The New Testament almost always adds deeper dimensions of understanding to events that occurred in the Old Testam ent. If Jude uses the word "eternal" it means eternal, if this word does not mean eternal fire, then we do not get eternal life either, as it is almost always the exact same word throughout the NT, if my memory serves correct, the word in greek is aionios. If you do not want "eternal life" then believe that the word "eternal" does not mean eternal for the fires of hell either. How the Sodom event practically works out in a physics understanding is not something we are privy to. However it is not inconceivable that the brimstone at Sodom, was Just the beginning of an eternal brimstone that those cities were subjected to. Even though Genesis tells us what happened in the physical realm temporarily, that does not negate or involve us in understanding what happened in the Spiritual realm as a result of the same event.

"And the devil that deceived them was cast into the lake of fire and brimstone, where the beast and the false prophet AR E (still), and shall be tormented day and night FOREVER AND EVER." (Revelation 20:10)

(By Revelation 20:7 this is 1000 years after Revelation 19:20 quoted above).

"And death and hell were cast into the lake of fire. This is the second death.

And whosoever was not found written in the book of life was cast into the lake of fire." (Revelation 20:14-15)

These actual accounts of the lake of fire show Jesus really meant what he said:

"And if thy hand offend thee, cut it off: it is better for thee to enter into life maimed, than having two hands to go into hell, into the fire that never shall be quenched: Where their worm dieth not, and the fire is not quenched.

And if thy foot offend thee, cut it off: it is better for thee to enter halt into life, than having two feet to be cast into hell, into

the fire that never shall be quenched: Where their worm dieth not, and the fire is not quenched. And if thine eye offend t hee, pluck it out: it is better for thee to enter into the kingdom of God with one eye, than having two eyes to be cast into hell fire:

Where their worm dieth not, and the fire is not quenched." (Mark 9:43-48)

Notice three times the phrase "their worm." It's a personal possession, which those burnt up and nonexistent cannot ha ve. There is no question about the eternal suffering of the wicked in hell.

Kwamenat, your question of the doctrine of an eternal hell is a fair question. The book you have linked by some person, Joe Crews, from helltruth.com has some errors in it.

I do not intend to make a full rebuttal but I will make a quick remark. The Bible promises everlasting torment, suffering, and punishment.

Matthew 25:46. "And these shall go away into everlasting punishment: but the righteous into life eternal."

The author of this book, Hell-Fire, makes a silly mistake on this point. He assumes that because "eternal life" is not promised to the damned that therefore this equates to "eternal death." Now, eternal death is an expression never used in the Bible; the very idea is non-existent. We do hear about "spiritual death" but that is evidently not Annihilationism.

Very simply, eternal life is not used in the Scriptures primarily as a quantitative expression of life, but as a qualitative expression. Eternal life is referring to the abundant life of joy and peace, etc., in Christ. Spiritual death, or eternal punishment, is the deficient life of those who are by nature enemies of God.

Moreover, I do not consider "hell-fire" to be a literal fire. I perceive hell-fire to be a profound description of how sinners experience the overwhelming Holiness of the Presence of God. (Deuteronomy 4:24.)

Nahum 1:6. "Who can stand before His indignation? and who can abide in the fierceness of His anger? His fury is poured out like fire, and the rocks are thrown down by him."

Isaiah 33:14. "The sinners in Zion are afraid; fearfulness hath surprised the hypocrites. Who among us shall dwell with the devouring fire? who among us shall dwell with everlasting burnings?"

Some of the best teaching which I personally enjoy on hell are by a gentleman, R. A. Finlayson, who says,

"Hell is eternity in the presence of God without a mediator. Heaven is eternity in the presence of God, with a mediator."

And,

"Hell is an encounter with the character and will of God. God's nature is holy, and His character is unsullied righteousness. For the unholy to mix with holiness is Hell."

I don't know who you are directing your comments toward, but I don't think that anyone has done this.

No one is accusing you of having preconceived ideas. Rather, I simply asked if your questions were legitimate...or if you were using these questions as a means to spread sectarian Adventist views. In the past, we have had some Adventists come here and pretty much dismiss the faith of everyone else because they didn't hold the same views as they did.

When you use rhetoric like "read more in the Word and see what God's wants you to do on the Lord's day....the Holy spirit will lead you IF YOU ARE SINCERELY SEARCHING," then the connotation is that those who are "sincere" will arrive to the same conclusion that you have.

Yet, in both of these threads that you started, you began with a question about why believers have arrived to specific conclusions about the Sabbath and Hell. That is to say, the usage of "hell-fire" is an earthly description of a heavenly mystery Â- just like the OT earthly temple was representative of the Temple in Heaven. So "fire" is representative of the Holy Presence of God that shall be the cause of the sinner's torment in the life to come.

Consider, for example, another passage:

2 Thessalonians 1:7-10

when the Lord Jesus shall be revealed from heaven with his mighty angels, in flaming fire taking vengeance on them th at know not God, and that obey not the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ: Who shall be punished with everlasting destruction from the presence of the Lord, and from the glory of his power; When he shall come to be glorified in his saints

Note: the phrase "from the presence of the Lord" does not mean "away from His presence" but, literally, "coming from the face of the Lord."

2. After the 1000 years as shown in Revelation 21, Then God will set up His Holy City where the saved will be with him f orever.

It is after the 1000 years that this happens...Revelation 21:8- But the cowardly, unbelieving, abominable, murderers, sex ually immoral, sorcerers, idolaters, and all liars shall have their part in the lake which burns with fire and brimstone, which is the second death.Â"

This is the second death. So apparently the death who were not saved resurrected after the 1000 years (Rev 20: 7-10) a nd tried to surround God's people and that is when they were devoured with Fire from God and cast into the lake of fire a nd brimstone.

While I am impressed by your grasp of "eternal fire" meaning it "was a fire from God with eternal consequences"; I am s urprised that you still switched this with a merely temporal matter. That is, you recognize that the condemned of Sodom still burn to this day, but in your argument you switched this to mean the burning of the land of Sodom, which has long si nce been extinguished.

You also asked, "How can the former things passed away if there are still people burning perpetually?"

That depends on how one interprets the "former things." For example, how can the former things have passed away if G od is still God? The "former things" cannot mean whatever we wish it to mean nor is it meant to mean those "people bur ning perpetually." Rather it is indicative of the previous world system during the time of God's patience. Namely, this pre sent evil age is the "former things."

Believe me, Kwamenat, when I say I am sympathetic to the doctrine of Annihilationism. If the Scriptures were not excess ively descriptive of the final judgment being an everlasting conscious suffering for the damned then I would have default ed to Annihilationism.

Jude 7- "just as Sodom and Gomorrah and the cities around them, since they in the same way as these indulged in gros s immorality and went after strange flesh, are exhibited as an example in undergoing the punishment of eternal fire". (A RE THE PEOPLE IN SODOM BURNING RIGHT NOW....NO!)

In Jeremiah 17:27, Yahweh said he would kindle an unquenchable fire in Jerusalem. This was fulfilled in 2 Chronicles 36:19-21. Is Jerusalem still burning?

Romans 6:23 - the wages of sin is death, the gift of God is eternal life. (It does not say eternal death)

While researching i also came across that some people actually use Luke 16 for everlasting fire/punishment. The story a bout Lazarus in Luke 16 is baseless regarding everlasting punishment. Someone asked how i understood everlasting punishment..

Everlasting suffering is what happens when you are separated from God forever. The unsaved will be consumed by God to ashes. After this they shall be no more for eternity. It is eternal punishment because they are gone for good! The Bible also talks about the ungodly perishing or vanishing. For example Psalm 37:20 - "But the wicked shall perish; And the en emies of the LORD, Like the splendor of the meadows, shall vanish. Into smoke they shall vanish AWAY".

If you are still using the Rich man & Lazarus in Luke 16 to justify "eternal torment" consider this:

If you take this parable literally It will signify that all who are clad in purple and fine linen and who fare sumptuously every day, are at death to be placed in a furnace of fire and tormented. It would also mean that unless we were poverty stricke n beggars, the companion of dogs, full of sores, and fed on crumbs at some rich man's back gate, we would never be ab le to wing our flight to Abraham's bosom when we departed this life. Poor Abraham would experience considerable difficulty in clasping all of the poor to his expansive bosom. Why don't you spend time to thoroughly go through the parable and make sure that you understand the point of the story. Even scholars claim that the story is a popular jewish folk tale but i am not going totally rely on this because it is not in the Word. Also, what are you going to do with all the scriptures that are contrary to this understanding if you take it literally?

We really need to understand the Character of God in order to comprehend this eternal punishment issue.

I am pretty sure you do since you think a God who says in Ezekiel 18:23 that He has no pleasure in the death of the wic ked find satisfaction in the perpetual torment of men, women, and children burning in the fires of hell.

Does a God of mercy have a specific location in the universe where the wicked are being punished by dreadful and horri d plains forever and ever? There is no indication in Scripture that such a place exists or is being planned for the future. E ven the Biblical terms sheol(Heb) and Hades (Gr)are designations for the realm of the dead but not a place of torment for the wicked dead.

Consider the biblical teaching of life after death into account that says that the dead are not in a state of consciousness and that there is no such this as an immortal soul (Eccl 9:5-6; Ps 146:4), it should be clear that the idea of an ever burning hell contradicts the clear teaching of the Bible

I have not studied Hebrew or Greek but its obvious that the word forever or eternal is used a lot in the Bible and in most cases like when is talking about humans it does not mean forever except for those who will be saved. For example, the people were to believe Moses "forever" (Exodus 19:9), the slave in Exodus 21:6 was to serve his master "forever", Saul remained in the tabernacle "forever" (1 Sam 1:22). The meaning of "forever" is each time is "as long as that person lives " In the case of Jonah "forever" only lasted three days (Jonah 2:6)

The sorrows of hell compassed me about; the snares of death prevented me;

Psalm 116:3

The sorrows of death compassed me, and the pains of hell gat hold upon me: I found trouble and sorrow.

Psalm 139:8

If I ascend up into heaven, thou art there: if I make my bed in hell, behold, thou art there.

I am not going to get into a big thing on translations of words from the original text because there are plenty of books on the subject that show how the word for eternal "aiōnios" originally meant the "fullness of an age' that when you con sider along with the words of Jesus shed light that the punishment fits the crime and that the sentence will be fulfilled to the letter. The passage below shows how God's Law for punishment works in the next life just as it did 1500 years earlier in the law given to Moses.

Here we have someone coming to worship but has sinned against another person....... Jesus tell them to first go make amends and then come back to worship him or pay the price.

Matt 5: 24 Leave there thy gift before the altar, and go thy way; first be reconciled to thy brother, and then come and offe r thy gift.

25 Agree with thine adversary quickly, whiles thou art in the way with him; lest at any time the adversary deliver thee to the judge, and the judge deliver thee to the officer, and thou be cast into prison.

26 Verily I say unto thee, Thou shalt by no means come out thence, till thou hast paid the uttermost farthing.

On the other hand the Law decreed that even when there could not ever be a satisfactory payment for one's trespass ag ainst another person, all "trespassers" were set free every Jubilee. (other than death sentences that were already carried out)

It is not the case that "hell" does not exist but what "hell" is and what it's real purpose is that eludes those who make clai ms to know about the things of God when the truth is they still have a lot to learn.

Unfortunately because Christians as a whole limit their knowledge strictly to "keeping in context only" thus disobeying the commandments of Jesus to always live by every word that comes from God, most of the truth of the scriptures eludes them.
