpose He has in mind I do n ot know that it is a higher respecter of persons over the one delivered spontaneously. I certainly wasn't questioning the means by any stretch.

The question "Am I a wretched man ... still?" isn't one I am really questioning from a point of doubting it, I am pretty well convinced it is the case but am attempting to allow a re-thinking of it openly. I might make things more difficult because of this penchant to hold opposing views in tension and not try and argue out from underneath them. It's tricky business but I am not attempting to be crafty about it either.

Rom 7:21 I find then a law, that, when I would do good, evil is present with me.

Something I have been taking a greater deal of notice is how the scriptures explain our experience as much if not more so than also teach us how to live, what to expect and so forth. I'd like to take you up on this invitation :-) to ask what you make of these verses from Romans 8, (which you must know by now are among my favourite for explaining this part of the gospel)?

- 11 But if the Spirit of him that raised up Jesus from the dead dwell in you, he that raised up Christ from the dead shall al so quicken your mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in you.
- 12 Therefore, brethren, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live after the flesh.
- 13 For if ye live after the flesh, ye shall die: but if ye through the Spirit do mortify the deeds of the body, ye shall live.

I would draw your attention to three words in particular: v 11 'quicken' and 'mortal' and v 13 'through'.

Here's another verse with 'through' in it:

### 1 John 4:9

In this the love of God was manifested toward us, that God has sent His only begotten Son into the world, that we might live through Him.

Here's Tyndale on those three verses from Romans 8, beginning in 10:

Wherefore if the spirit of Him that raised up Jesus from death, dwell in you: even He that raised up Christ from death, sh all quicken your mortal bodies, because that this spirit dwelleth in you.

Therefore brethren we are now debtors, not to the flesh, to live after the flesh. For if ye live after the flesh ye must die. But if ye mortify the deeds of the body, by the help of the spirit, ye shall live.

Here's one last verse with 'through' in it:

### Romans 7

24 O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death?

25 I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord. So then with the mind I myself serve the law of God; but with the flesh the law of sin.

Here's Tyndale to the first verse of Rom 8:

O wretched man that I am: who shall deliver me from this body of death? I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord. S o then I myself in my mind serve the law of God, and in my flesh the law of sin. There is then no damnation to them whi ch are in Christ Jesus, which walk not after the flesh but after the spirit.

For instance the verse above, "I find a law" Well, I find a law as well, when evil is present with me. Not past tense, but current tense, presently.
I am assuming you are referring (only) to flesh and not to other kinds of 'evil'.
Quote: Am I a wretched man still?

Honestly, I believe Paul described this situation as 'wretched' only when he knew no way out. It is impossible to argue t hat he was unconverted when he wrote to the Roman church, and I do believe his use of the present tense is a fair literary device for the sake of emphasis, as well as to recreate in his own mind - for the sake of writing about it accurately - th at sense of unresolvable bondage which existed before the cross. Also, as with the poor, the flesh we have always with us, always demanding from us a regular commitment to the cross. If it is not possible to break through this barrier eventually, Peter could not write:

### 1 Peter 4

- 1 Forasmuch then as Christ hath suffered for us in the flesh, arm yourselves likewise with the <u>same mind</u>: for he that hat h suffered in the flesh <u>hath ceased</u> from sin;
- 2 That he no longer should live the rest of his time in the flesh to the lusts of men, but to the will of God.

There may be great struggles, and many repetitive choices to be made to deepen the first decision to be dead to the world in Christ Jesus, but His death is that *great news* that there is a way through.

Love this, drawing out words to derive their meaning and intention. "Through", that may be the hinge perhaps of all of this s? Interesting to put *quicken*, well, actually just as you have it here, in this order ... seems to be speaking of progression. In just going through this process already the verses keep cropping up, lately, this one;

1Co 9:27 but I buffet my body, and bring it into bondage: lest by any means, after that I have preached to others, I myse If should be rejected.

Just to draw off what I am musing on, Matthew Henry here;

They were not only temperate, but inured themselves to hardships. Those who fought with one another in these exercise s prepared themselves by beating the air, as the apostle calls it, or by throwing out their arms, and thereby inuring thems elves, beforehand, to deal about their blows in close combat, or brandish them by way of flourish. There is no room for a ny such exercise in the Christian warfare. Christians are ever in close combat. There enemies make fierce and hearty op position, and are ever at hand; and for this reason they must lay about them in earnest, and never drop the contest, nor f lag and faint in it. They must fight, not as those that beat the air, but must strive against their enemies with all their might. One enemy the apostle here mentions, namely, the body; this must be kept under, beaten black and blue, as the comb atants were in these Grecian games, and thereby brought into subjection. By the body we are to understand fleshly app etites and inclinations. These the apostle set himself to curb and conquer, and in this the Corinthians were bound to imit ate him. Note, Those who would aright pursue the interests of their souls must beat down their bodies, and keep them u nder. They must combat hard with fleshly lusts, and not indulge a wanton appetite, and long for heathenish sacrifices, no r eat them, to please their flesh, at the hazard of their brethren's souls. The body must be made to serve the mind, not s uffered to lord over it.

Again, finding these things true to experience.

------Honestly, I believe Paul described this situation as 'wretched' only when he knew no way out. It is impossible to argue that he was u nconverted when he wrote to the Roman church, and I do believe his use of the present tense is a fair literary device for the sake of emphasis, as well as to recreate in his own mind - for the sake of writing about it accurately - that sense of unresolvable bondage which existed before the cross. Without doubt, mortification is something we <u>do</u> (to our flesh) with the help of the Spirit. But the only reason we can hop e of succeeding, is in that 'our old man' was crucified so long ago.

In another thread someone said 'Sin is not a person', but in Paul's terminology I'm noticing he captures a truth in the phr ase 'body of sin' (Rom 6:6) and 'body of the sins of the flesh, (Col 2:11) and Rom 7:24 'this body of death'.

Since death passed upon all men 'through' Adam's sin (Rom 5:12), these seem reasonable descriptions. Also, we have in Heb 2:14, Jesus taking part in 'flesh and blood ... that *through death* He might destroy him who had the power of deat h, that is, the devil'.

What you said about 'rolling over and dying' sounds like the action of a seasoned veteran, who knows from the pain of pr evious extensive battling, that a short, sharp death-blow through the Spirit, has become (perhaps not *infinitely*, but definit ely) *preferable*. ;-)

Part 1 needs to be read and understood before Part 2 can be appreciated. Actually part 2 has more drama, if that is po ssible, then part 1. (Of course, I am reading the "The New Amplified" version so my evaluation may not be accurate.)

Perhaps one reason you laid it aside is because initially it deals with the journey of a mother and her children? If you can overcome that block, you will find other males joining them on their pilgrimage and the assistance they rendered to this f amily. The roles these males played in the story appealed to the boys in my SS class.

The reason I am using this in Sunday School is that the quarterlies we were given to use are geared for older children. A junior-aged child needs a story to carry the doctrine and these books were about doctrine only. Tell a child a story and the enteach him/her about how the story illustrates the doctrine and they will get it and remember it. Otherwise, you will see symptoms of boredom. So, to keep the class' attention, engage their imagination, I acquired "Pilgrim's Progress, (Part 1) " in flannel board and told them this story. They loved it. After finishing this, I went to Part 2. Now the quarterlies have sto ries and I will focus on it shortly. Now this will become another challenge because I have a child who is afflicted with a se vere case of dyslexia. If I use traditional methods, he hides behind the book and is out of it. If I tell the story, using gestures, drama, etc., he sits up and listens. So, my entire presentation is geared to reaching this boy and the others do not mind and are loving it - yes, I have to think outside the box and be unconventional, hence my use of "Pilgrim's Progress" in Sunday School.

Haven't had time to read this whole thread yet, but just wrote a few things on the "How is everyone doing spiritually?" thread (general topics, that are relevant. Have said similar things before from time to time, but the "Alice Through the Looking Glass" illustration was a new one!

Here are some bits from that thread:

We don't have to do it, we don't have to "measure up", that way lies futile striving and despair. What we need is to incre asingly trust HIM, instead of ourselves!

Â... It's like learning to float on water. If you try to sit up and see where you're going, and how you're doing, you sink; if y ou abandon yourself to the water you float.

But it's an active abandonment, not passive: activity in maintaining that abandonment by His grace, instead of trusting in our own success or failure.

Â...The Lord told me recently that I need to be in a closer relationship to Him, and that I was afraid of that closeness. Bu t He also said that, of myself, I can't get there, can't get rid of that fear of spiritual intimacy with Him. Therefore I'm to trus t Him to deal with the fear and all that goes with it.

I know He will do it!

Having to wait and long for, and fail, is part of the process of coming into that place of trust.

REST! We don't get there if we strive, we do get there if we rest (Hebrews 4)!

Struggled with it for many years - the best I could manage on my own was striving to *stop* striving. Which doesn't work e ither!

A bit like Alice Through the Looking Glass, if anyone's read the book. She was trying to get into the garden from the house, but the more she tried to get away from the house by taking paths that seemed to lead in the right direction the more she kept getting back there. Because everything in the looking-glass world was the opposite from what she was used to . Just as spiritual principles are opposite from what we do naturally. Like striving and working our guts out (excuse the vulgar expression but can't think of a better offhand!) to achieve success.

Story of my life too, until recently! For us, as Christians, the question is how to get from the end of Romans 7 to the beginning of Romans 8!

In "Alice" the answer came when, in despair of ever getting there, she started walking back *towards* the house - and sud denly found herself in the garden with no problem!
