This is one of those pieces of Scripture that goes way beyond the letter!! Doesn't wine normally represent the Holy Spirit? In the back of my mind, I think there is a connection between the "water" and it being turned into the Holy Spirit be cause the host (God?) saved the best till last!!

Also, IÂ'm thinking out loud here that in the Old Testament (or the Old Covenant), God did not indwell in men; everything was outward obedience.

In the New Testament (or the New Covenant), Christ did not indwell in men but He upended the Law and took us to new expectations: inward obedience (That whosoever looks on a woman to lust after her hath committed adultery with her alr eady in his heart. (Matt 5.28))

Our being born of water and ChristÂ's sacrifice paved the way for men (male and female) to be FILLED with the Holy Sp irit because you cannot put new wine in an old vessel! The old vessel must be made new before the Holy Spirit can com e and reside in it.

The Holy Spirit comes to give us power to overcome the old wineskin when it wants to rear itÂ's ugly head and to become that new creature in Christ!

I honestly think that the words, "Draw out now," mean more than the words we read, possibly like: DonÂ't bury your t alent?? A light on a hill cannot be hid?? (I know that my thoughts are NO WHERE near complete on this topic and are only the minute, minuscule tip of the iceberg and they are just random thoughts!!).

Saying that, I do believe that God saved the best for last, not that the Holy Spirit is to be worshipped, that is not what IÂ' m saying! But He is God's last go around with mankind. So in my mind, this is making some sense, IÂ'm sorry if IÂ'm n ot conveying that across mere type written words.

I do not think the point of the account is to condone or condemn alcohol consumption. The master of the feast was givin g account of what normally happens at these occasions. He says, "You know, normally at parties the host puts out the b etter stuff until people are getting drunk and don't care about taste anymore and then the cheap stuff, but you have save d the good till last." It was more a statement of the honor the host was showing his guests than any kind of a statement about drinking.

Actually, if you want to get really technical, one cannot make a Biblical case for being a tee-totaller. It is simply not in scr ipture. I do think one can make one seriously strong case Biblically that a Christian ought to abstain from alcohol, but th at is not quite the same as "Thou Shalt Not". In America any kind of alcohol consumption is looked on by Christian and non-Christian alike as an inherently un-Christian behavior. It is associated with drunkenness in almost every case. In ot her cultures it is not viewed as such. Not saying that drunkenness does not occur there, but some cultures do not see dr inking wine with alcohol content as anything odd for a believer. I am not condoning it. I have never tasted alcohol in my life. I am just saying that we have to be scripturally accurate regardless of personal conviction. I think a believer, especially in America, should not touch alcohol...EVER. I have solid scriptural reasons for it, especially in the area of bearing the burdens of weaker brothers and sisters so they do not stumble. That reason alone is enough to leave it alone.

Well, I ramble a bit. I don't think it is a scripture to stumble much over. Jesus obviously did not condone drunkeness.
