The Great Debate

• sola Scriptura (by Scripture alone)

• sola Fide (by Faith alone)

• sola Gratia (by Grace alone)

• solus Christus (through Christ alone)

• soli Deo Gloria (glory to God alone)

Alone, this list is a wonderful and beautiful, biblically sound literary expression of Diety's sovereignty working Salvation in the wicked hearts of men.

Similarly, if you were to ask Calvinists what makes God chose one and not another, their answer is the same... God is sovereign, and He can do what He wants, when He wants.

The non-Calvinist's answer to the Calvinist's question about what makes someone chose and someone else not chose is an eternal biblical condition that God Himself has answered through generations of people throughout the testimony of Scripture.

The consistent answer to the above question by non-Calvinists is "I don't know why."

The real answer is found in Christ.

The same Spirit and battle and temptation that worked in Lucifer, Adam, Cain, Abraham, Sarah, David, Ahab and Josiah and everyone else that God has ever created continues today.

All these men heard the Word of the Lord and all these men chose, to different extents, to ignore the Word of the Lord.

The difference is that as it is written about Abraham, some of these men believed what God said of Himself to be true, and it was counted to them for righteousness.

Now what happens and why some believe, must truly be attributed to God and His goodness, mercy and grace. Ultimately, attributed to His love.

The resistance to believe and obey the Spirit of God working in us to draw us to salvation is our decision alone.

God's will is perfect, He is sovereign, holy and pure and is always towards salvation and the reconciling of His creation all-the-while being just and jealous for His Namesake and His Sacrifice.

To pinpoint why some come into submission to the drawing of the Holy Spirit and why some resist that drawing is an eternal and deep mystery. A mystery that does have an answer.

A mystery that has played itself out generation after generation of mankind, beginning in the heavenlies.

It played out in Lucifer, Adam, Moses, Judas, Paul and most recently in you and me.

So, in the great debate between Calvinists and non-Calvinists, the next time someone asks, "Why do some men choose salvation and others don't?", tell them, "for the same reason that Lucifer and the patriarchal audience of Stephen the martyr resisted God's will to the uttermost and Job and the archangel Michael submitted to it."
