

What fire has the younger generation acquired, on: 2008/8/18 13:05

1Ki 18:21 And Elijah came to all the people and said, How long are you limping over two opinions? If Jehovah is God, fo llow Him. But if Baal is God, then follow him. And the people did not answer him a word.

This is a comment written by a lady to a post that I had written.....

"There was a time when you could go into a church and feel the presence of God. You would tiptoe in and cry at the alte r and tiptoe out. You would talk about church all day and at bedtime. You would talk to your neighbors about the Lord. D oes anyone know what I am talking about? Does your church have God's presence there? When we witness to neighbor s about the Lord, do we tell them about our church, do we tell them about the programs we offer? Do we tell them about our softball team or about our free cup or our free espresso from our Coffee Bar? Or, do we say , just come and I guaran tee you that you will meet God. Come to Him and He will reveal Himself to you if you will humble yourself. I see it happe n everyweek so please come. I got saved in my 20s and was a professing sinner, then I really got saved about 6 years a go, now I am in my mid 40s. I hear about the old days from all the grey headed ladies in church. I am hungry for God's m anifest presence and I need to know what to do about it. I pray, I confess, I do not live in any known sin, yet I stumble at times and the Holy Spirit convicts me and I immediately repent. I go to prayer meetings at church. I read my Bible, I talk about Jesus at work and try to get them to come to my, or any church. What are we doing wrong, or me? Is my church u nder judgement? Or our nation? Is there churches out there experiencing God where the Spirit is moving and people are confessing and their lives are being changed? They are living for Christ and dying to self and carrying their cross? Jesus , please show yourself."

That was a very sad letter to me. I recognize much of what she is saying. In the last several years I have visited several churches, in different parts of the country. I have also visited churches that used to be the way she described, drenched in the presence of God. I was in Destin Florida just last week and visited a Pentecostal church. The young man and his group that were doing worship were visiting, friends of the Pastor. This young man is quite well known in the "Christian music industry." He "performed," for almost an hour. In that time there must have been over 50 different instructions give n to the congregation. "Stand up," "Dance," "Raise your hands," "Cmon, give the Lord a hand clap," "Just be free," over and over again. I thought about that lady as I was being entertained from a very talented young man in his early thirties, the same age as the Pastor. As I sat there, this thought dropped into my spirit "This is the results of the acquire the fire g eneration." As it turned out, when they were finished, the Pastor thanked them profusely for their "Spirit filled worship,' a nd thanked God that He had just moved mightily amongst us. He also acknowledged his friendship with the artist and th anked him, that even although he was now a "big name," that he would still deem to come to his little church. He told us how his friendship with this man went back to their youth camp days.

We are living in the days when these young men and woman who grew up with acquire the fire and pumped up Christia n youth camps are now assuming leadership roles throughout the American church. The Spirit that the lady above is loo king for, has been replaced by music that is designed to "pump people up." Indeed the entertainer told us that he moved in freedom, and that we too should move in freedom. Now, what was freedom to this young man? He twirled when he d anced, "just let yourself go and be free." Is this the freedom of the Gospels? Is this the measuring rod by which we meas ure a Christian's freedom? For a whole generation, sadly it is.

As many know, our bodies are multifaceted. By that I mean we are made up of body, spirit and soul. If we are living in a soulish generation, how did that come to pass? What is a soulish generation? The body has five senses. We can see, we can hear, we can touch, we can taste and we can smell. These are very powerful factors in our lives. One could argue that much of human misery and sin flow out of these senses. All of adultery starts with seeing. Consider David on his bal cony as he see Bethsheba. Consider pornography, where the eyes feed directly into the soul. Greed and materialism, de siring what our neighbor has, all starts with seeing. Obviously touch would play into all of the sexual sins that plague us as people. Hearing also has been used to great advantage by the enemy. Where would false teachers and religions be without peoples ability to hear the lies? Gossip and backbiting all begin by listening. Taste and smell contribute to glutton y and lead to our present situation when a large percentage of the country is overweight.

Of course all of the senses can be used to enjoy all the wonderful benefits of what God has given us as free will agents, human beings. We can see the glory of a sunset. We can lift up our eyes unto the hills and see where our help comes fr om. We can lift up our eyes and know that the heavens declare the glory of the Lord. We can look at our husbands and wives, our children and our family and garner great joy from just that. The list is endless of what we can enjoy simply by seeing. Hearing, where would we be without the hearing of the Gospel? To hear your child laugh, to hear a bird singing, to hear the crash of the waves or a waterfall. Oh the joy of hearing the worship of the gathered saints. The simple pleasu re of holding your loved ones hands, holding your baby in your arms, a kiss, a warm embrace from your husband or wife, the gentle touch of your lover(your husband or your wife) To taste and smell the wonderful food that we have. Oh how a smell is so powerful in evoking memories from long ago. The simple and wholesome pleasures of all the senses are a delight and the list of these delights is endless, for we worship a creator God.

Suddenly my senses are being assaulted by this young Pastor. He started of loud and only got louder. He was a white m an, but he preached like a black man. I had seen the style many times before, it had meter and there was breathing and also after any good point (and there was quite a few good points) there was a blast from the "organ." Before he had stop ped preaching, my head was pounding. So much noise. The young preacher was exhausted and sweating profusely. He put everything he had into his performance. This was not a lazy young man. He gave a report of how many backpacks t hey had handed out in the last week to area children who could not otherwise afford supplies. Surely a great work. He ta lked about upcoming events and they had a full calendar. This is all good stuff and is highly commendable. Can manufa ctured passion have an impact on today's society. How is it that with all of this activity, the unchurched people in Americ a remained unchurched? Charitable works go on, perhaps more than ever. The music in the church is more professional and "better sounding," that it has ever probably been in the history of the church. And yet, almost zero impact on the unchurched, those without a church background.

Imagine a cross section through your body, a plan view, looking down. Across the chest is the five senses, arched in fro nt. Directly behind the five senses is the soul, and behind the soul is the spirit. The soul naturally looks out to the five senses. The senses excite the soul and the soul empowers the senses. Depending on your level of dysfunction(we are all dysfunctional) will determine the level of activity. For instance, a person in emotional pain, will compensate by overeating, the soul will anesthetize its pain by energizing the eyes, the taste and the smell when it comes to food. That is why this is a problem for one person and not for another. Perhaps the soul will anesthetize itself by sex. It will over stimulate the eye's and the touch. These are tow examples amongst countless millions. We all grow up in unique circumstances and the uniqueness of the sins that so easily beset us are without number. No one can tell, with any accuracy, how a person will turn out. Now there are basic principals. If you beat a child constantly as he grows up, then no one will be surprised by a violent result. We are all different obviously and five children can all grow up in the exact same house with the exact same circumstances but all turn out completely differently. The x factor being our unique personalities. If someone, for instance, is more sensitive than another, then the circumstances will impact that person more violently that it would for say his brother or sister.

So, how does this play into what is going on in the church today and the dilemma of the younger generation raised on ac quire the fire and pump it up messages. This generation dwell almost entirely in the realm of the soul. Silence would terri fy them. They have been raised to think that a heightened awareness of their senses is "the presence of God." What a tr agedy, not just for them, but for the unchurched world. If you were a unchurched person, you would get the same height ened feeling at any rock concert, and of course, most times the world does this better. Their concerts are their church. J ust go to one, one time and you will see these people "worshipping," corporately.

And so, the eye of the soul must be turned inwards. The younger generation, the vast majority of which know nothing of the "presence of God," need to turn inwards and find God within, not without. We all know that God dwells on the throne of our hearts. He has taken up residence in the very center of us. That is where they will have to look if they hope to disc over the true presence of God. The presence of God is always totally fulfilling, there is nothing beyond the presence of God. Have you heard the much used phrase in the church now"There must be more.?" There is nothing more than the presence of God. That is why God does not have to entertain us to draw us to Him. The churches will find that they will have to become more and more like the world to draw people and keep people. And even then it will fail. There is no such pressure in the presence of God. There is no more than Him. People who have turned the eye of their soul inward know that and know that if they want to come here then they have to humble themselves and die to themselves, that is the pat h, that is the journey. People who do not know that and whose eye of their soul is turned outward, towards their five sen ses, will never be satisfied. They will always need more. How sad to hear that phrase spiritualized now. There is no satis faction in the flesh, it will be pleasurable for a season, but the flesh demands satisfaction and complete mastery over the soul. The passions of the flesh will ultimately destroy. The passion of the Spirit will cause us to die to ourselves and become more like Jesus.

As a youth pastor I can say almost categorically that most youth that I know do not understand the difference between s oul and spirit and those that *have* been taught right continue to dwell in the soulish realm. I think it is because at some p oint ministers became 'reaction' based. They started measuring success by the reaction they could get from the people.

Many so-called worship leaders get angry when folk don't react to the singing and music like they think they should. I als o think that 'worship leader' should never have became a ministry in the sense we know it today. I know that is unpopula r, but it is my opinion. The Holy Spirit is the only worship leader- everyone else is supposed to be following. We run the ri sk of dividing the worship when men are front and center in worship. Remember, Satan fell from a worship 'service' (as it were). He fell from an Isaiah 6 environment.

The reality is electricity is often taking the place of the power of God. And it is a strange fire before the Lord. People are 'moved' by volume or a fancy rift or bass line. They feel a tingle and think it is God and remain unchanged. This is why I believe there are so few people feeling 'called' into ministries other than "Praise and Worship" or "Youth". Services feel like a club more than a church. There is something seriously wrong with that.

Jesus said that the "Harvest" is **The end of the age.** The harvest is both a work, and a time. I personally believe that we have entered the end time harvest, the work of the harvest, is not what many people associate with when they consi der it. It is not solely a time for Salvation..it is that, but much more, the harvest is a time of **division**. It is a time when the light shines bright as "deep darkness" covers the entire Earth. The late Derek Prince has a real good series called "Protection From Deception" that I think goes along with this subject. I would not link to it, but it is on his site. I do not endorse all his teachings, but this series is pretty good.

The old timers that the lady mentioned in the first post no doubt spent a lot of time in prayer and fasting for a service. But I am not convinced that folk are in one mind in what the are looking for in a service (meeting). Some are wanting to see deep repentance and others want folk to feel comfortable and good so that they will want to return to that church.

HOWEVER, the bottom line, I think, is that we have lost to a great degree what it means to be truly born again of the Spi rit. And since there are so few births, folk have to be moved by what moves them. They have to move in 'soul' because t hey are spiritually dead in trespasses and sins. They cannot worship in Spirit- that do not have the Spirit. So we have to keep pressing the New Birth Gospel message. Shallow conversions lead to shallow services. A service is only as deep a s the spiritual experience of the attendees and no deeper. Can a person worship in Spirit and truth if they do not walk in the Spirit (Gal. 5:16) and walk in Truth? (III John 1:4)

Elitism and the gospel of experiential blessing, on: 2008/8/19 1:10

A new gospel for a new generation.

Firstly I want to say that this thread is terrific, mature, and insightful with much depth and contribution from all, and relevant. It is an issue that needs to be addressed, with out instituting legalism as the catch all for reform, for our youth, or against ourselves.

I believe that we have been sold a bill of goods, and received something, that we did not bargain for , concerning our youth. It has deep roots, but essentially, it is the idea that the World will see a "Great End time revival", that will sweep in a billion or so youth. It is also coupled with the idea that the "youth are our future", and and the idea of "youth ministers", creating a special class within the body of "up and comers", along with various venues such as "Youth Camp", "Youth Missions", youth night, and so on. It is not Biblical, and has created a disconnect overall in the Church.

Even Sunday school is up in the air for me. Isaiah talks of the Church coming together for communion.."therefore they shall come and sing in the height of Zion, and they shall flow together for the goodness of the Lord. "For wheat and for wine, "The young and the old", the weak and the strong...

The body is the entire body, that is commanded and expected to care one for another. It has always been so, for the born again. We created this disconnect, as part of our theology the our youth needed special attention to meet their nee ds, and to make them feel more compatible in their view that the gospel was not as boring as it seemed, sitting bored to death as a six year old, twiddling with your dollies or a coloring book, all dressed up like a princess, and then the boy's s cenario similar.

This idea has continued for many, many years. It has been somewhat divisive, I believe in family structure, within the Church, which the Lord has made a paramount issue,,,as you consider the Call of Abraham. "I know you will teach your offspring my ways"...IE; The Godly Seed Word, which is bound within the APEX of the motivation of Faith itself. Abraha m succeeded, it seemed. It was not a disconnect. In many societies today, and even in American cultural Christianity, su ch as the Anabaptists they strive not to disconnect.

In the stricter sects of Judaism today, there is a vibrant jealousy to maintain relationship with the child, to direct and s hepherd, to maintain the bloodline and hope of faith. The Kibbutz, and various communities around Israel, are a joy to b ehold. as the young and old are expected to honor and love one another, in the bounds of family, and extended family... and friends.

In the Jesus movement, we were all young. It was almost as though only the youth culture got saved, and as I look b ack, I wonder WHY?...It is something that the Lord just did. We were ilitists, to some degree.. We were however, almost all Babtized in the Holy spirit, and vastly committed, at least in comparison to today. We prayed together at every meal, carried our Bibles everywhere we went, and it was uncommon to not see someone saved daily.

Could it be though, that the disconnect occurred, and was derived from a sense of failure and guilt? Because we acc epted, as we grew older, the unspiritual nature, and comparitive deadness of our unspirit filled churches, we deferred our children in hope? We then, pawned our Children off to the "program"..the camp, the special nights, and then, where we are today, the conferences, that have to do something to create excitement. The music became cultural, as it always do es, and the conviction of the Spirit, is replaced with a more easy and more fun, relaxed venue.

Enter the emerging church, where everyone is accepted. "Come as you are!" is the cry, replacing "come to the Cross! . Salvation itself is covered with the comfort food of motivational teachings that motivate you to be a better person, and o f course, a more satisfied one. This then becomes the theology of the new Gospel. It is a church committed to the edifyin g of itself, far, far away from the tenants of repentence and faith based on self denial, and learning how to love. It's not a bout that..The gospel is about me.

I believe that it is not an overstatement to declare that the "Emerging Church" is, and has been established on youth culture. It has become what we called **HIP** in the 70s. We had Christian "Coffee Houses", which was quite revolutionary 40 years ago. We used these venues to witness Jesus, and as a fishing hole, for those who may come to Christ. We had good music..rock christian hymns that related. We had good coffee.We made people FEEL accepted and loved. We drew the line at the close of the cafe. The new gospel has refused to do so. They confront with new ideas about church. They have made our coffeehouse their substance for Christian ministry.

Come as you are. We will love you. You are accepted here. you will grow, and desire God, as you experience God's I ove. It is not unusual to see unsaved people, living in open immorality, attend for years, in one congregation, without ever being confronted with repentence, and Faith towards God. It then stands to reason, that the Gospel Should Not be preached, because it would offend the seekers, which in reality, may be over 50% of the attending Church.

There then is implied, or directed that there should not be any difference between those who have believed, covered by the blood of Jesus, and those who now may be on the "Journey" to believe. It is no longer a Church, in the Classic se nse of the Apostle Paul's fellowships, but a mish mash of some gospel and a lot of feel goodism and motivational teaching; how to better your marriage, how to manage and increase your finances, and how to grow your church.

It's roots go way back, but you can start counting in our culture when the charismatic church began to explode via the TV set. It then began to flow world wide. One of the great American exports. It is very, very sad. 1%, maybe 2%, are rea I CHRISTIANS IN AMERICA! They were sure I misspoke, and were deflated when I explained. Many of them then really knew, that indeed they were lost. I preached Christ and him crucified.

This is worldwide. It has invaded Africa, and India, the Philippines..., the entire Earth....and the reaction of the youth is similar, I believe. It is a non-gospel message, and it is capsulized in the title of a famous book..."Your best life now".

Without fathers, if there were one billion people saved in these last days, how many of them would you say would sur vive? With the forces out there, promoting these self serving and experiential gospels as the true, and deception increasing everyday...not many, probably. We have witnessed a generation deceived, in good times, right at our kitchen table.

Without holy mothers and fathers, that has the courage to trumpet that the Blood of Jesus believed and received, and a cross lived is the only way to Glory, the church itself won't survive... The youth movement in all of it's forms today, has been moved away from these ancient foundations. "WHERE ARE THE FATHERS!"

A friend emailed me about this post and told me I should read it. I am so glad she did. When I read what this dear lady s aid about the presence of the Lord in the church, and tip toeing in and out because it was so real I could have cried. Hea ring about the old days from the older ladies in the church and looking around now and frustrated because of the hunger for the reality of God and not knowing what to do about it. I feel the same way. There are a few exceptions to what I am about to say, I'm sure, because God always has a remnant of people more concerned with Him than self and in that kind of gathering, He is free to move without people trying to take the credit or exalt themselves. But I'm battling the same kin d of frustration. I dig in the Word, I pray, I actively pursue an ever increasing knowledge of God, of the Lord Jesus Christ, and I know I need the baptism of the Holy Ghost. I want to be so full of Him there is no room for self left. He is my delight and the more I see of Him the less I want of me. Like BH Clendennen says "The Blood of Jesus took care of the sin prob lem I had, but I need the indwelling power of the Holy Ghost to take care of the self problem."

I watched a video of Leonard Ravenhill's "Are We Willing to Drink His Cup" posted on this site, and here is just a brief q uote that touches on this:

"The Church never had more equipment that she has now, but she

Never had less power!

Never less anointing.

Never less of the miraculous.

Never less from the omnipotent God.

As IÂ've said before, When did you last tip toe out of church Sunday morning breathless, awed by the awesomeness of GodÂ's majesty? GodÂ's glory? GodÂ's omnipotence?" end quote.

I say Amen and God have mercy on us, forgive us for being so self absorbed and focused. Help us see our error and be our Power and Strength to change to let You take over and BE GOD!

I have gone to church for 7 years and not one time in all that time have I ever seen anyone get the baptism of the Holy G host. Apparently nobody at my church seems to think this is a problem-I think it is a silent scream that there is a problem . Until God began to stir me up about 3 years ago to dig into His Word, for myself, I had read it, liked to read it, but I was content with things like they were and thought the Baptism of the Holy Ghost an optional thing. Perhaps more necessary for the preacher or pastor. But Eph 5:18 says be filled -continually, regularly, always, not just once, and that is a comma nd not an option, but I've never seen it.

What I read the church is to be I don't see where I am. I've struggled with this so long. There's no real fear of God becau se there's no real presence of God. That's because the church is full of unbelief. He said if 2 gather in His name He'll be there in the midst. But you can tell by how people act they don't believe that. If they thought this Holy God, with eyes of fi re, and more power than our minds can comprehend, was actually in the midst, people would behave differently. The de mons believe and they tremble but people do not. I don't want some demon showing more reverence and fear of God th an I. Not when He promised it to me in Jer 32:40.

People come into what is supposed to be His House and so casual about how they come, and catch up on the latest with each other, so much talking but no prayer before the service, but who comes with a prepared heart, and a reverent longing for God to show up and make Himself real? Isn't He supposed to have the preeminence in all things-our thoughts, our hearts, our lives, our church services, etc.? We can't do that without the power of His Spirit. But, isn't that how it should be? Now, it's all a routine, planned out, and even the preaching of the Word is not real preaching, but men reading Sc riptures they don't really understand and talking for two hours about what they think is the church's problem and what it a II means. No divine revelation-Without a vision the people perish (Prov 29:18) -without a clear understanding of the Lord they don't fear Him so they throw off restraint. How can sinners be convicted and fear God when they walk in His House and see those who claim to be His children with no fear of Him, no reverence? Psa 89:7 is a command too but you don't hear it preached much. God is greatly to be feared in the assembly of the saints, and to be had in reverence of all them that are about Him. Not a suggestion but a command. People just haven't had that revelation, that understanding of Him and who He is. That's why Hosea was told by God "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge." (Hos 4:6) They refuse to know Him, because they refuse to get alone with God and pursue their own revelation of Him-and that is why the church is so lacking His presence and fear.

The Lord teaches me things I never hear preached at church. Sometimes I think I've just completely misunderstood Him and His Word and then I hear somebody like David Wilkerson, or Carter Conlon, or BH Clendennen preach exactly what the Lord had showed me and it takes me to my knees. Last year, during a particularly frustrating time, when I was diggin g in the Word, and in prayer, vexed by these very things I mentioned, the deadness and dryness of the church, and I do n't want to be there anymore. My kids need the reality of God to stand in this wicked generation-not a dull dry, man cent ered religious routine at church. God spoke to me and told me last December that I was in the Door, and dry and weary and tired but the rain is on the way-I knew He meant that latter rain of the Holy Spirit. I have never spoke in tongues alth ough I've heard the Spirit speak inside me in tongues. I've never had the Baptism but I long for it-I know I need Him. Not just the experience but the daily living under the leadership of His Spirit.

A few weeks ago, David Wilkerson preached "Getting Ready for the End of All Things" which is for some reason not yet posted on this site, but it's on TSC's site: http://www.tscnyc.org/sermons.php and He said the Lord told him the rain is on the way-and I thank God for this confirmation. Hope you all go find that message and listen to it. It's needed.

We desperately need the reality of the presence of God in our churches, our homes, our hearts, or nothing is going to change. I long to see this! I want to hear Christ exalted and lifted up, hear Him preached crucified, hear the Cross preached, and lifted up, not the externals. Where has the reverence and the gifts of the Spirit gone? I have heard how it used to be until I am sick to death of hearing it. I am hungry for the reality of His presence in my life NOW-and in this violent day we live in the church has never needed Him more. It is so wonderful to know I am not the only one noticing these things. Thanks for posting this.

The post was about the true nature of the Baptism in the Holy Spirit as seen in Acts 2:37. It says about the crowd who P eter had just shared the Gospel with " And hearing this, they were stabbed in the heart, and said to Peter and to the othe r apostles, Men, brothers, what shall we do? " This phrase, "stabbed in the heart," is from the greek word "Katanusso," w hich means to violently penetrate or agitate the heart.

Praise God, judging by this thread and reactions fr om brothers and sisters from all around the country and from different countries, God is raising up ans seperating a group of people who are no longer satisfied to just play church. This is a group of people who are hungry and thirsty for the t hings of God.

When the sacrifice is placed on the alter, when the false religionists fail in their attemps to move God's hand(aquire the fire generation, much noise and activity) it is then that the fire of God falls and consumes the sacrifice.

And it happened at the time of the offering of the evening sacrifice, Elijah the prophet came near and said, Jehovah, the God of Abraham, Isaac, and of Israel, let it be known this day that You are God in Israel, and that I am Your servant, and that I have done all these things at Your Word.

The most important factor of Amish life is Gelassenheit, or submission to the will of God. Gelassenheit is based primarily on Jesus' words, "not my will but thine be done."16 By giving up individuality and any thought of selfishness, they embra ce God's will by serving others and submitting to Him. To the Amish, Gelassenheit is seen in all of the following aspects

of Amish life:

Personality: reserved, modest, calm, quiet

Values: submission, obedience, humility, simplicity

Symbols: dress, horse, carriage, lantern Structure: small, informal, local, decentralized Ritual: baptism, confession, ordination, foot-washing

The Amish feel that Gelassenheit should permeate every facet of their existence, and even be apparent in their material possessions. Consequently, they will only selectively use modern technologies. As seen in the symbols of Gelassenheit, the Amish believe that using lanterns and the buggies typifies their lifestyle of simplicity and modesty. Any technology th at does not uphold the Gelassenheit principles is banned from use. Electricity is seen as a connection with the outside w orld and violates the Amish principle of separation from society. Electricity also promotes the use of household items, su ch as the television, that allow the outside, "English," values of sloth, luxury, and vanity to infiltrate the household. Autom obiles are not often used because they degrade the Gelassenheit principle of a small, close-knit community. The Amish f ear, with good reason, that these modern transportation technologies will cause them to spread apart, much like most m odern American families. Also, the Amish fear that the automobile will promote competition among themselves. They wo rry that the car will become a status symbol and promote vanity, which is in direct violation of the Gelassenheit value of modesty. The telephone is banned from the household because, much like the automobile, it promotes a separation of c ommunity. Instead of taking a carriage or walking to a friend's house, the Amish feel that they would be tempted to simply stay home and speak on the phone. In order to uphold Gelassenheit, many modern technologies have been banned from regular use.

I am no expert on Amish life, to say the least. I do know that the Amish have a practice of relinquishing their children o ver to the youth group, to decide for themselves whether or not to become a member of the "Amish", Church. The children who are turned over to these groups, are allowed to sow their wild oats, so to speak, in all manner of anarchy and reb ellion, with no determined consequences from their church, or parents. Sexual immorality is rampant, as is drug use, loads of alcohol and any form of worldliness.

This wildness usually lasts a few years, and then the children must decide to become a standing member of their Ami sh church, and adhere to the rules and disciplines of it, or to stay out, and be an outsider. It is very strange and foreign to all other forms of institutional protestism. Many children have committed suicide after this experience, and deep psychol ogical scars are inflicted from this practice. To me, it is almost akin to turning your children over to the devil, to see if the y will survive.

Gellassenheit is simply an ancient Anabaptist expression meaning total submission, implying an absolute devotion to the consuming fires of God, in every orb of life. Probably, most of the Amish churches are simply cultural, and devoid of the Holy Spirit. They are highly legalistic, and if you do not line up, you will be excommunicated before you can say, "GE LLASSENHEIT!" they are very high on Church leadership, and dress codes. Women are very, very oppressed, and commanded submission and silence. They make good pies, and are good mothers. It seems they get a lot of practice at that. It is not uncommon to see a family of 14....not a typo...14 is common.

I'm sure there is an Amish or Mennonite brother here on the forum, who could fill in the blanks. Please forgive my fee ble attempt to assess the youth in this culture, but I hit on the obvious points that an outsider would see. I have heard th e testimonies of many Amish youth who became saved, and boy, do they take off! They have everything else in place..a nd when Jesus comes...they fly.

However, the Amish church as it is does a very poor job of nurturing their youth, or directing them to serve Jesus in H oly fire.

Amen Brother! Reading your post made me think of Watchman Nee's article on "Ministering to the Lord or to the House" The reason why much of the Church spends most of it's time in the outer court is because most of the ministry that is going on is to the people and not to the Lord.

Ministry to the Lord by Watchman Nee

Let us note at the outset that there is little apparent difference between ministry to the House of the Lord and ministry to the Lord Himself. Many of you are doing your utmost to help your brethren, and you are laboring to save sinners and ad minister the affairs of the church. But let me ask you: Have you been seeking to meet the need around you, or have you been seeking to serve the Lord? Is it your fellow men you have in view, or is it Him?

Let us be quite frank. Work for the Lord undoubtedly has its attractions for the flesh. You may be thrilled when crowds ga ther to hear you preach, and when numbers of souls are saved. If you have to stay at home, occupied from morning to ni ght with mundane matters, then you think: How meaningless life as! How grand it would be if I could go out and serve the Lord! If only I were free to go around ministering! But that is not spirituality. That is merely a matter of natural preference. Oh, if only we could see that much of the work done for God is not really ministry at all! He, Himself, has told us chat there was a class of Levites who busily served in the Temple, and yet they were not serving Him; they were merely serving the House. However, service to the Lord and service to the House appear so much alike that it is often difficult to differentiate between the two.

If an Israelite came along to the Temple and wanted to worship God, those Levites would come to his aid and help him o ffer his peace offering and his burnt offering. They would help him drag the sacrifice to the altar, and they would slay it. S urely, that was a grand work to be engaged in, reclaiming sinners and leading believers closer to the Lord! And God took account of the service of those Levites who helped men bring their peace offerings and their burnt offerings to the altar. Yet He said it was not ministry to Himself.

Brothers and sisters, there is a heavy burden on my heart that you might realize what God is after. He wants ministers w ho will minister to Him. "They shall come near to me to minister unto me; and they shall stand before me to offer unto me the fat and the blood. They shall minister unto me" (Ezekiel 44:15).

The thing I fear most is that many of you will go out, win sinners to the Lord, and build up believers, without ministering t o the Lord Himself. Much so-called service for Him is simply following our natural inclinations. We have such active disp ositions that we cannot bear to stay at home, so we run around for our own relief. We may appear to be serving sinners, or serving believers, but all the while we are serving our own flesh.

I have a dear friend who is now with the Lord. One day, after we had a time of prayer together, we read this passage in Ezekiel (44:9-26, 28, 31). She was very much older than I, and she addressed me like this: "My young brother, it was tw enty years ago that I first studied this passage of Scripture."

"How did you react to it?" I asked.

She replied: "As soon as I had finished reading it, I closed my Bible, and kneeling down before the Lord, I prayed: `Lord, make me to be one who shall minister to You, not to the Temple." Can we also pray that prayer?

But what do we really mean when we talk of serving God or serving the Temple? Here is what the Word says:

But the priests, the Levites, the sons of Zadok, that kept the charge of my sanctuary when the children of Israel went ast ray from me, they shall come near to me to minister unto me; and they shall stand before me to offer unto me the fat and

the blood, saith the LORD God (Ezekiel 44:15).

The conditions basic to all ministries that can truly be called ministry to the Lord are drawing near to Him and standing b efore Him. But how hard we often find it to drag ourselves into His presence! We shrink from the solitude, and even whe n we do detach ourselves physically, our thoughts still keep wandering outside. Many of us can enjoy working among pe ople, but how many of us can draw near to (God in the Holy of Holies? Yet it is only as we draw near to Him that we can minister to Him.

To come into the presence of God and kneel before Him for an hour demands all the strength we possess. We have to be violent to hold that ground. But everyone who serves the Lord knows the preciousness of such times, the sweetness of waking at midnight and spending an hour in prayer, or waking very early in the morning and getting up for an hour of prayer before the final sleep of the night.

Unless we really know what it is to draw near to God, we cannot know what it is to serve Him. It is impossible to stand af ar off and still minister to Him. We cannot serve Him from a distance. There is only one place where ministry to Him is p ossible and that is in the Holy Place. In the outer court, you approach the people; in the Holy Place you approach the Lor d

The passage we' have quoted emphasizes not only our need to draw near to God; it also speaks of standing before Him to minister. Today we always want to be moving on; we cannot stand still. There are, so many things claiming our attenti on that we are perpetually on the go. We cannot stop for a moment.

But a spiritual person knows how to stand still. He can stand before God till God makes His will known. He can stand an d await orders. You who are leaders need to particularly consider this. Can you be persuaded to call a halt and not move for a little while? That is what is referred to here: "stand and minister unto me." Don't you think that a servant should awa it his master's orders before seeking to serve him? The Sin of presumption

There are only two types of sin before God. One is the sin of refusing to obey when He issues orders. The other is the sin of going ahead when the Lord has not issued orders. The one is rebellion; the other is presumption. The one is not doing what the Lord has required; the other is doing what the Lord has not required. Learning to stand before the Lord deal s with the sin of doing what the Lord has not commanded. Brothers and sisters, how much of the work you have done has been based on the clear command of the Lord? How much have you done because of His direct instructions? And how much have you done simply on the ground that the thing you did was a good thing to do? Let me tell you that nothing so damages the Lord's interests as a "good thing." "Good things" are the greatest hindrance to the accomplishment of His will. The moment we are faced with anything wicked or unclean, we immediately recognize it as something a Christian ought to avoid, and for that reason, things, which are positively evil, are nearly not such a menace to the Lord's purpose as good things.

You think: This thing would not be wrong, or that thing is the very best that could be done so you go ahead and take acti on without stopping to inquire if it is the will of God. We who are His children all know that we ought not to do anything e vil, but we think that if only our conscience does not forbid a thing, or if a thing commends itself to us as positively good, that is reason enough to go ahead and do it.

That thing you contemplate doing may be very good, but are you standing before the Lord awaiting His command regarding it? "They shall stand before me" involves halting in His presence and refusing to move till He issues His orders. That is what ministry to the Lord means.

In the outer court, it is human need that governs. Just let someone come along to sacrifice an ox or a sheep, and there is work for you to do. But in the Holiest Place, there is utter solitude. Not a soul comes in. No brother or sister governs us here, nor does any committee determine our affairs. In the Holiest Place there is one authority only - the authority of the Lord. If He appoints me a task I, do it; if He appoints me no task, I do none.

But something is required of us as we stand before the Lord and minister to Him. We are required to offer Him "the fat a nd the blood." The blood answers the demands of His holiness and righteousness; the fat meets the requirements of His glory. The blood deals with the question of our sin; the fat deals with the question of His satisfaction. The blood removes all that belongs to the old creation; the fat brings in the new.

But such ministry is confined to a certain place: "They shall enter into my sanctuary, and they shall come near to my tabl

e to minister unto me, and they shall keep my charge" (Ezekiel 44:16). Ministry that is "unto me" is in the inner sanctuary, in the hidden place, not in the outer court, exposed to public view. People may think we are doing nothing, but service to God in the Holy Place far transcends service to the people in the outer court. Ministry Without Sweat

The same passage tells us how they must be clothed who would minister to the Lord:

They shall be clothed with linen garments; and no wool shall come upon them, while they minister in the gates of the inn er court, and within. They shall have linen bonnets upon their heads, and shall have linen breeches upon their loins (Eze kiel 44:18).

Those who minister to the Lord may not wear wool. Why not? The reason is given:

"They shall not clothe themselves with anything that causes sweat" (verse 18 NKJV). No work chat produces sweat is ac ceptable to the Lord. But what does "sweat" signify?

We all know that the first occasion when sweat is mentioned was when Adam was driven from the Garden of Eden. After Adam sinned, God pronounced this sentence upon him: "Cursed is the ground for thy sake; in toil shalt thou eat of it all t he days of thy life...in the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread" (Genesis 3:19-19). It is clear that sweat is a condition of the curse. Because the curse rested on the ground, it ceased to yield its fruit without man's effort, and such effort produc ed sweat.

When the blessing of God is withheld, fleshly effort becomes necessary, and that causes sweat. All work that produces s weat is positively prohibited to those who minister to the Lord. Yet today what an expenditure of energy there is in work f or Him! Few Christians can do any work today without sweating over it. Their work involves planning and scheming, exh orting and urging, and very much running around. It cannot be done without a great deal of fleshly zeal.

Nowadays, if there is no sweat there is no work. Before work for God can be undertaken, there is a great deal of rushing to and fro, making numerous contacts, having consultations and discussions, and finally getting the approval of various people before going ahead. As for waiting quietly in the presence of God and seeking His instructions, that is out of the q uestion.

Yet, in spiritual work, the one factor to be taken into account is God. He is the one Person to make contact with. That is the preciousness of spiritual work that is truly spiritual-it is related to the Lord Himself In relation to Him there is work to do, but it is work that produces no sweat.

If we have to advertise our ministry and use great effort to promote it, then it is obvious that it does not spring from praye r in the presence of God. If you really work in God's presence, men will respond when you come into their presence. You will not have to use endless means in order to help them. Spiritual work is God's work, and when God works, man does not need to expend so much effort that he sweats over it.

Let us in utter honesty examine ourselves before God today. Let us ask Him: "Am I serving You, or am I merely serving the work? Is my ministry truly unto you Lord, or is it only ministry to your House?" If you are pouring with sweat all the time, it is safe to conclude that it is the House you are serving, not the Lord. If all your busyness is related to human need, you may know that you are serving men, not God. I am not despising the work of slaying sacrifices at the altar. It is work for God and someone has to do it-but God wants something beyond that. The Sons of Zadok God cannot secure everyone for service to Himself, for many of His own are reluctant to leave the thrill and excitement of the outer court. They are bent on serving the people. But what about us? Oh that today we might say to the Lord: "I am willing to forsake things, I am willing to forsake the work, I am willing to forsake the outer court and serve You in the inner sanctuary."

When God could find no way to bring all the Levites to the place of ministry to Himself, He chose the sons of Zadok from among them for this special service. Why did He select the sons of Zadok? Because when the children of Israel went ast ray, they recognized that the outer court had been irreparably corrupted, so they did not seek to preserve it. Instead, the y made it their business to preserve the sanctity of the Holy Place.

Brothers and sisters, can you bear to let the external structure go, or must you persist in putting up a scaffolding to preserve it? It is the Holy Place that God is out to preserve-a place utterly set apart for Him. I beseech you before God to hear His call to for sake the outer court and devote yourself to His service in the Holy Place.

I love to read about the prophets and teachers in the church at Antioch: "As they ministered to the Lord and fasted, the H oly Ghost said: Separate me Barnabas and Sau1 for the work whereunto I have called them" (Acts 13:2). We see there t hat the Holy Spirit commissions men to the work as they are ministering to the Lord. Unless ministry to the Lord is the thing that governs us, the work will be in confusion.

God does not want volunteers for His work; He wants conscripts. He will not have you preaching the gospel just becaus e you want to. The work of the Lord is suffering serious damage today at the hand of volunteers; it lacks those who can say as He did: "He that sent me..."

Brothers and sisters, the work of God is God's own work, and not work that you can take up ac your pleasure. Neither ch urches, nor missionary societies, nor evangelistic bands can send men to work for God. The authority to commission me n is not in the hands of men, but solely, in the hands of the Spirit of God.

Serving the Lord does not mean chat we do not serve people, but it does mean that all service to people has service to the Lord as its basis. It is service Godward that urges us out manward. Luke 17:7-10 tells us clearly what the Lord is after . These are two kinds of work referred to here: plowing the field and tending the flock. Both are very important occupations, yet the Lord says that when a servant returns from such work, he is expected to provide for his master's satisfaction before sitting down to enjoy his own food.

When we have returned from our toil in the field, we are apt to muse complacently on the much work we have accomplis hed. But the Lord will say, "Gird yourself and give me to eat." He requires ministry to Himself. We may have labored in a wide field and cared for many sheep, but all our toil in the field and among the flock does not exempt us from ministry to the Lord's own personal satisfaction. That is our supreme task.

What are you really after? Is it only work in the field, preaching the gospel to the unsaved? Is it just tending the flock, cari ng for the needs of the saved? Or are we seeing to it that the Lord can eat to His full satisfaction and drink till His thirst is quenched? True, it is necessary for us also to eat and drink, but that cannot be till after the Lord is satisfied. We, too, mu st have our enjoyment, but that can never be until His joy is first made full.

Let us ask ourselves: Does our work minister to our satisfaction or to the Lord's? I fear that when we have worked for the Lord, we are often thoroughly satisfied before He is satisfied. We are often quite happy with our work when He has foun d no joy in it. Blessed are they who can differentiate between ministry to sinners or saints, and ministry to Him. Such dis cernment is not easily acquired. Often it is only by much drastic dealing that we learn the difference between ministry to the Lord Himself and ministry to the House.

Let us seek the grace of God that He may reveal to us what it really means to minister to Him

Yet, perhaps because of a mistrust of so much power chord mus ic in the church, we can become too hard towards people who experience pleasure in any musical worship. There is ple asure in God. In fact, the heart of the Christian draws deep pleasure in God, and freely relate their enjoyment of music to this pleasure. Is this a purely spiritual thing? I think testing ourselves is a good thing, but less so if we start building rules for others. In our scrutiny of this issue, let's not become simply anti-pleasure. You have not come to a mountain that can be touched and that is burning with fire; to darkness, gloom and storm;...because they could not bear what was comman ded...But you have come to Mount Zion, to the heavenly Jerusalem, the city of the living God. You have come to thousa nds upon thousands of angels in joyful assembly.... Or, as it has been said before, under the law we performed a sacrific e, but in Christ we proclaim a sacrifice.

I say this because I have repented of carrying a petty and judgmental attitude into a contemporary Church worship service, wherein anyone closing their eyes and smiling blissfully drew my secret scorn. God forgive me.

Some older Christians understand now that worship is not merely 'music' but how long did it take before they acquired the is more mature perspective? And even if one day I understand the full extent of what worship is, I'm not sure I will ever feel right in saying that my worship is a sacrifice. In the meantime let's not shut people out but remember Suffer little child ren, and forbid them not, to come unto me: for of such is the kingdom of heaven.

I realize if I see these things, then everyone sees them as well, so forgive my lecturing. It's just that I wouldn't want to tr ade one kind of soulish religion for another; if you know what I mean brethren.

"Leaping Like Calves From the Stall": An Analogy for Today

by David Johnson

Leaping Like Calves From the Stall

The prophecy given through Malachi is essentially a conversation between God and Israel, as God points out Israel's wr ong attitudes and invites them to repent and turn to Him and receive His blessings.

In the final chapter of this short book, Malachi is shown what lies ahead for those who will repent and what will become of those who don't. In Malachi 4:2, God makes this promise: "But for you who revere my name the sun of righteousness shall rise, with healing in its wings. You shall go out leaping like calves from the stall" (New Revised Standard Version).

What does that tell you? What does a calf leaping from a stall have to do with your future? Undoubtedly, there are sever al lessons that could be gleaned from this analogy, and an experience from this writer's past can shed light on one of the m.

It was that period between late winter and early spring in the Midwest, and we were keeping an eye on a Hereford cow t hat was due to drop her first calf any day. At this time of year, it can be warm and pleasant during the day, yet turn very cold during the night. We were concerned that she might give birth during the night when we couldn't watch her, and the calf would freeze before we discovered it in the morning. We brought her into the barn and put her in a stall where she w ould be protected from the elements.

When the veterinarian arrived to check on her, he discovered that the calf was in a breech position, and we would need t

o help her deliver it. After much effort, the new calf dropped to the floor of the stall, and the cow did instinctively what every cow has always done—she began to lick him to clean him up and get the blood circulating. After just a few minutes, the little fellow got up on shaky legs and wobbled instinctively to the same place every newborn calf has always gone—to get his first meal.

Mother and calf were doing fine, but because of the cold weather, we decided to leave them in the stall for a few more d ays.

Now, for those who are not familiar with farm animals, please don't be misled by the fact that cows are listed among the "clean" animals. That refers only to the fact that God permits us to eat the meat. It says nothing about the cow's habits of personal hygiene. Cows have no qualms about relieving themselves and then standing or lying down in the mess for day s at a time. As the days passed, this stall became quite an unpleasant mess, but the cow and her calf didn't seem to noti ce.

Leaving the Stall

Finally the day came when it was warm enough to let the cow and calf out of the stall and put them back in the pasture. When the stall was opened, the cow ambled out of the stall and then out the barn door into the pasture, where she imme diately began to feast on the fresh green grass.

But the calf didn't know what to do. The stall had been his whole world, and he was terrified at the prospects of having to leave it. Even after we put a halter on him, he planted all four feet and fought with all his might to keep from being pulled from the stall. It took two grown men to finally drag him out of the stall and into the pasture. When the rope was removed, he dashed immediately to his mother and stood underneath her, looking wide-eyed and frightened at all the strange things in the pasture.

As the moments passed and nothing bad happened to him, he grew more and more curious about all the new sights and sounds and smells of the pasture. He ventured a short distance from his mother and sniffed some of the grass and then dashed back under her for safety again. After a few more moments he ventured a bit further away, dashing back to safet y each time.

Within a half hour, he was dashing and leaping from one end of the pasture to the other with an excitement and joy that is hard to describe. This new world was wonderful! It was filled with all sorts of interesting plants and animals—tastes a nd smells he had never imagined while living in his stall. For the first time in his short life, he was living instead of merely existing, and never again would he want the stench and dullness of the barn.

Why had he been so reluctant to leave his stall? Compared to the wonderful world outside, his stall was ugly and unplea sant. But to him, his stinking, fetid, waste-filled stall was "normal." It was his only idea of how life could be lived. It was all he had ever known, and as far as he knew, this is the way every calf lived.

To someone standing on the outside, someone who could see a different reality, the stall was a wretched place to be. B ut to that calf, it was "home," and he was comfortable there.

The power of what seems "normal" to a person is amazing. People who have grown up in abusive homes tend to view a buse as normal, and the cycle is repeated generation after generation. People who break free of abusive relationships of ten go into other abusive relationships because it seems "normal."

For most of us the examples may not be quite as extreme, but many of the things we do in our lives, our relationships, o ur actions, are the result of a negative, dysfunctional way of living that still seems "normal" to us.

In 1 Peter 1:18, Peter refers to the fact that "you were redeemed from the empty way of life handed down to you from yo ur forefathers" (New International Version). Most people don't consciously choose empty, worthless ways of living. They just live that way because it feels normal. Until people get a clear view of the way things should be—the way they can be—they will continue to feel most comfortable with this distorted view of "normal."

In returning to the original question I have observed that any religious excitement is short lived (at best) that is cultivated by a festival of modern music. I am deliberately making a distinction between modern Christian music and genuine worship. This generation believes they are the same but they are not.

I am constantly challenged to understand what spiritual dynamic is at work in any environment where people are "calling on God" and there is no lasting fruit. Attendees claim a mighty move of God, but where is the lasting fruit? If the hearts of the people are right, surely God would come and revive individuals and empower them to get about the work. Perhaps this is a clue?

If the FIRE of God does not fall it is because the altar is not full. Romans 12:1, 2 are front and center at this point. When the altar is FULL the Fire of God will come. od, men vital to the health of the Christian community, have shied away from this or deny it altogether, either word or by ommision. And on the other side, Pentecostal folk, who believe in this are busy chasing miracles, while ignoring the grea tes miracle of all, the miracle of the new heart. Evans Roberts new of "Katanusso," power and we saw the Welsh Revival . D.L Moody knew of this same power. This story has been quoted many times on SI but it bears repeating. When men o f God hunger after this, perhaps we can save some from this soulish generation........

D. L. Moody, while speaking at Northfield, related the following experience: "This blessing came upon me suddenly - like a flash of lightning. For months I had been hungering and thirsting for power in service. I had come to that point that I think I would have died if I had not got it. I remember I was walking in the streets of New York. I had more heart in the business I was about than if I had not belonged to this world at all. Right there on the street the power of God seemed to come upon me. I was filled with a sense of God's goodness and felt as though I could take the whole world to my heart. I to ok the old sermon that I had preached before without any power; it was the same old truth, but there was a new power. Many were impressed and converted.

This happened years after I was converted myself. It was in the fall of 1871. I had been very anxious to have a large Sun day school and a large congregation, but there were few conversions. I remember I used to take pride in having the larg est congregation in Chicago on a Sunday night. Two godly women used to come and hear me. One of them came to me one night after I had preached very satisfactorily as I thought. I fancied she was going to congratulate me on my success, but she said, we are praying for you. I wondered if I had made some blunder that they talked that way.

Next Sunday night they were there again, evidently in prayer while I was preaching. One of them said, we are still prayin g for you. I could not understand it, and said: Praying for me! Why don't you pray for the people? I am all right. Ah, they s aid, you are not all right. You have not got power; there is something lacking, but God can qualify you. I did not like it at first, but I got to thinking it over, and after a little time I began to feel a desire to have what they were praying for. They continued to pray for me, and the result was that at the end of three months God sent this blessing on me.

I would not for the whole world go back to where I was before 1871. Since then I have never lost the assurance that I am walking in communion with God, and I have a joy in his service that sustains me and makes it easy work. I believe I was an older man then than I am now; and I have been growing ever since. I used to be very tired when preaching three time s a week; now I can preach the gospel five times a day and never get tired at all. I have done three times the work I did before, and it gets better and better every year. It is so easy to do a thing when love prompts you. It would be better, it s eems to me, to go and break stones than to take to preaching in a professional spirit. A man can accomplish more in on e year with this power than he can do in forty years without it. Jonathan Edwards said he was able to do more in Northa mpton in one week than he did in seven years before the Spirit of God came upon him for service."

This is the secret; the filling of the Holy Spirit. The outstanding men, men who have stirred the world for God, testify to it.
