He burst into tears at the dinner table and began to speak about LOST SOULS who need JESUS. This preacher guy later tells others saying, "Everybody talks about the miracles this guy did, but nobody realizes the pain and agony he goes through under the heart of God and the compassion he has for the lost". Saying that his miracles doesn't come close to touching his love and compassion, in comparison.

I hear about brothers in back jungles reaching unreached tribes for the Gospel who plant 300, 400, 500, even 600 or mo re churches. Signs and wonders follow them. People get healed. Insane get delivered and made whole. Even the dead a re raised. But no one knows their names... except God, and all the demons in Hell. "Jesus I know, and Paul I know..."

Are we willing to pay the price of suffering and living a lifestyle of martyrdom in order that our names may be known in H ell?

The Lord has called us into heart union with Himself; He wants His bride to have one heart and one Spirit with Him and to do what He Himself loved to do. That case had to be a miracle. The lungs were gone, they were just in shreds, but the Lord restored lungs that were perfectly sound.

There is a fruit of the Spirit that must accompany the gift of healing and that is longsuffering. The man who is going throu gh with God to be used in healing must be a man of longsuffering. He must be always ready with a word of comfort. If the sick one is in distress and helpless and does not see everything eye to eye with you, you must bear with him. Our Lord Tesus Christ was filled with compassion and lived and moved in a place of longsuffering, and we will have to get into this place if we are to help needy ones.

There are some times when you pray for the sick and you are apparently rough. But you are not dealing with a person, you are dealing with the Satanic forces that are binding the person. Your heart is full of love and compassion to all, but you are moved to a holy anger as you see the place the devil has taken in the body of the sick one, and you deal with his position with a real forcefulness. One day a pet dog followed a lady out of her house and ran all round her feet. She said to the dog, "My dear, I cannot have you with me today." The dog wagged its tail and made a big fuss. She said, "Go home, my dear." But the dog did not go. At last she shouted roughly, "Go home," and off it went. Some people deal with the devil like that, The devil can stand all the comfort you like to give him. Cast him out! You are dealing not with the person, you are dealing with the devil. SMITH WIGGLESWORTH (1859-1947) was a famous Pentecostal evangelist and faith healer. Many books have been written about his unusual life. He was converted in a Methodist church, confirmed as an Anglican, and as a young man was associated with the Salvation Army and Plymouth Brethren. In 1907 he claimed that he was "baptised in the Holy S pirit" after hands were laid on him by Mary Boddy, who alleged to have had a Pentecostal experience only a month prior to that. Mrs. Boddy believed in the doctrine of healing in the atonement, but she spent the last sixteen years of her life as an invalid. Wigglesworth, too, believed that physical healing is guaranteed in the atonement of Christ. He taught against the use of all medicine.

He believed that signs and wonders should always follow the preaching of the Gospel. He taught that a Christian can be justified and sanctified but still not have everything necessary from God. "People are never safe until they are baptized w ith the Holy Ghost" (Wigglesworth, "The Place of Power," June 1916, reprinted in The Anointing of His Spirit, p. 151).

He taught that handkerchiefs which are prayed over will bring life if carried in faith to the sick (The Anointing of His Spirit,

p. 231). He taught: "Jesus came to set us free from sin, to free us from sickness, so that we should go forth in the power of the Spirit and minister to the needy, sick, and afflicted" (Wigglesworth, "Divine Life Brings Divine Health," Pentecostal Evangel, Jan. 17, 1942).

He claimed that the Christian has the power to speak things into existence: "God declares, 'You have an anointing.' Beli eve God and you will see this happen. What you say will come to pass. Speak the word and the bound shall be free, the sick shall be healed" (Wigglesworth, "Power from on High," Pentecostal Evangel, May 27, 1944).

Like today's Word-Faith preachers, Wigglesworth failed to make a proper distinction between the person and ministry of Jesus Christ and that of the Christian. He claimed that Jesus Christ increased in the fullness of God and in the power of the Holy Spirit. "I want you to understand that after the trials, after all the temptations and everything, Jesus comes out more full of God, more clothed in the Spirit, more ready for the fight" (Wigglesworth, "The Place of Power," June 1916, re printed in The Anointing of His Spirit, p. 146). This is heresy. The Lord Jesus Christ was God the Son. He could not be "more full of God." Further, He was given the Spirit without measure (John 3:34).

The Lord Jesus Christ did not come to be our example; He came to be our Savior (Lk. 19:10). Wigglesworth also taught that the Christian can operate in the same omnipotent power that Christ exercised. "Dare you come into the place of om nipotence? ... God's design is to bring you to the place where you will be a son clothed with the power of gifts and grace s, ministries and operations, to bring you into glory, clothed with the majesty of heaven. For he shall bring many sons an d daughters unto glory--unto son-likeness, son-perfection" (Wigglesworth, "The Privileges of Sonship," August 1924, rep rinted in The Anointing of His Spirit, p. 221).

This is very similar to the false Manifest Sons of God theology of the perfectibility of certain saints, and it is the same her esy as that taught today by Kenneth Hagin, Kenneth Copeland, and other Word-Faith teachers. Again, it is a confusion of this present life with that which is to come. They would mock this statement, claiming that my problem is unbelief and spiritual blindness, but the fact remains that they cannot do the miracles that Christ performed.

The Lord Jesus Christ never conducted a healing crusade and He never took up an offering before He performed His sig ns and wonders. He did not have any rock music to stir up the crowd. He did not laugh hysterically or stagger about like a drunk man. He could raise the dead and heal every sickness without fail. No Pentecostal preacher has ever been able to do this.

Wigglesworth taught a form of sinless perfection. He stated: "I am realizing very truly these days that there is a sanctifica tion of the Spirit where the thoughts are holy, where the life is beautiful, with no blemish" (Wigglesworth, "Count It All Joy," August 1925, reprinted in The Anointing of His Spirit, p. 226).

Oh, that this were the truth, but it is not. The Apostle Paul described his experience in these words: "For I know that in m e (that is, in my flesh,) dwelleth no good thing: for to will is present with me; but how to perform that which is good I find not. ... O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death" (Rom. 8:18,24).

There is spiritual victory through the Holy Spirit in this life, but it is not the experience described by Wigglesworth. It is no t a life in which the thoughts are perfectly holy and in which there is no blemish. This is the destructive heresy of perfectionism, of complete sanctification, which has led multitudes of sincere people down the road of confusion and despair. To encourage people to seek and demand that which God has not promised is to expose them to demonic delusion and fleshly fanaticism.

The popular Bible commentator Harry Ironside began his ministry as a young man with the Salvation Army. He earnestly sought the sinless perfection experience, and at one point he thought he "had it." Alas, though, he soon realized that his old sin nature was still present and active. In great despair he was committed to a hospital in a state of emotional and sp iritual breakdown. There God brought him into contact with literature which taught the way of biblical sanctification and w ith Christians who could help him understand his salvation correctly.

He became established in the Faith and went on to have a long and fruitful ministry of the Word of God. His testimony is in the book Holiness: The False and the True, which is published by Loizeaux Brothers.

Wigglesworth preached constantly on the power of faith, but he failed to balance his teaching with the absolute necessit y of submitting one's faith to the sovereign will of God. He failed to distinguish properly between this present life and the

resurrection life which is to come (Romans 8:18-25).

Instead he taught: "Jesus would have us come forth in divine likeness, in resurrection force, in the power of the Spirit, to walk in faith and understand his Word, what he meant when he said he would give us power over all the power of the en emy. Christ will subdue all things till everything comes into perfect harmony with his will" (Wigglesworth, "The Substance of Things Hoped For," Pentecostal Evangel, Oct. 25, 1924).

This is a destructive doctrinal error which causes people to be confused about what they can and cannot expect from Go d in this present time.

Such false teaching produces great confusion and results in the overthrowing of the faith of great numbers of people who, having tried to exercise the faith spoken of by the Pentecostal preacher and having failed to achieve the desired mirac le, give up in great despair.

Faith is trusting God and His Word NO MATTER WHAT THE CIRCUMSTANCES, whether He does miracles or whether He does not do miracles. Faith is waiting on God to bring His promises to pass, regardless of what I am experiencing in this present life.

Hebrews 11 reminds us that there are two kinds of faith: that which overcomes difficulties (Heb. 11:32- 35a) and that which endures difficulties (Heb. 11:35b-40).

In spite of his teaching that God promises perfect physical wholeness and that the Christian can operate in the same sign gifts that Christ exhibited, very few of those who sought Wigglesworth's healing ministrations were ever healed.

His own wife died a mere six years after he became a Pentecostal, and his son died two years after that. His daughter, who assisted in his meetings, was never healed of her deafness. For three years Wigglesworth himself suffered with gall stones.

In 1936 Wigglesworth gave a prophecy to the aforementioned David DuPlessis that God would pour out His Spirit upon all denominations and that the Pentecostal experience would sweep the world. DuPlessis was told that he would play a significant role in this movement.

The fulfillment of the prophecy has proven that it was not of God. The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of Truth (Jn. 14:17; 15:27; 16:13; 1 John 4:6), and wherever He holds sway in men's lives He enlightens their minds to the truth and causes them to abhor error.

In contrast, the ecumenical-Charismatic "renewal" with which David DuPlessis was associated, is a movement which co nfirms people in their doctrinal error. Catholics remained committed to Roman heresies. Modernists remained committed to their unbelief. Members of apostate denominations remained committed to the apostasy. The ecumenical- Charismati c renewal has broken down the walls between truth and error and has been one of the chief glues of the end-times one-world church movement.

Here is wigglesworth on deception;

.......How many times has Satan come along to you this way? He says, "After all, you may be deceived. You know you really are not a child of God." If the devil comes along and says that you are not saved, it is a pretty sure sign that you are. When he comes and tells you that you are not healed, it may be taken as good evidence that the Lord has sent His word and healed you. The devil knows that if he can capture your thought life, he has won a mighty victory over you. His great business is injecting thoughts, but if you are pure and holy you will instantly shrink from them. God wants us to let the mind that was in Christ Jesus, that pure, holy, humble mind of Christ, be in us.

I come across people everywhere I go who are held bound by deceptive conditions, and these conditions have come ab out simply because they have allowed the devil to make their minds the place of his stronghold. How are we to guard ag ainst this? I don't know the original context of this quote, but it may be the 'heresy-busters' that are twisting context here.

We need to consider that while Jesus is God, God the Father and God the Holy Ghost are separate persons. If God the Holy Ghost was always fully present with Jesus, why did the Holy Spirit come down on him during his baptism? The ph rase "he <u>was given</u> the Spirit without measure" would also suggest that he was without the full measure at some point.

Another example is the death cry of Jesus: "My Father, My Father, why have you forsaken me?" At this point he wasn't "always full of God".

This Wigglesworth quote also reminds me of the passage in the Bible where Jesus heard about the death of John the B aptist, went into a 'desert place apart' (I assume to pray), and shortly afterwards healed many sick and feed the five thou sand.

I'm not saying that every point of Wigglesworth's theology is necessarily correct, however I believe he moved in God's p ower and at God's calling. I'm not aware of him ever trying to set himself up as an 'untouchable' leader of a cult, extract large sums of money from his listeners, or committing any of the other perversities that are common amongst deceivers.

It is this either\or that keeps us in a cynical and cyclical biting of either our own or each others tails. Away with the extre mes. Both are true. We have an overabundance of emphasis on the miraculous that cannot just be shoved off to one sid e without addressing it and to do so does not have to denote that everything falls into that same extreme. All or nothing, always or never, so it seems underlines much of what causes so much schism and factions across a whole range of issu es.

Attempted a consideration elsewhere about 'incident or precedent' when it comes to scripture and to even real life experi ence. What does scripture portray in any given circumstance?

Have been holding back a bit, reading through all this on Smith Wigglesworth and might mention a search of his name h ere will bring forth some other good postings as well.

Being early on well caught up in WOF constructs and it might be stated that not a few of the ideals were extrapolated even from Wigglesworth's ministry ... When I began to question it all, take in some criticism (which I was naturally predisposed to) and force myself to listen and consider everything I had more or less swallowed there came a point of departure from it all. By that I do mean all. It was that which Zac Poonen describes as 'pendulumitis'. It meant anything that had even the smell of those things being overemphasized; healing, miracles, tongues, faith 'in faith' and so forth were discarded without question or consideration. Anything taught or related, anyone even remotely associated ... Wigglesworth, Lake, just to mention two, were in my estimation false and not even worth the bother of investigating. So intent and even 'injure d' I felt from being led astray that there was no discussion necessary. It took a great deal of time to curb my bitterness though it was some mix of indignation and sorrow, sadness and grief, confusion all wrapped up together. But bitterness it was still and moreover just plain pride.

Part of the trouble I had was my wife's penchant and bent towards healing and even healing 'ministries'. I found myself h aving to wrestle with not only my own aforementioned issues but also somehow manage to listen not merely hear and c onsider her then deep seated belief.

What really threw me the proverbial curve ball was happening upon SermonIndex some 5 blessed years ago. All of a su dden I was thrust up against it all. Both. Both was happening. Here were men of God greatly used and finally speaking h eart truths that seemed so elusive out in the modern day constructs that I was more familiar with. Profound, life, spiritual life changing aspects and attributes. Old paths and old ways, the old gospel as it seemed so much more in-line with wha t I was only beginning to grasp at, that it was truly a heart matter through and through, that it was not something one could fake their way through, that the road was indeed narrow ...

And then to top it all off, here were men like Ravenhill who challenged me in profound ways also speaking in great appre ciation of men like ... Smith Wigglesworth? Uh oh ... now I have a conundrum and so the beginnings of "perhaps I may b e wrong .. after all". Stranger still was to find by these associations and reconsiderings all my wifes old books on the shelf. They had always been there but due to my upswing on the pendulum I had set about to ignore them. And go figure, aft er all this time here were many of the one and same things resourced on SI right on the shelf of my own office.

It threw me for a bit of a loop and caused me to become even more honest with myself over what I really knew, what was a presumption, what was taken at face value, in a clip or a comment when one side or the other was presenting their 'f acts'. Was it in context, was it an embellishment, did so and so really say such things, teach such things? Did the now d efenders\detractors take something and expand on it, develop it out, do a disservice to the author, teacher, preacher?

I was surprised by Wigglesworth. Most of the notions I had of him where those things that were detrimental of, critical of him. At the same time not everything was without some warrant or concern, still find those things that are of a concern. T here is this word.

#### **Enigmatically**

**ENIGMAT'ICALLY**, adv. In an obscure manner; in a sense different from that which the words in common acceptation i mply.

And prefer that definition here. There is no doubt in my mind that there are some very enigmatic personalities and I just do not know that Wigglesworth was such a one. Something I think we have to come to terms with is this tension and ofte n paradox with the saints. Think it was Paul West's warning about how we go about labeling those who are 'false' too ha phazardly. There are untold abuses from the likes of well known or more popular men in our day and I am not necessarily speaking of anyone in particular.

In a nutshell we must be fair and fair across the board. Not fair in compromise, but fair in honesty. And stay away from bl anket statements that are extreme, attempting to pit scripture against itself and each other rather bringing the whole to b ear upon it.

I've been wanting to make comment regarding certain believers' frequent and unhealthy infatuations with men like Wigglesworth and Lake and Maria Woodworth-Etter others who were used by God in the miraculous in the past century:

I have noticed that these ministries, although not necessarily dangerous in themselves, can often be like babes-in-Christ magnets to the detriment of the believer. What I mean to say is that the flash and fireworks of these ministries often attract immature believers to speak loftly and excitedly and try to emulate the men God used (to no avail), and at the same time, many of these belivers have no excitement to share when it comes to discussing matters of *intangible* holine ss (the things God *has* empowered them to do); that is, sober obedience to God in miracle-less, quiet prayer and readin g the Word and just walking the Christian walk daily.

Frankly, this is a concern. Babes just saved, or refusing to grow, often have the propensity to question why other ministri es and fellowships are not moving like Wigglesworth's and too often tally up the lack of miracles and signs and wonders thereof to apostasy and unbelief. This is a very true and hidden thing, and once in awhile it will come out if they are allow ed to preach or share ministry at a men's breakfast. They will point out: "Normal Christianity is like Wigglesworth. God w ants to use us all like Wigglesworth and we can do everything he did if we would just believe God. The reason we are no t raising the dead is because we have left our first love and grown too religious and organized and unbelieving."

This is the deceptive seed the enemy plants in them, though it appears on the surface to be very godly and wise and tru e. But it is not; it is a lie, the product of immature zeal without knowledge or discernment, much like a teenager in rebellio n to his parent's wiser counsel, thinking he knows all about life based on a Hollywood movie or his friends' influence or o wn self-crafted illusions of what life is. I've seen young believers rebel against older, wiser saints in much the same way - influenced by Wigglesworth and the things he did and how it everything he did must apply to everyone and every churc h or something is not right.

Wigglesworth, I believe was the real deal, but unfortunately the nature of his ministry attracts the unlearned and undiscip lined and ungrounded and very often corrupts, what is in fact, reality. It is a very dangerous thing when a person become s thwarted from holiness and humility and sobriety and is enchanted with the glimmer and glitter of merchandise which w as not, is not, and will not be his. I have not yet met one person who sings praises of Wigglesworth and exhorts the chur ch to "only believe" and do what he did...I have never seen or heard one of those people raise the dead themselves. All i t ever amounts to is talk, storytelling and campfire songs, but the campfire quickly dies out when we propose to substitut ue personal holiness and humility and decency for miracles. The discussion is over, the lore disenchanting, and the mira cle-less acclaimers of Wigglesworth suddenly become insulted.

Well, please grow up and face reality. God uses whomever He wishes to accomplish whatever it is He purposes in due s eason. Every miracle I have seen has been spontaneous and not worked up...and when it's over, it's over. We don't dwe II on it because there may be children listening. Those of us who watched the two-hour Ravenhill interview "Man of God" should notice how little he spoke of miracles, even though he was acquainted with the ministries of Wigglesworth and Jo hn Lake. He recognized them both as genuine men of God, but there it ended. Every miraculous incident he spoke of was in passing, and he had nothing positive at all to say about the "signs and wonders" fascination.

Brethen, this is a mature, discerning attitude to have. Give credence to miracles, but do not dwell on them. There is som ething even more miraculous than raising the dead; *it is Christ living in us* and the daily reckoning of ourselves dead in C hrist.

but to get to the point, i think Art Katz touches something here in this excerpt....

The account of Ananias and Sapphira in the Book of Acts is a remarkable episode of an incident that occurred in anothe r age, in an hour when the Spirit of God prevailed in such magnitude and purity that the very same act which might well be applauded today, resulted, in that day, in sudden judgment and death. By applauded, I mean that we do not ask ques tions about those who give great contributions to the Church, but instead, we give such a person a place of honor and a cknowledgement, a deacon at least, if not an elder. But the Church, which identified the lie and was not impressed with the sum, is not the Church of today.

It was the Church in its glory then, because it was alert to the issue of truth and deception, because it knew that before the Spirit of God manifests as the Spirit of power, He is first and foremost the Spirit of truth. When truth is disallowed, when truth is compromised, can we think that the dove is going to be around to perform the expressions of power that serve our needs and gratify our souls, if we have forsaken Him and His first designation and identity as the Spirit of truth? The ere needs to be a jealous regard for the truth that Peter exercised, enabling him to discern the fraud of a man and his wife giving a sum of money, however impressive, presenting it as the whole, though it was only in part.

But Peter said, Â"Ananias, why has Satan filled your heart to lie to the Holy Spirit, and to keep back some of the price of the land? While it remained unsold, did it not remain your own? And after it was sold, was it not under your control? Why is it that you have conceived this deed in your heart? You have not lied to men, but to God.Â"

And as he heard these words, Ananias fell down and breathed his last; and great fear came upon all who heard of it (Act s 5:3-5).

Almost in the next breath we read,

And at the hands of the apostles many signs and wonders were taking place among the people; and they were all with o ne accord in SolomonÂ's portico (Acts 5:12).

In other words, the respect for the Spirit of God as the Spirit of truth makes way for the Spirit of God as the Spirit of pow er. The contemporary Church has reversed it; we have celebrated the power, the signs, the wonders, and relegated the t ruth to a distant consideration, if indeed, any consideration at all. And which of us has not played the game of giving the part and making that to appear to be the whole?

There was a time when we used to say that the truth is the whole truth and nothing but the truth, or it is a lie. It is the whole truth, or it is not the truth. Any disqualification, any cutting of corners, anything less than what is whole and full converts what seems to be impressive into a lie. I take pains to dwell on this because it is a statement of the Church today; we have only given part, but we call that part the whole, when it is only a part. We have not the reticence, the modesty or the meekness appropriate to a Church whose Lord is the Lamb, because we are full of hype and exaggeration, pompous ambition and activity, and think that that constitutes the whole.

So we need to ask ourselves, are we doing anything different from what Ananias and Sapphira did when we seek and e xpect the evidence and power of a life totally given to God, while giving ourselves only in part, but presuming to have given ourselves wholly? We all want the semblance of these things, the comfort of the Spirit, the intimate communion, but we want it at the lesser price of acknowledging truth only in a doctrinal sense, or in the sense of being correct, rather than acknowledging truth as the very sum and substance of the reality of our lives. We want to speak truth, but not to be true; we want correct words, we want to acknowledge truth, but not to obey it. We are bringing our partial, phraseological truth and making that to stand for the whole, as if we have the reality that we are describing.

To decide to tolerate one deceit is to violate the whole truth. To be ninety-nine percent true, or mostly true, and represen t that as the whole truth is to lie utterly, and to sin in one part is to sin in the whole. It is where we are most tempted to ke

ep back for ourselves that the issue of truth really lays. What one truth, what one final issue, what one reserve is the thin g that keeps us back from that utterness towards God, that makes truth really the truth, and brings to the Church and to i ts fellowship the reality of His presence and His glory?

Just as the increased brightness of the da wning day's sun rises in the sky,so shall we shine brighter and brighter..for it is Him who shines within us.

The morning had arrived when the children and I were leaving our home on the high desert mesa in Taos N.M,embarkin g on a journey 1,000 miles west, to continue the work God had begun, healing me of my traumatic past, for the purpose of making it possible for me to walk in unconditional agape love towards all ,more consistently, for this was the desire of my Heavenly Father for me. Having me closer to my parents was expediant for this process to be expedited. To my suprise, nearby neighbors began to arrive in families greeting me with "How can I help?" I directed everyone as to what was going into the small Honda civic station wagon...and a small procession of belongings made it's way out of the underground solar home to place beside the vehicle...someone had even spread a tarp so as not to get things dirty. One man, a Sufi Moslem who's wife later returned to her true faith in Christ, Glory!..eyed the pile, the car and the three little ones...who'd lay on the bedlike arrangement I'd planned to make and announced, "You'll need a rack...I've got just the thing" Fixing the rack, deftly packing everything snugly in place, he took charge while others alternately helped or gave advise to me about how to proceed with the drive. All the rest fit inside perfectly...and with many hugs from my firends from various walks of life and a sheepish promise from their dad to "start doing his own home work...stop messing around with God...and get serious about becoming the good soil." He'd be joining us about 6 mos later...we drove off under a clear sky into a new adventure.

With 3 small children under 5..I knew that I'd be needing to stop often and be sensitive to when they needed to get out a nd play, stretch..run and shout...lest they become unhappy. We'd driven for a few hours and stopped in the big city the firs t day..staying overnight with a family we knew..artists who loved Jesus with all their hearts. The next day we'd started aft er noon and had just crossed the border into Arizona when I heard the children begin to fuss with one another, obviously becoming stretched by the enclosed space.. bored now with the small toys and puzzles, books and such that I'd supplied

to entertain. I had no real plan except to trust God for the moment by moment input He would give me as needed. All arou nd us as far as the eye could see was stretching desert, sage brush and small bluffs rising here and there across the hori zon, I checked on the map getting an idea where we were but no little towns seemed to be anywhere near. I thought well we could just stop on a large shoulder and go for a walk...we had food in the cooler. The voices in the back were becomin g more peevish...coming close to argumentative... the atmosphere in the car was fragile at best... something needed to hap pen to change the mood.. What should I do Lord? Nothing... not a hint. I cajoled the children as happily as I could.. but they were not feeling any better. I am not a great parent by any means.. for me to parent I always had to be looking to The Fat her for help... not once in the morning but for every differing moment, even on a normal day.. I could not lean on my own u nderstanding.. I was totally dependant upon Him, lest I become overwhelmed.. I asked again.. "Lord.. I know that we should 'nt ask you for a sign... but I need your help here.. I don't know what to do... I need you to show me a sign... something... any thing!"

Oh! How He gently leads those who are with young! And what a sense of humor our Gracious Father has..was He offen ded that I'd asked for a sign? Quite the contrary!

So I'm driving along and what do I see? An enormous sign.. billboard size..a sign with a huge painting of Jesus with His arms outstretched!

"How's that for a sign?" I hear in my spirit. This sign was advertising a church somewhere nearby...there was a town near by...could've fooled me..it must be hidden...but here was this sign inviting folks to come worship with them. I wondered ho w current the sign was and if this church still fellowshipped. I hear, "Get off on the upcoming offramp." I do that and drivin g down a small road, I see a market/gas station standing alone in an opening. "See that red truck?" I hear... I could see the pickup... "Now see the man walking towards the truck from the store?" Yes, I could see the man... "Now, pull alongside and ask him who painted the sign." I pulled alongside and said 'Hello...can you tell me who painted the big sign of Jesus that i s out on the highway?' He smiled and replied, 'Oh, sure... that would be my brother-in -law." and he went on to explain tha t it was his extended family who had the church that he then gave me directions so to help me find it.

Ok..we were cooking with gas now. Following the directions a few miles down the road I came upon a nicely built, modest church building and pulled into the driveway..as he'd mentioned there was no evidence that a service would be happenin g that evening..I believe it was Thursday..and it was getting on in the evening and there were no cars in the lot..but according to what I'd been told, the pastor and his family lived across the street..so I pulled into the yard that seemed to be clo sest to the church..moving slowly around the large circular drive, taking in the user friendly grounds, the barn and the gar den..the tools, shed and such..but no sign of life besides the chickens. It seemed awful quiet for a place with all those bicy cles and toys scattered about.

I heard,"They aren't home right now. Drive out and check the house next door." So I pulled back out onto the street..this time seeing an older man opening the passenger door of a car which was parked in front of the house next door parallel to the street..leaving the driveway free..I pulled into it..stuck my head out the window and called,"Pastor?"

So the children tumbled out of the car and we followed him inside.

His tall but stooped over wife greeted us cheerfully in the living room, asking us to pleas be seated and would we like a s oda..the children looked at me..normally sodas were out..too sweet...but they could share one between themselves..cup s where brought from the kitchen..she was obviously in pain, though was doing her best to hide this fact. I spoke of how God was leading me and why..of the sign and the leading from the store, they listened, smiling at the story and went off to discuss this alone, together. It was agreed that we would stay..but that because of her back she wouldn't be able to serve us dinner so they'd phoned next door, we would go over to the pastor's place now that they'd gotten home from errands.. where they'd agreed to serve us dinner along with their large and boisterous family..Great! With that settled, the pastoral couple asked if I would like a tour of the house and to see the room where I would be sleeping..they would make a bed in the living room for my two eldest. My nursing son would sleep with me. When I stepped into the bedroom where I would

d be sleeping I almost wept..there was an exact duplicate of the four poster canopy bed my mother had bought for me a s a girl with her babysitting money..same gold trim on white..wow..I felt the presence of the Lord in that room..these peo ple were so gentle, so sweet. The bed seemed like a special touch somehow.

It is generally supposed, that the prophet Joel blends two subjects of affliction in one general consideration, or beautiful allegory; and that, under the devastation to be produced by locusts in the vegetable world, he portrays the more distant calamities to be inflicted by the armies of the Chaldeans in their invasion of Judea.

These predictions are followed by a more general denunciation of God's vengeance, delivered in such language as to be in some measure descriptive of the final judgment of mankind.

The prophet intermingles these declarations with earnest exhortations to repentance, and with promises of returning prosperity productive of Gospel blessings; foretelling, in the clearest terms, the general effusion of the Holy Spirit under the Christian dispensation, and the awful consequences of obstinately rejecting the sacred influence, especially to the Jews. The state of this nation at the present day, fully attests the Divine inspiration of the prophecy.

No, not the way 'Jesus shall reig	it was before the fall in the sense which I believe you mean - because as Isaac Watts puts it in his hymn ${\sf n'}$ -

Blessings abound wherever He reigns; The prisoner leaps to lose his chains; The weary find eternal rest, And all the sons of want are blessed.

Where He displays His healing power, Death and the curse are known no more: In Him the tribes of Adam boast More blessings than their father lost.

As I submitted my earlier post, I was aware our bodies do have to die physically, because of the fall, and we are not pres erved from making that last crossing of Jordan into immortality; but, there is no doubt from the ministry Jesus exercised, and commanded the disciples to exercise, that the proclamation of the full gospel includes physical healing as well as sp iritual, and that that physical healing is a gift from God that He Himself be glorified in the earth, and that mankind would experience peace from the corruption which the fall wreaked upon flesh, in whatever form.

Many people simply need to receive healing, before they will understand enough about God to turn to Him for their spirit ual needs. I do believe there is nothing anti-scriptural about believing God for the maximum outpouring of His life and p ower in this area. He is not interested in games with power, but in its honest and right use, that men and women who ar e made in His image should be released from all bondage, to serve Him. This includes (in God's mind, I believe), our ph ysical bodies functioning as He designed - not all bowed down under sickness. I think a lot about this, because as I get older, I frequently ask Him to heal me physically, of any disease process which threatens to stop me finishing my course with joy. I hate the idea that in Him is all fulness, and I could choose a thought process which causes me not to benefit f rom the outworking of that fulness - His fulness.

I think some Christians, even, look on 'serving God' as some kind of penalty. That when Paul said 'I, a prisoner of the Lo rd', he was being a bit melodramatic, instead of realising that he said that because he was glad to be a prisoner of the L ord, rather than a prisoner of sin. They would much rather be doing their own thing. But that is not what we are being sa ved for. We are being saved because it pleases Him to bring sons to glory, and He has been here to show us how to do that.

Part 2

By His Stripes Are We Healed?

There is a popular teaching today, especially amongst Pentecostals and Charismatics, that Christ on the cross took upon Himself all our diseases and, subsequently, all physically afflicted believers, through the exercise of personal faith in this "truth," may realize a divine healing. However, what must be honestly and seriously considered is if this teaching is Biblically based or not.

"All Scripture is inspired by God and profitable for TEACHING, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness; th at the man of God may be adequate, equipped for every good work" (Tim. 3:16-17).

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Does Scripture support the doctrine that at the cross Christ took upon Himself our diseases to the effect that if a Christia n conjures up enough faith or the right faith-formula the reality of Christ's work on the cross will be invoked and he will be healed of physical afflictions? Let's take a look:

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The Scriptural basis for this doctrine is the well known Isaiah chapter 53, verse four:

4 "Surely our griefs (or, sickness) He Himself bore, and our sorrows (or, pain) He carried; yet we ourselves esteemed Hi m stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted.

An Apostolic Teaching?

Interestingly, only Matthew references Isa. 53:4 and it is important to recognize that he applies it not to Christ's suffering and atoning death on the cross, but only to His healing ministry to national Israel (see Matt. 8:17).

Isaiah 53 starts out by describing One who was to grow up before God like a tender shoot, not stately or attractive, despi sed and forsaken, a man of sorrows (pains) and acquainted with grief (sickness). Still describing this One he goes on to say in verse four, "surely our griefs (sicknesses, with which this One was acquainted) He Himself bore."

Matthew, when referencing verse four, employs the Greek word "bastazo" for "bore." It means to carry as a burden, such as to bear one another's burdens. And so Matthew is saying that Jesus, according to His mercy and the power of God, being acquainted with Israel's sicknesses, and as their Messiah (see Lk. 7:18-23), healed their sick and demon-possessed (Matt. 8:16-17). No mention of this being a work of atonement on Christ's cross.

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#### Biblical Facts:

- 1. None of the N.T. writers reference Isa. 53:4 to the atoning work of Christ on the cross.
- 2. Luke does not reference Isa. 53:4 as being fulfilled when Paul healed many Gentiles on his missionary journeys.
- 3. None of the writers of the New Testament Epistles teach the doctrine that Christ took upon Himself our diseases on the cross and, subsequently, based on this act, by faith, we may claim physical healings.

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Isaiah's Suffering Servant

Isaiah does not address the DEATH of the suffering Servant until verse five:

5 "But He was pierced through for our transgressions, He was crushed for our iniquities; the chastening for our well-bein g fell upon Him, and by His scourging we are healed."

Here Isaiah states that He was pierced through "for our transgressions" and "crushed for our iniquities."

"But the Lord has caused the iniquity of us all to fall on Him" (vs.6b)

This is atonement language. It is dealing with transgressions and iniquities. Disease is not the issue nor is it mentioned. A Guilt Offering

"But the Lord was pleased to crush Him, putting Him to grief; if He would render Himself a guilt offering." (vs. 10a)
A "guilt offering" has to do with sins, not disease. Unlike sin, disease is not a moral issue between man and God requirin g the death of His Son.

"Yet He Himself bore the sin of many, and interceded for the transgressors" (vs. 12b).

The sacrificial death of Christ dealt with man's sins. "For the wages of sin is death." Some may acquire disease because

of a sinful lifestyle, however, it is sin that separates man from God, not disease:

"For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Rom. 3:23).

"But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners (not diseased ones), Christ died for us " (Rom. 5:8).

Scripture reveals it was reconciliation with God that was provided for the sinner through Christ's work on the cross: "But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us. Much more then, h aving now been justified by His blood, we shall be saved from the wrath of God through Him. For if while we were enemi es, we were reconciled to God through the death of His Son, much more, having been reconciled we shall be saved by His life" (Rom. 5:8-10).

It is sin that made Adam's posterity "ungodly" - not disease. His shed blood justifies the ungodly through faith and guara ntees our safekeeping from the future wrath of God.

The Consequence...Not The Cause

Disease is a consequence of man's fall in the Garden, however, nowhere is it Biblically taught that man's diseases were atoned for through the death and shed blood of Jesus Christ. His death and shed blood were to adjudicate the moral iss ue centered around man's sinful state acquired through Adam and the individual's personal sins.

"..and He Himself bore our sins (not diseases) in His body on the cross, that we might die to sin and live to righteousnes s; for by His stripes we are healed" (1 Pet. 2:24).

Notice Peter references "by His stripes we are healed" to "sin" and the believer subsequently living to righteousness. Ac cording to Scripture, physical healings are not based on the sacrifice of Christ on the cross, but on the power/will of God according to His grace/mercy. That is why when sinners believe in Christ they are, at that time, pardoned forever of sins but are not instantly healed of all diseases.

Miraculous healings and other miracles attested to the veracity of the Apostolic message after the ascension of Christ, b ut the Apostolic message never taught Christ bore our diseases on the cross.

#### Muddy the Waters

A popular talk radio host, Hank Hanegraaff, often repeats an adage that "healing was in the atonement but not guarante ed." Two immediate problems that arise from his cliche are (1) by that statement, though Mr. Hanegraaff does not teach that Christ bore or diseases on the cross, nevertheless, he agrees with the erroneous notion that disease is a moral obst acle between God and man requiring the blood sacrifice of Christ which, as shown above, has absolutely no Biblical sup port; and (2) if one may suggest that healing is "in the atonement" but "not guaranteed," then why couldn't one just as ea sily claim forgiveness of sins is in the atonement but not guaranteed?

Probably Mr. Hanegraaff is suggesting that because of the atonement of Christ God will eventually bring in the eternal st ate of righteousness where sickness and disease will not exist. This is true. However the absence of physical infirmities in the eternal state is not because "healing was in the atonement," but because those reconciled to God and redeemed from sin through faith in Christ and His finished work on the cross on their behalf will then be existing in their glorified bodies. A gracious, creative act of God, not a "healing" act of God based on Christ's atoning blood sacrifice for diseases.

Lastly it should be pointed out that all of Christ's healings were accomplished before He went to the cross. It is never tau ght or even suggested in Scripture that Christ was morally righteous to heal Israel's physical afflictions because the cross was anticipated. He never said to those whom He healed, "your disease has been atoned for." Nor should we!

# Judge Not Lest Ye Be Judged!

by John Duncan

The most misquoted verse in the Bible is probably Matthew 7:1, "Judge not that ye be not judged." We hear this verse m ultiple times a day. At Troy State University in Alabama, a professor we met even said that it was one of the Ten Comma ndments. Too often we have heard sincere, misinformed Christians and unbelievers alike say, "I donÂ't want to judge an ybody, but..." Ironically, the one who screams "judge not" is often the one passing judgment on you!

LetÂ's See What the Bible Really Says About Judging:

"The mouth of the righteous speaketh wisdom, and his tongue talketh of judgment." (Psa 37:30)

"With my lips have I declared all the judgments of thy mouth." (Psa 119:13)

"Open thy mouth, judge righteously, and plead the cause of the poor and needy." (Prov 31:9)

Jesus commended Simon, "Thou hast rightly judged." (Luke 7:43)

"Now, thou son of man, wilt thou judge, wilt thou judge the bloody city? yea, thou shalt show her all her abominations." (Ezek 22:2)

"But he that is spiritual judgeth all things, yet he himself is judged of no man." (1 Cor 2:15)

"Do ye not know that the saints shall judge the world? and if the world shall be judged by you, are ye unworthy to judge the smallest matters?" (1 Cor 6:2)

"Know ye not that we shall judge angels? how much more things that pertain to this life?" (1 Cor 6:3)

There are many other passages and verses in the Bible about judging. While God is our ultimate Judge, He has also commanded us to judge according to the Word of God.

According to the WebsterÂ's Dictionary, to judge means "to discern, to distinguish, to form an opinion, to compare facts

or ideas, and perceive their agreement or disagreement, and thus to distinguish truth from falsehood." Therefore, when y ou say that your neighbor is a "good person," you are passing a judgment (forming an opinion) just as much as when yo u say that the thief is a "bad person."

If there were no judgment...

All the prisons would be empty and thieves, serial killers, drug dealers, rapists, and murderers would be loose in your nei ghborhood.

You could not discipline your children and teach them not to steal, lie, do drugs, or give in to peer pressure.

School could not be mandated (by parents or govt) but if children did attend, they could not be evaluated as to their progress. Everyone should graduate regardless of their advance. Students could not be graded or disciplined.

You could not judge any false doctrine and would have to allow it to be taught from your churchÂ's pulpit ("discerning" is the same thing as "judging").

You should leave your children with anyone who said was qualified to be a baby-sitter. You should not bother to check hi s/her background. Later, you should not be upset if this baby-sitter turned out to be a child-molester, because "thou shalt not judge."

You should marry anyone that asked. You shouldnÂ't worry about his/her character or beliefs. What if he beats you up? What if she runs around on you? You shouldnÂ't get so mad because "thou shalt not judge."

Hopefully you can see the folly of such silly doctrine by now. The devil has been successful to push the church further a nd further into a corner, while everyone else comes out of the closet with their sins. Most often, those who tell you "not to judge" them do so because they are either hiding something or want to continue doing it without reaping negative effects for it. In the campuses where we have been, students say that we shouldnÂ't judge (form an opinion of) fornicators, drun kards, liars, homosexuals, or the like. However, they fail to realize that sin harms them and their neighbors. A caring, loving Christian will judge all situations according to the Word of God and call sinners to repentance.

The church has become intimidated by the opinions of the world as they scream, "You religious bigots, hatemongers, an d intolerant people (which are judgments in themselves), do not judge me!" However, God clearly commands us to judge so we wonÂ't be deceived. Why would the command to judge be so vehemently attacked in society? Obviously, if the ch urch stops judging and using our common sense, we will no longer be able to distinguish good from evil, we will buy into the politically correct idea of moral relativism (whatÂ's good for you may not be good for me), and we will bow down to the devilÂ's wishes to deceive us, our family, and our friends.

Even more disturbing is to see church leadership saying, "do not judge." Many pastors lead their sheep astray and keep them under their manipulative control by telling them that they have a "critical spirit," they are "prideful," or "judgemental, " while all they are trying to do is to discern the truth. If you find yourself in such a church, FLEE for your (spiritual) life!

Now letÂ's take a look at the famous verse that is so misquoted today and put it in its PROPER context. If we are intelle ctually honest when looking at this passage, we will find that it is actually teaching us to judge, not to refrain from judging! We have inserted a few comments in brackets.

Mat 7:1-5 "Judge not, that ye be not judged . For with what judgment ye judge, ye shall be judged: and with what measur e ye mete, it shall be measured to you again . And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but consider est not the beam that is in thine own eye? Or how wilt thou say to thy brother, Let me pull out the mote out of thine eye; and, behold, a beam is in thine own eye? Thou hypocrite , first cast out the beam out of thine own eye; and then shalt t hou see clearly to cast out the mote out of thy brother's eye .

Other misquoted Scriptures:

Romans 14:3-10. This is about dietary preferences, things that are not essential to salvation.

Romans 2:1-3. We have the same scenario of Mat. 7. We should not judge others if we are guilty of the same things. We must first clean up our own lives through repentance and faith, then we are qualified to judge others.

James 4:11 says that we are not to speak evil of other "brethren" -- those who are obediently doing the will of God (Mat 12:50). This does not apply to those living in willful sin.

How Are We to Judge?

1. We are to judge righteously. Jesus commands in John 7:24, "Judge not according to the appearance, but judge righteous judgment."

Judge by the Word of God and Its principles, not by someoneÂ's skin color, whether they are tall or short (inherited physical traits), etc.

2. We are to judge without hypocrisy. "And thinkest thou this, O man, that judgest them which do such things, and doest the same, that thou shalt escape the judgment of God?" (Rom 2:3)

Judge yourself first to see if you are guilty of that sin. Live what you preach. Only after you get your life cleaned up by tur ning from your sins and receiving pardon through repentance and faith in Jesus (i.e. you get saved) you can go and help others to be saved too.

Why Doctrine Matters By R. Albert Mohler, Jr. Tue, Sep. 18 2007

The 20th century witnessed an increasingly energetic revolt against doctrine. A denial of specific formulations of classica I Christian doctrine has been evident in some quarters, while others have rejected the very notion of doctrine itself.

Enlarge this Image Doctrine has even fallen on hard times even among those who call themselves evangelicals. Some e vangelical historians now argue that the defining principles of evangelical identity are not specifically theological – at le ast beyond the most general affirmations. If true, that judgment would be a disgrace to any people of God. As it is, howe ver, evangelicals have a proud doctrinal heritage and have historically given careful attention to confessions of faith and doctrinal issues.

Doctrine is, quite literally, the teaching of the church—what the church understands to be the substance of its faith. It is no substitute for personal experience. Evangelical Christians have given clear witness to the necessity of personal faith in Jesus Christ, but that personal faith is based in some specific understanding of who Jesus Christ is and what He accomplished on the cross. After all, we do not call persons to profess faith in faith, but faith in Christ.

There is no Christianity "in general." Faith in some experience devoid of theological or biblical content—no matter how p owerful—is not New Testament Christianity. Those called to Christianity in general may believe nothing in particular. But faith resides in particulars.

Some churches seem to think that doctrine is a concern for those of a certain intellectual bent, but unnecessary for most Christians. Interest in doctrine amounts to something like an intellectual hobby. Others steer clear of doctrine for fear of argument or division in the church. Both factors indicate a lack of respect for the Christian believer and an abdication of the teaching function of the church.

Those who sow disdain and disinterest in biblical doctrine will reap a harvest of rootless and fruitless Christians. Doctrin e is not a challenge to experiential religion; it testifies to the content of that experience. The church is charged to call per sons to Christ and to root them in a mature knowledge of Christian faith.

Sociologists and historians observing the American church scene indicate that one of the first signs of denominational d ecline is a lessening of doctrinal attention. Many mainline Protestant denominations have followed this course, with a we akening concern for biblical doctrine followed by decline in membership and evangelistic outreach.

Yet, evangelicals should not recapture a healthy concern for biblical doctrine merely as a means of avoiding organizatio nal or congregational decline. We must do so because nothing less is worthy of a New Testament people. The essential issue for the church is faithfulness.

Churches lacking an intentional and effective program of doctrinal instruction risk becoming the company of the confuse d. Charles Spurgeon told the painful story of the Irishman who attended a sectarian religious society meeting. Telling of t he meeting, the man recounted: "Oh, it was lovely: none of us knew anything and we all taught each other."

American evangelicals must curb the decline of doctrinal concern in our midst and recapture the teaching responsibility of the church. Doctrine without piety is dead, but piety without doctrine is immature at best, and inauthentic at worst. Fait hful Christians are always concerned with the development of true Christian piety and discipleship in believers. Yet, as J ohn A. Broadus commented over a century ago, doctrinal truth is "the lifeblood of piety."

Those who call for a "doctrineless Christianity" misunderstand–or misrepresent–both doctrine and Christianity. Pragm atism and program concerns dominate the lives of many Christians and their congregations. The low state of doctrinal understanding among so many evangelicals is evidence of a profound failure of both nerve and conviction. Both must be recovered if there is to be anything even remotely evangelical about the evangelicalism of the future.

On the contrary, everyone is judged. I am well fed up with this idea that some sisters think they can argue like men until t hey are called on it and then revert back to being feminine and unsheathe a "How dare you" mindset for doing so. If you cannot stand the heat, get out of the kitchen.

But it goes further than this and applies more broadly. Over and over again these discussions are not discussions at all but debates of the wrong sort and the wrong spirit. It was brought up recently the matter of a 'critical spirit', it is that and yet it is more. It is at the same time an unwillingness to suffer perceived wrong and lack of any spiritual backbone that ca nnot, will not accept correction or even dare say criticism. The abundance of defending, 'self-defense' is more grievous t han the 'offense' presumably given in the first place.

What appears to be the greatest blight upon many of us is that we will just not become truly honest about matters. We can be more hypocritical spiritually than we know or will frankly admit to.

This may be a bit confusing to others not privy to some of the recent upheaval that had some offended and leaving this c onfine but I want to set some matters clear here. Even in the midst of

the imaginative accusations and insinuations which by attempting to defend would only perpetrate more and more of the same, namely confusion and strife there is a refusal to defend any of it. If there is anything lacking and a constant irritant from 5 years of observation here it is the withholding of confession. Where many of us err is in attempting to force one. I may be the most guilty of all in these attempts.

So who is haughty, obstinate and proud? Why it is me myself! I wouldn't dare to speak of it if I didn't have a well to draw from and a certain measure of experience to even attempt to speak from.

We need to face some hard truths about ourselves and our opinions and our ability to receive correction from each other . John Alexander Dowie Â-

Dowie was an apostle who didnÂ't have the complete understanding of that office. The anointing he carried pierced the r eligious theocracies of his day, but there were few who understood him, including himself. As a result, he misunderstood several administrations that came with the passion of his office. One passion was in the area of politics.

DowieÂ's leadership was gaining a strong national influence. So seeing his potential and knowing his stand, the Temera nce Society asked him to run for Parliament. At first, he opposed the idea. But he later changed his mind, thinking he could possibly influence more in the political arena and decided to enter the race.

But Dowie suffered a sound defeat in the elections. The local newspapers that had been so damaged by his ministry wa ged an all-out attack against him. The politicians and alcoholic beverage industry paid untold amounts of money to see h im slandered and defeated. After the election, Dowie had wounded his church, and disgraced his ministry.

Dowie was moved by such strong spiritual yearnings that the sought to fulfill them in the natural. I can only speculate why he made this move. It could have been because the church world wasnÂ't grasping the truth fast enough to satisfy him. Whatever his reason, he misread the timing and plan of God for his ministry.

We need to understand that God has a central point from which every aspect of our lives operate, whether individually or corporately. That area is called "timing". From the operation of that one word, lives can move forward with God or be hindered. Nations can advance spiritually, or regress. Life in the spirit realm has timing to it just as life in the natural. The refore, it is vitally important for us to follow the leading or our spirit. We must lean that itÂ's not always right to move into action because it seems like the thing to do. This kind of obedience only comes from season of prayer and intercession.

Politicians and the political arena have never changed the world, church wise or governments-wise. Only a people whos e hearts are changed by the Gospel can transform civil laws and regulations. Politics are meant for compromise to pleas e people as a whole. The apostolic office presents the Word of the Lord, and then it is up to the people to conform to an d follow it. The apostolic and political donÂ't mix. Dowie with his calling, should have never resorted to a political lifestyle

While campaigning for office, Dowie also neglected his commandment to preach divine healing. He simply steered away from his calling to pursue a personal goal, thinking he could reach a greater mass of people. And as a result, the rest of his time in Australia was spent in darkness and futility.

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# Smith Wigglesworth Â-

Seeking God with all his heart to experience this "baptism in the Holy Spirit", Smith went to a local Salvation Army bui lding to pray. Three times he was struck to the floor by the power of God. The Salvationists warned him against speakin g in tongues, but Smith was determined to know God in this realm. Four days he sought the Lord expecting to speak in o ther tongues, but to no avail. Finally, discouraged in his spirit, he felt it was time to return to Bradford. But before his dep arture, he went to the parsonage to tell the vicarÂ's wife, Mrs. Boddy, good-bye. He told her that he had to go home and didnÂ't get to speak in tongues. She answered, "It is not the tongues you need, but the baptism". Smith asked her to I ay hands on him before he left. She prayed a simple but powerful prayer, and then left the room. It was then that the fire

fell. Bathed in the power and glory of the Lord, Smith saw a vision of the empty cross with Jesus exalted at the right han d of the Father. Filled with worship and praise, Smith opened his mouth and began to speak in other tongues, finally real izing that even though he had received an anointing earlier, he was now baptized in the Holy Spirit as one the day of Pentecost.

Instead of going home, Smith went straight to the church where Rev Boddy was conducting the service. Interrupting, he begged to speak for a moment. When he finished his "sermon" fifty people were gloriously baptized in the Holy Spirit and spoke with other tongues. The local newspaper, the Sunderland Daily Echo, headlined the meeting, giving detailed accounts of SmithÂ's experience, including the tongues and the healings. He telegraphed his home, telling them of the g reat news.

#### **Another Secret**

Smith Wigglesworth was a man greatly moved by compassion. As he received prayer requests from all over the world he would cry out to God and weep on their behalf. Many times, as he ministered to the afflicted, tears ran down his cheek s. He was also very tender with children and the elderly. In his services, when the heat became stifling, he felt great compassion and would call for the babies and the elderly to be prayed for first.

Demonstrating the truths in Acts 19:11-12, thousands upon thousands were healed by Smith prayer and sent handkerch iefs to those he couldnÂ't visit. An intimate friend spoke of the sincerity and compassion portrayed by Smith, saying, Â" WhenÂ...the time for the opening of the letters came, we all had to stop whatever we were doing and get under the burd en. There was nothing rushed or slipshod about his methodsÂ.... Everybody in the house must join in the prayers and la y hands on the handkerchiefs sent out to the suffering ones. They were treated as though the writers were present in per son.

# Aimee Semple McPherson Â-

While Aimee was in Baltimore a national healing campaign began. Incredible and highly unusual miracles occurred. The headlines screamed the results of each meeting.

It has been said that when Aimee would enter the hall before a meeting, there were often throngs of desperately ill peopl e seeking to touch her. And that when she saw them, she would run back overwhelmed into her dressing room to pray f or GodÂ's help.

Everywhere Aimee went, crowds pressed in to touch her. She would watch in regret as the police were forced to bolt the doors in trying to protect her.

After a while, when she closed her eyes at night, all she could see was the seventeen hundred people who were packed into a place that was built to hold a thousands. She would see the alters and basements overflowing with the sick and w ould wake up thinking of how Jesus had dealt with al this.

Robert traveled extensively, but corresponded regularly with Aimee throughout the winter. Then in the early spring of 19 08, Robert returned to Ingersoll and proposed to her. In fact, he proposed to Aimee in the same house in which she rece ived the baptism a few months earlier. Six months later on August 12, 1908, Aimee married Robert in her familyÂ's farm house near Salford, Ontario.

Aimee would not finish high school because of her love for Semple. In fact, she left behind everything in order to love, ho nor, and obey her new husband. Robert was all she needed for a fulfilled and enriching life.

HE WAS MY THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY, she would later write, "my spiritual mentor, and my tender, patient, unfailing lover."

Before their marriages, Aimee and Robert had convinced her parents that speaking in other tongues was scriptural. But i took much more to convince Minnie of GodÂ's will concerning the coupleÂ's call to China.

In preparation for their trip, Robert worked in a factory by day and preached by night. Soon, his ministry took them to Lo ndon, Ontario, where they ministered in homes.

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# Kathryn Kuhlmn Â-

The moment Kathryn saw in GodÂ's Word that healing was provided for the believer at the same as salvation, she began to understand the ChristianÂ's relationship with the Holy Spirit. In 1947 she began teaching a series on the Holy Spirit. Some of the things she said during the first night of her teaching were revelations even to her. Later she spoke of being awake all that night, praying and reading more in the Word.

The second night of her meeting was a momentous occasion. A unique testimony had been given by someone who was healed in a Kathryn Kuhlman meeting. A women stood up and told of having been healed while Kathryn preached the night before. Without anyone laying hands on her and without Kathryn even being aware of what was happening, this wo men was healed of a tumor. The women had gone to her doctor to confirm her healing before the evening service.

In 1950, a worldwide ministry began to develop. In later years, Kathryn said that God didnÂ't call her to build a church, m aintaing that her ministry was not to be isolated to any one building. Some may be called to build buildings, but she was nÂ't one of those.

The fact that she did build churches was largely overshadowed by the publicity of the miracle services. The Kathryn Kuhl man Foundation, established in Pittsburgh, financed more than twenty churches in foreign mission fields with nationals a s pastors.

Many called her Â'pastorÂ' out of love and respect, but Kathryn was never ordained to the office of pastor. After her stay in Denver, she never pastured a church. Kathryn said she was not called to a five-fold office, (i.e., Ephesians 4:11) She walked in the simplicity of being a Â"a handmaidenÂ" of the Lord.

It is said by those closest to her, that Kathryn announced at the very beginning of her ministry, that she would be the nex t Aimee Semple McPherson, founder of the Four Square denomination. Aimee was definitely KathrynÂ's role model. Wh en the flamboyant Â"SisterÂ" built Angelus Temple in Los Angeles, Kathryn was present during itÂ's highest popularity. It is said that Kathryn attended AimeeÂ's Bible School, and sat in the balcony of her church, taking in every aspect of the anointed messages and theatrics of Â"SisterÂ". Unlike the other L.I.F.E Bible School students, Kathryn chose not to stay with the Four Square denomination. She chose an independent route.

Why not of a first instance apply the more highly likely attribute that I myself may have it all wrong? I must consider this even here, at all times. It's not "don't judge me", but please do! There are many people like them today who make vows to God in time s of a great crisis in their lives. But they fail to keep their vows and in the end they become spiritually bankrupt. Blessed is the man who will swear to his own hurt and change not; who keeps the vow he has made to God; who is willing to lay his all at God's feet. The man who does this never becomes a lean soul. God has promised to "make fat his bones." The re is no dry place for such a man; he is always fat and flourishing, and he becomes stronger and stronger. It pays to trus t God with all and to make no reservation.

I wish I could make you see how great a God we have. Ananias and Sapphira were really doubting God and were questi oning whether this work that He had begun would go through. It seems I left a few gaps in my thesis! Let me clarify while still trying to keep this simple.

Of course, love and compassion are essential ingredients in the prayer of faith - for whomever - and most especially for one's own family in the ordinary run of living. But your original post picked up the quote where Wigglesworth mentions changing faith - from his faith to God's faith.

I was suggesting, with regard to his wife and son, that no matter how much <u>he</u> loved them, and believed with <u>his</u> own fait h for their being raised from the dead, <u>if</u> God did not supply <u>His</u> faith, they could not be raised. And, being so *desirous* of God's faith and loving so much as a man, that God did not rush in with *His* faith to make up the difference (lack on Smith 's part), may not have been an option Wigglesworth was able to consider at the time he was praying, until it became clear that God was not backing him up.

This is not even a criticism of Wigglesworth, who understood that unless he prayed into a situation, God was immobilise

d from acting. He simply *had* to pray for his family - regardless of whether it was God's will to raise them or not... He found out God's will, by default.

Here is the scripture which accords with Smith's hope they would be raised.

Matthew 10:8

Heal the sick, cleanse the lepers, raise the dead, cast out devils: freely ye have received, freely give.

(Acts 26:8

Why should it be thought a thing incredible with you, that God should raise the dead?)

I hope this focus helps you see the single point I was trying to make.

In every case, I believe we should pray according to and only according to, God's will. Are we always clear in our <u>minds</u> before we start to pray? Not every time. Getting Into God's Stride

"Enoch walked with God." Genesis 5:24

The test of a man's religious life and character is not what he does in the exceptional moments of life, but what he does in the ordinary times, when there is nothing tremendous or exciting on. The worth of a man is revealed in his attitude to o rdinary things when he is not before the footlights (cf. John 1:36). It is a painful business to get through into the stride of God, it means getting your second wind spiritually. In learning to walk with God there is always the difficulty of getting int o His stride; but when we have got into it, the only characteristic that manifests itself is the life of God. The individual man is lost sight of in his personal union with God, and the stride and the power of God alone are manifested.

It is difficult to get into stride with God, because when we start walking with Him we find He has outstripped us before we have taken three steps. He has different ways of doing things, and we have to be trained and disciplined into His ways. It was said of Jesus - "He shall not fail nor be discouraged," because He never worked from His own individual standpoin to but always from the standpoint of His Father, and we have to learn to do the same. "One day I went up into the mountain to pray. I had a wonderful day. It was one of the high mountains of Wales. I heard of one man going up this mountain to pray, and the Spirit of the Lord met him so wonderfully that his face shone like that of an angel when he returned. Every one in the village was talking about it. As I went up to this mountain and spent the d ay in the presence of the Lord, His wonderful power seemed to envelop and saturate and fill me.

Two years before this time there had come to our house two lads from Wales. They were just ordinary lads, but they bec ame very zealous for God. They came to our mission and saw some of the works of God. They said to me, "We would n ot be surprised if the Lord brings you down to Wales to raise our Lazarus." They explained that the leader of their assem bly was a man who had spent his days working in a tin mine and his nights preaching, and the result was that he had col lapsed, gone into consumption, and for four years he had been a helpless invalid, having to be fed with a spoon.

While I was up on that mountain top I was reminded of the transfiguration scene, and I felt that the Lord's only purpose in taking us into the glory was to fit us for greater usefulness in the valley.

Tongues and Interpretation; "The living God has chosen us for His divine inheritance, and He it is who is preparing us for our ministry, that it may be of God and not of man."

As I was on the mountain top that day, the Lord said to me, "I want you to go and raise Lazarus." I told the brother who a ccompanied me of this, and when we got down to the valley, I wrote a postcard: "When I was up on the mountain prayin g today, God told me that I was to go and raise Lazarus." I addressed the postcard to the man in the place whose name had been given to me by the two lads. When we arrived at the place we went to the man to whom I had addressed the c ard. He looked at me and said, "Did you send this?" I said, "Yes." He said, "Do you think we believe in this? Here, take it

#### ." And he threw it at me.

The man called a servant and said, "Take this man and show him Lazarus." Then he said to me, "The moment you see him you will be ready to go home. Nothing will hold you." Everything he said was true from the natural viewpoint. The man was helpless. He was nothing but a mass of bones with skin stretched over them. There was no life to be seen. Everything in him spoke of decay.

I said to him, "Will you shout? You remember that at Jericho the people shouted while the walls were still up. God has lik e victory for you if you will only believe." But I could not get him to believe. There was not an atom of faith there. He had made up his mind not to have anything.

It is a blessed thing to learn that God's word can never fail. Never hearken to human plans. God can work mightily when you persist in believing Him in spite of discouragements from the human standpoint. When I got back to the man to who m I had sent the post-card, he asked, "Are you ready to go now?"

I am not moved by what I see. I am moved only by what I believe. I know this-no man looks at appearances if he believe s. No man considers how he feels if he believes. The man who believes God has it. Every man who comes into the Pent ecostal condition can laugh at all things and believe God. There is something in the Pentecostal work that is different fro m anything else in the world. Somehow, in Pentecost, you know that God is a reality. Wherever the Holy Ghost has right of way, the gifts of the Spirit will be in manifestation; and where these gifts are never in manifestation, I question whether He is present. Pentecostal people are spoiled for anything else than Pentecostal meetings. We want none of the entertain nments that the churches are offering. When God comes in He entertains us Himself. Entertained by the King of kings a nd Lord of lords! O, it is wonderful.

There were difficult conditions in that Welsh village, and it seemed impossible to get the people to believe. "Ready to go home?" I was asked. But a man and a woman there asked us to come and stay with them. I said, "I want to know how m any of you people can pray." No one wanted to pray. I asked if I could get seven people to pray with me for the poor ma n's deliverance. I said to the two people who were going to entertain us, "I will count on you two, and there is my friend a nd myself, and we need three others." I told the people that I trusted that some of them would awaken to their privilege a nd come in the morning and join us in prayer for the raising of Lazarus. It will never do to give way to human opinions. If God says a thing, you are to believe it.

I told the people that I would not eat anything that night. When I got to bed it seemed as if the devil tried to place on me everything that he had placed on that poor man in the bed. When I awoke I had a cough and all the weakness of a tuber cular patient. I rolled out of bed on to the floor and cried out to God to deliver me from the power of the devil. Good post, Brothertom. I, too, was once enamored with Wigglesworth and his audacious feats of boisterous faith. I believe God used Smith to drop clerical jaws and confound the wise cloth. The ministry of Smith Wigglesworth today has an amazing magnetism on young believers; and in particular on those not yet beyond the spellbinding awe of outward manifestions and who are disproportionately preoccupied with miracles to the detriment of quiet, sober, grounded and unassuming faith in the inner workings of the Holy Spirit.

If not careful, Wigglesworth can morph into mythical being - a centaur of man and miracle - where the focus can shift to the feats God did through him rather than the God who did the feats. In most scenarios, however, the focus tends to settle on Smith himself as *God's General*, and the mythical awe professed by the believer can easily eclipse the fact that Wigglesworth was, in fact, a man sometimes without a healthy, balanced regard to certain things in the Word of God.

There's a story told by Lester Sumrall of Smith refusing to bless the dinner of a certain fellowship, because someone bro ught a pork roast. He raised his hands and cried, "O God how can I bless that which you have cursed, this foul pig..."

It's pretty shocking that a man so mightily used by God in the miraculous can have such a seemingly limited revelation of the New Covenant. This is partially why the riches and wisdom of our God are so unsearchable. Yes, Wigglesworth was fearless, but he was also unwise in a few areas - areas, I believe, of no less importance in the Kingdom of God than the working of miracles.

They came to our mission and saw some of the works of God. They said to me, "We would n ot be surprised if the Lord brings you down to Wales to raise our Lazarus." They explained that the leader of their assem bly was a man who had spent his days working in a tin mine and his nights preaching, and the result was that he had col lapsed, gone into consumption, and for four years he had been a helpless invalid, having to be fed with a spoon.

While I was up on that mountain top I was reminded of the transfiguration scene, and I felt that the Lord's only purpose in taking us into the glory was to fit us for greater usefulness in the valley.

Tongues and Interpretation; "The living God has chosen us for His divine inheritance, and He it is who is preparing us for our ministry, that it may be of God and not of man."

As I was on the mountain top that day, the Lord said to me, "I want you to go and raise Lazarus." I told the brother who a ccompanied me of this, and when we got down to the valley, I wrote a postcard: "When I was up on the mountain prayin g today, God told me that I was to go and raise Lazarus." I addressed the postcard to the man in the place whose name had been given to me by the two lads. When we arrived at the place we went to the man to whom I had addressed the c ard. He looked at me and said, "Did you send this?" I said, "Yes." He said, "Do you think we believe in this? Here, take it ." And he threw it at me.

The man called a servant and said, "Take this man and show him Lazarus." Then he said to me, "The moment you see him you will be ready to go home. Nothing will hold you." Everything he said was true from the natural viewpoint. The man was helpless. He was nothing but a mass of bones with skin stretched over them. There was no life to be seen. Everything in him spoke of decay.

I said to him, "Will you shout? You remember that at Jericho the people shouted while the walls were still up. God has lik e victory for you if you will only believe." But I could not get him to believe. There was not an atom of faith there. He had made up his mind not to have anything.

It is a blessed thing to learn that God's word can never fail. Never hearken to human plans. The man who believes God has it. Every man who comes into the Pent ecostal condition can laugh at all things and believe God. There is something in the Pentecostal work that is different fro m anything else in the world. Somehow, in Pentecost, you know that God is a reality. Wherever the Holy Ghost has right of way, the gifts of the Spirit will be in manifestation; and where these gifts are never in manifestation, I question whether He is present. Pentecostal people are spoiled for anything else than Pentecostal meetings. We want none of the entertain nments that the churches are offering. When God comes in He entertains us Himself. Entertained by the King of kings a nd Lord of lords! O, it is wonderful.

There were difficult conditions in that Welsh village, and it seemed impossible to get the people to believe. "Ready to go home?" I was asked. But a man and a woman there asked us to come and stay with them. I said, "I want to know how m any of you people can pray." No one wanted to pray. I asked if I could get seven people to pray with me for the poor ma n's deliverance. I said to the two people who were going to entertain us, "I will count on you two, and there is my friend a nd myself, and we need three others." I told the people that I trusted that some of them would awaken to their privilege a nd come in the morning and join us in prayer for the raising of Lazarus. It will never do to give way to human opinions. If God says a thing, you are to believe it.

I told the people that I would not eat anything that night. When I got to bed it seemed as if the devil tried to place on me everything that he had placed on that poor man in the bed. When I awoke I had a cough and all the weakness of a tuber cular patient. I rolled out of bed on to the floor and cried out to God to deliver me from the power of the devil.
