It seems to me this morning that, among the ways that divisions can be caused among believers, one of them is when we seek **to distinguish ourselves** from others as being more pure, more holy, more devoted, more true in our orthodoxy than everyone else.

This seems to me to have been the attitude of the Pharisee in Matthew 23:5, who, it appears, enlarged the borders of their garments in order that they could distinguish themselves as being more devoted to God's Law than any one else (see Numbers 15:38-41 for context).

Perhaps it is the attitude of any of us, who use religious devotion to draw attention to ourselves, and make ourselves distinct from others. Even viewing them as weak and inferior.

I appreciate what you shared. I think there is some insight into this question in looking at the ways in which the greek word translated *divisions* here, appears elsewhere. I used e-sword, and found that it is used in two other places in the New Testament: once in 1 Corinthians 3:3, and again in Galatians 5:20.

In both places, the word is mentioned along with works of the flesh, and is included as one in Galatians 5:20.

In 1 Corinthians 3:3, Paul asks them *...are ye not carnal, and walk as men?*

It seems to me that our old and natural nature is a hinderance to us in our efforts to serve each other and God. Perhaps in bringing divisions in envying the place others have, or by wanting to bring recognition to ourselves, or by feeling the need to be proven right. And these things seem contrary to being content in God.
