RICHMOND, Va. -- The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) legislative assembly narrowly rejected a measure Friday to allow r egional governing bodies to ordain gay clergy and lay officers.

Under the 259-255 vote, the current interpretation of church law forbidding the ordination of gay clergy will remain bindin g on the church, including on the regional bodies, known as presbyteries.

Conservative Presbyterians had warned that a vote for gay ordination at the denomination's national meeting could cause the largest split in the church since the Civil War, when slavery split the church into Northern and Southern factions.

Opponents of the proposal said a network of 1,300 congregations with 450,000 members was poised to break away. The network, called the Confessing Church Movement, holds as a central doctrine the sanctity of marriage between a man and a woman.

Also on Friday, Presbyterians overwhelmingly elected the Rev. Clifton Kirkpatrick

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We must corporately say, 'Here I Stand!'

I am Robby McBride, senior minister at Saxe Gotha Presbyterian Church in Lexington, S.C., with some 3,400 members. I say, "amen" to Steven Bryant's letter. Our session has taken the 'three point' stance as well, which we, too, feel and bel ieve is foundational to the Christian faith and practice. We have communicated this to our membership and this position has been applauded.

We, too, stand in opposition to the direction of our General Assembly and will not support their (GA) issues - we can't. I believe our church will join the Confessing Church Movement very soon (basically, we already have in our hearts).

I, too, will not leave our denomination, but will remain (as hard as it will be) and work for renewal. I will not walk away, but will remain and face those who say, "Damn them..."

Many of our churches struggle with the issue of separation of church and state, I believe our denomination is struggling with the issue of "separation of church and Jesus Christ." We are losing our denominational minds.

Just one week ago, I had the privilege of speaking with the vice moderator of the Presbyterian Church of Sudan (a guest in our presbytery and in our church). I asked him what he thought of these issues since he was present at this year's Ge neral Assembly. His remarks were short and concise: "We do not struggle with these issues. We are guided by the Scr iptures - God's Word - and God's Word is very clear about His inspired Word, very clear about marriage between a man and a woman, very clear about homosexual behavior, very clear about chastity in singleness, very clear about sin ... ther efore, we do not struggle with these things." Then he asked me a question, "How can you debate these things which are prohibited in God's word?"

We (those of us who align with the Confessing Church Movement) must corporately say, "Here I stand!"
