The Cup Jesus Drank, on: 2009/9/7 1:15

In Matthew 20:22-23 Jesus told his disciples that they would drink of the cup that He Himself would drink from.

What was the cup that Jesus drank? Because that was the same cup that his disciples drank from. What was the cup that his disciples drank? I think it was a cup of spiritual, mental, and physical agony and pain. Both Jesus and his disciples experienced that.

Some say Jesus drank the cup of God's wrath. That can't be true because the disciples didn't drink the cup of God's wrath. Plus the cup of God's wrath is not empty in Revelation, it is still full! God will pour out the cup of His wrath upon the wicked: Rev. 14:10. Therefore the cup of His wrath has not been emptied.

Also, God still has wrath after the atonement of Christ: (Acts 12:23; Rom. 1:18; Rom. 2:5; Rom. 2:8-9; Col. 3:6; Rev. 6:17; Rev. 14:10, Rev. 14:19, Rev. 15:7; Rev. 16:1) Obviously the wrath of God was not satisfied at the atonement!

I think that the atonement makes it possible for God to turn away from His wrath. When a sinner repents and believes, God sets aside His wrath because of the atonement of Christ.

But I don't see how it could be argued that Jesus drank the cup of God's wrath because He told His disciples they would drink of His cup. And I don't see how it could be said that Jesus satisfied God's wrath since God still has wrath after the atonement.

Perhaps there is an aspect of *self-sacrifice* in drinking the cup that God was holding out to Him in Gethsemane. The baptism, was the baptism into death. Jesus' death carries many significances, not just the wrath of God against sin - the Sin.

The wrath which is to come, may be even worse, as those who will experience it (according to Paul in Rom 1 & 2) 'knew God' but 1:28 And even as **they did not like to retain God in knowledge**, God gave them over to a reprobate mind, to do those things which are not convenient;

One of the marks of a person who is born again (raised from the dead, in Christ), is that they have the power to do those things which are convenient to God. That is, things through which, and because of their obedience to truth, God comes to them.

Was Jesus "human enough"?

Like Jesus we die too, but as living sacrifices, by taking up his cross and dying daily to self, and the sins of the flesh and putting on the Lord Jesus Christ. If you have done any of that, you know how painful it can be, that old man body of the flesh wants to have it's own way.

Oh but now you have to let them kill you, when you don't have to. When you have the power to avoid all that torture, just call on a few angels, and you're outta here.

Hello, and greetings from Kentucky. I just wanted to offer a suggestion to point of the final paragraph of your post:

'But I don't see how it could be argued that Jesus drank the cup of Gods wrath because He told His disciples they would drink of His cup. And I don't see how it could be said that Jesus satisfied God's wrath since God still has wrath after the atonement.'

Could it be that God's wrath was satisfied for His chosen, however, those who pass into hell will absorb the holy hatred and wrath of a just God for eternity? I believe the cup is God's wrath. But that does not mean it is ALL of God's wrath. I would suggest it is all of God's wrath against all of those who, past, present and future believe and surrender to the Lord Jesus Christ. Hell is the wrath of God. Also, the physical suffering of Christ are an aspect of God's wrath on the tree, but not the fullest expression. Jesus suffered much more than physical pain on the cross. So we see that physical pain is equated with wrath. The cup spoken of to the disciples does not have to mean the "wrath" of God at all. Just because a cup is mentioned in Scripture in two different places, does not mean that they have to mean the exact same thing.
