Question:

John 5:36 But I have greater witness than that of John: for the works which the Father hath given me to finish, the same WORKS that I do, bear witness of me, that the Father hath sent me.

John 10:37 If I do not the WORKS of my Father, **believe me not**. 38 But if I do, though ye believe not me, BELIEVE THE WORKS: that ye may know, and believe, that the Father is in me, and I in him.

John 14:10 Believest thou not that I am in the Father, and the Father in me? the words that I speak unto you I speak not of myself: but the Father that dwelleth in me, he doeth the WORKS. 11 Believe me that I am in the Father, and the Father in me: or else believe me for the very WORKS' SAKE.

To answer your question directly, yes, even believing is a Work of God produced in us by God -not of man.

1 Thess 1:3 Remembering without ceasing your **WORK OF FAITH**, and labour of love, and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ, in the sight of God and our Father;

2 Thess 2:11 Wherefore also we pray always for you, that our God would count you worthy of this calling, and fulfil all the good pleasure of his goodness, and the **WORK OF FAITH** with power:

Again I will state that even faith, is a work of God produced in us by God, according to the work or operation of God done upon us.

We are of course saved BY GRACE, THROUGH FAITH-but also knowing that faith without works is dead, or I could say it this way faith without fruit is dead.

James 2 is great in understanding this: James 2:14 What doth it profit, my brethren, though a man say he hath faith, and have not works? can faith save him? 15 If a brother or sister be naked, and destitute of daily food, 16 And one of you say unto them, Depart in peace, be ye warmed and filled; notwithstanding ye give them not those things which are needful to the body; what doth it profit? 17 Even so faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone. 18 Yea, a man may say, Thou hast faith, and I have works: shew me thy faith without thy works, and I will shew thee my faith by my works. 19 Thou believest that there is one God; thou doest well: the devils also believe, and tremble. 20 But wilt thou know, O vain man, that faith without works is dead? 21 Was not Abraham our father justified BY WORKS, when he had offered Isaac his son upon the altar? 22 Seest thou how faith wrought with his works, and BY WORKS WAS FAITH MADE PERFECT? 23 An

d the scripture was fulfilled which saith, Abraham believed God, and it was imputed unto him for righteousness: and he was called the Friend of God. 24 Ye see then how that BY WORKS a man is justified, AND NOT by faith only. 25 Likewise also was not Rahab the harlot justified BY WORKS, when she had received the messengers, and had sent them out another way? 26 For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also.

Well I believe my answer to that would be:

Heb 6:4 For it is impossible for those who were once enlightened, and have tasted of the heavenly gift, and were made partakers of the Holy Ghost, 5 And have tasted the good word of God, and the powers of the world to come, 6 If they shall fall away, to renew them again unto repentance; seeing they crucify to themselves the Son of God afresh, and put him to an open shame. 7 For the earth which drinketh in the rain that cometh oft upon it, and bringeth forth herbs meet for them by whom it is dressed, receiveth blessing from God: 8 But that which beareth thorns and briers is rejected, and is high unto cursing; whose end is to be burned.

Heb 10: 26 For if WE (the Church) SIN WILLFULLY after that we have received the knowledge of the truth, there remaineth no more sacrifice for sins, 27 But a certain fearful looking for of judgment and fiery indignation, which shall devour the adversaries. 28 He that despised Moses' law died without mercy under two or three witnesses: 29 Of how much sorer punishment, suppose ye, shall he be thought worthy, who hath trodden under foot the Son of God, and hath counted the blood of the covenant, wherewith he was sanctified, an unholy thing, and hath done despite unto the Spirit of grace? 30 For we know him that hath said, Vengeance belongeth unto me, I will recompense, saith the Lord. And again, The Lord shall judge his people. 31 It is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God.

The reason why I quote this two verses is because both of these verses describe genuine believers who at some point being to deny the Spirit and the Lordship of Jesus Christ-thus they become Christians who continually walk against the Spirit or in denying of the Spirit. in which it brings Christ words to life:

Matt 12:32 And whosoever speaketh a word against the Son of man, it shall be forgiven him: but whosoever speaketh against the Holy Ghost, it shall not be forgiven him, neither in this world, neither in the world to come. (understanding the "speaketh" is not always verbal, but even in actions)

Or another way I would answer that is: Christ told all those who came to him to ABIDE (remain) in him, and he in them.

John 8:31 Then said Jesus to those Jews which believed on him, If ye **CONTINUE** in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed;

Matt 24:13 But he that shall endure unto the end, the same shall be saved. (It is not really per se if you started the race, it is if you finish the race and how you do so)

Jesus once said " he choose" the 12 and one of them "was" a devil-referring to Judas-now Jesus, even being the Spirit compelled/choose Judas to believe for a season, but then to deny Jesus-which I might add again He is the Spirit-thus Judas did not "CONTINUE, ENDURE, or ABIDE" in or Christ to remain fruitful and faithful UNTIL THE END. I say that to say, I don't believe Judas will be the only person like this....just think of the " great FALLING away"

Hi DesiJr,

Is breathing 'a work'?

Is eating 'a work'?

Can we distinguish between the hunger for oxygen and the hunger for food?

I'm asking because I'm not sure what you're trying to find out, and whether you're trying to understand something about God, or man, or both.

Did you consciously frame your question in non-biblical terminology, or, are you thinking about the Spirit's work and that's why you mention Him?

By 'non-biblical' I mean a phrase like this: 'Holy Spirit alone reveals to you Jesus'. Do you remember that Jesus said:

John 6:44

No man can come to me, except the Father which hath sent me draw him: and I will raise him up at the last day.

Below are some thoughts on your question by Oswald Chambers.

October 28th.

JUSTIFICATION BY FAITH

"For if, when we were enemies, we were reconciled to God by the death of His Son, much more, being reconciled, we shall be saved by His life." Romans 5:10

I am not saved by believing; I realize I am saved by believing. It is not repentance that saves me, repentance is the sign that I realize what God has done in Christ Jesus. The danger is to put the emphasis on the effect instead of on the cause. It is my obedience that puts me right with God, my consecration. Never! I am put right with God because prior to all, Christ died. When I turn to God and by belief accept what God reveals I can accept, instantly the stupendous Atonement of Jesus Christ rushes me into a right relationship with God; and by the supernatural miracle of God's grace I stand justified, not because I am sorry for my sin, not because I have repented, but because of what Jesus has done. The Spirit of God brings it with a breaking, all-over light, and I know, though I do not know how, that I am saved.

The salvation of God does not stand on human logic, it stands on the sacrificial Death of Jesus. We can be born again because of the Atonement of Our Lord. Sinful men and women can be changed into new creatures, not by their repentance or their belief, but by the marvellous work of God in Christ Jesus which is prior to all experience. The impregnable safety of justification and sanctification is God Himself. We have not to work out these things ourselves; they have been worked out by the Atonement. The supernatural becomes natural by the miracle of God; there is the realization of what Jesus Christ has already done - "It is finished."

We can run around in circles over words forever and we just find ourselves spinning.

Let's admit, work is really not a bad thing! And faith can be intensely hard work at times – especially when trying to overcome the constant voices of doubt. Maybe it would be better to ask the question: “How do we acquire eternal life?” Let's admit, we can never get that by anything we do any more that we could make ourselves get born in the first place. Really our faith cannot give us new life. Only God can. We can be tempted to idolize “faith” and turn it into a magical formula. How many false conversations have been sanctioned by the human stamp labeled: APPROVED BY FAITH but is essentially a faith in one's faith.

Let's admit, faith can be a work of the flesh - nothing more than a human construct. That cannot save us.

I remember reading a portion by Duncan Campbell in which he distinguished between natural faith and supernatural faith. He points out that natural faith cannot save us. Of course, that begs the question, how can we know the difference?

Maybe this is one question that we should let God himself answer. Because if we try, we just end up creating a "sure"-fix formula that sends us spinning again. And then we put our faith in our formula.

“The Spirit himself testifies with our spirit that we are God's children.” Rom. 8:16

The challenge: Can we trust God to illuminate by his Spirit, or do we trust in our own human attempts to do so. Now that would also be a work apart from faith.

“..and everything that does not come from faith is sin.” Rom. 14:23

Galatians 2:16-21 Knowing that a man is not justified by the works of the law, but by the faith of Jesus Christ, even we have believed in Jesus Christ, that we might be justified by the faith of Christ, and not by the works of the law: for by the works of the law shall no flesh be justified. But if, while we seek to be justified by Christ, we ourselves also are found sinners, is therefore Christ the minister of sin? God forbid. For if I build again the things which I destroyed, I make myself a transgressor. For I through the law am dead to the law, that I might live unto God. I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me: and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me. I do not frustrate the grace of God: for if righteousness come by the law, then Christ is dead in vain.

Works or Faith, which is it that does the work of Jesus Christ that is born again in us?
It must be His Faith that gives us His Faith to do the works of Him. Who are we without Christ?
What can we do without Christ? With Christ in us what can we do?

The Answer to all these is: without Him doing the works in us our works are worthless, without Him giving His Faith to our Faith our faith is dead. With Christ, faith is the beginning of good works in Christ Jesus. Let us have this mind which was in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Philippians 2:1-13 If there be therefore any consolation in Christ, if any comfort of love, if any fellowship of the Spirit, if any bowels and mercies, Fulfil ye my joy, that ye be likeminded, having the same love, being of one accord, of one mind. Let nothing be done through strife or vainglory; but in lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves. Look not every man on his own things, but every man also on the things of others. Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus: Who, being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God: But made himself of no reputation, and took upon him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men: And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross. Wherefore God also hath highly exalted him, and given him a name which is above every name: That at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth; And that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. Wherefore, my beloved, as ye have always obeyed, not as in my presence only, but now much more in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling. For it is God which worketh in you both to will and to do of his good pleasure.

It is God through Jesus Christ in us that is working out His good pleasure. This must be our way of thinking and keep these things in our mind and the things of Christ will become increasingly line upon line and precept upon precept the works we are to be willing to have done through us by the Lord Jesus Christ Himself, by whom we have new life and live in and for and through Him.

Logic, regarding Galatians 4:19 you said

Prior to this in verse 6 it says

"And because ye are sons, God hath sent forth the Spirit of his Son into your hearts, crying, Abba, Father."

In John 14:18 the Lord says

I will not leave you comfortless: I will come to you.

Also, regarding fruit you said

"The branch(us) bears the fruit, the vine(Jesus) enables the branch."

In Matthew 26:29, Mark 14:25, and Luke 22:18, the Lord Jesus, speaking about wine I think, reffers to it as **the fruit of t**

he vine.

Isn't it that the branches **hold** the fruit that the vine is bearing? Everything for life comes from the vine, not the branches, right? And again, the fruit in Galatians 5 is not called the fruit of the believer.

I thought also of this where it says

"But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, that the excellency of the power may be of God, and not of us."

- 2 Corinthians chapter 4 verse 7(KJV)

Also, regarding John 6:29 you said

"The work that we do of GOD(not from GOD) is to believe on Him.

I'm going to answer just one of your questions:

Romans 6

3 are ye ignorant that we, as many as were baptized to Christ Jesus, to his death were baptized?

4 we were buried together, then, with him through the baptism to the death, that even as Christ was raised up out of the dead through the glory of the Father, so also we in newness of life might walk.

1 Corinthians 15

20 And now, Christ hath risen out of the dead--the first-fruits of those sleeping he became, 21 for since through man *is* the death, also through man *is* a rising again of the dead,
22 for even as in Adam all die, so also in the Christ all shall be made alive,
23 and each in his proper order, a first-fruit Christ, afterwards those who are the Christ's, in his presence,

Galatians 2

20 with Christ I have been crucified, **and live no more do I**, and Christ doth live in me; and that which I now live in the flesh--in the faith I live of the Son of God,

That part of Romans 6:4 referring to Jesus' resurrection, is translated in my interlinear as 'from among the dead', but Tyndale has 'from death'. There is also the assumption that being raised to newness of life automatically leads to walking in the Spirit.

If we do not say that Jesus was somehow 'born again' through His resurrection, on what basis can we claim to be 'born again' through participating in His by faith? Seriously?

At the same time as asking this, I do realise there is a crossover between life in the flesh which He made, which we do not.

His death was complicated by His battle with sin on our behalf, by which our life in Him (through new birth), can lead to the kind of overcoming life which He already had in the flesh because He didn't have *fallen* flesh to deal with.

Nevertheless, His victory against sin in His personal life - in that He didn't once succumb to sin - is not insignificant for us either. This is the life to which we aspire, is it not, which can only begin *after* new birth?

I guess what I'm trying to say is, that if *believing* (or *faith*) is 'the work', then we should all be exhausted by every relationship into which we enter, which requires a response from us, or, to which we find ourselves desiring to respond.

Much as you find it tempting to entertain this possibility, there is much in personal experience (therefore), which militates against drawing such a conclusion.

The explanation for the truth that faith is not a work, may lie in the spiritual nature of true communication between God and His creatures, and between creatures themselves.

Hi Logic,

I liked your point about context, and went back to read more of the chapter, not merely the preceding verse. I see why you want to make it a work of man, to believe Jesus, but I also see that Chris wants to give all the glory for faith, to God, emphasising that it is God who draws us to the place of faith.

That particular point comes out very clearly in the following passage. Nevertheless, I do believe it is even easier than whether it is man or God who does the 'work' of believing, as Jesus places special emphasis on *seeing Him*. Also, it is possible to 'see Him' and *not* believe, which implies a choice on the part of the unbelievers, as much as a choice on the Father's part not to draw them to Jesus.

Later in John 19, Jesus comments on the blessedness of those who believe without having *seen* Him in the flesh (or resurrected flesh). Perhaps there is an important distinction here, which is endorsed by Paul in Romans 10:9, over the importance in believing in His resurrection. As Paul also says in 1 Cor 15:14, if Christ is not risen, our faith is vain.

Related to John 6, that old proverb 'seeing is believing' comes to mind, in the light of the discussion Jesus has with the people here, esp v

John 6

26 Jesus answered them and said, Verily, verily, I say unto you, Ye seek me, not because ye saw the miracles, but because ye did eat of the loaves, and were filled.

27 Labour not for the meat which perisheth, but for that meat which endureth unto everlasting life, which the Son of man shall give unto you: for him hath God the Father sealed.

It seems that when the people ask Him what He's going to do so that they can see His display of power and believe in Him, He answers in several ways, the main one of which is to say, *I'm going to give you my flesh to eat*.

At the same time, He tells them that if they've seen Him, believing is the required response, but they choose rather to go away arguing about the logistics of how He could give them His flesh to eat. Sounds a lot like this discussion... in that if you want to believe that Jesus is saying the act of believing is a work, no-one can rob you of that interpretation, except perhaps Hebrews 4:9 - 11:

There remaineth therefore a rest to the people of God. For he that is entered into his rest, he also hath ceased from his own works, as God from His. Let us labour therefore to enter into that rest, lest any man fall after the same example of unbelief.
