"Hear, O my people, and I will testify unto thee: O Israel, if thou wilt hearken unto me; There shall no strange god be in t hee; neither shalt thou worship any strange god. I am the LORD thy God, which brought thee out of the land of Egypt: o pen thy mouth wide, and I will fill it.

But my people would not hearken to my voice; and Israel would none of me. So I gave them up unto their own hearts' lu st: and they walked in their own counsels. Oh that my people had hearkened unto me, and Israel had walked in my ways ! I should soon have subdued their enemies, and turned my hand against their adversaries.

NONE is like Jeshurun's God, So great, so strong, so high, Lo! he spreads his wings abroad, He rides upon the sky! Israel is his first-born son; God, the Almighty God, is thine; See him to thy help come down, The excellence divine. 2 Thee the great Jehovah deigns To succour and defend; Thee the eternal God sustains, Thy Maker and thy friend: Israel, what hast thou to dread? Safe from all impending harms, Round thee and beneath are spread The everlasting arms.

3 God is thine; disdain to fear The enemy within: God shall in thy flesh appear, And make an end of sin; God the man of sin shall slay, Fill thee with triumphant joy; God shall thrust him out, and say, "Destroy them all, destroy!"

4 All the struggle then is o'er, And wars and fightings cease, Israel then shall sin no more, But dwell in perfect peace; All his enemies are gone; Sin shall have in him no part; Israel now shall dwell alone, With Jesus in his heart.

8 Christ shall make thee free indeed When He appears within; Thou on self and pride shalt tread, On all the strength of sin; Thou shalt more than conquer it; Thou shalt see it all depart, See it dead beneath thy feet, No longer in thy heart.

9 God, the gracious God and true, Hath spoke the faithful word; He the mighty work shall do, Our trust is in the Lord; He the mountain shall remove, He the sinner shall restore, He shall perfect me in love, And I shall sin no more.

When the Hebrews left Egypt, the mixed multitude (synagogue) carried with them, Egyptian gods (idols - such as Rachel worshipped later, and Michal, David's wife). They didn't have the ark of the covenant until God had given the pattern to Moses early in their wilderness journey, after Aaron had made the golden calf. Later still, in the split between Solomon's son's followers, and the other ten tribes of Israel, Jeroboam made two golden calves, and chose 'priests' from among 'th e lowest of the people', devising a worship system of his own making. Eventually, God stops refering to 'Israel', and star ts calling the dwelling place of those people 'Samaria', and then, when Judah follows and goes beyond Israel's idolatry, God cuts Judah off as well - apart from the tiny remnant of faithful worshippers of God.

Surely, the Christian life has many parallels with the long drawn out history of Jacob's descendents!
