GodÂ's emphatic declaration is woe on all at ease in Zion (Amos 6:1). Those who will not heed and harken diligently a nd flee the cares and indulgences of this life, and seek HIM with all their heart will surely know what GodÂ's woe means when judgment begins at the house of God.

"As many as I love, I rebuke...Be zealous...and repent" (Rev. 3:19).

Because of ease in Zion, spiritual desolation is in the world. When the people of God cease to be passionate and zeal ous in their work and witness for God, the church drifts into formalism and the world drifts into infidelity. An easygoing, fo rmal church has always produced an unbelieving world.

How emphatic are the LordÂ's commands to be instant in season and out of season...to put on the whole armor of Go d...to be strong in the Lord...to wrestle ...to gird our loins, to quench the fiery darts of the enemy.... "Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, and watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication for all the saints" (Eph. 6:18; Joel 2:17; Zech. 10:1).

Unto every man his work! Preach the Gospel to every creature! If you and I are guilty of disobeying the commands of our Lord to intensity and to diligence and to fruitfulness in the work of the Gospel, cannot we humble ourselves and go to Him in contrition of heart and confess our spiritual lukewarmness and pray for grace to forsake the lukewarmness of our way?

If we cover or excuse or justify our sins of lukewarmness, or any sin, we shall not prosper. But if we humble ourselves under the mighty hand of God and confess we have not sought first the kingdom of God and His righteousness — but h ave been halfhearted, and positively lukewarm to every claim of God to time and strength in the urgency of the spiritual c onflict of this hour — we will find grace and mercy to help in time of need.

"All Seek Their Own, Not the Things Which Are Jesus ChristÂ's" (Philippians 2:21)

Christian men and women redeemed with the precious life-blood of GodÂ's only begotten Son are shamelessly giving themselves to the pursuit of personal self-interest, using their time, strength and resources in selfish indulgences, leavin g the LordÂ's work stunted and stinted, curtailed and dwarfed on every hand for want of labor and means to gather in the LordÂ's harvest.

It is the last half-hour! To gather in the precious fruits of the earth before the gathering storm of GodÂ's judgment wrat h requires heroic effort and sacrifices. GodÂ's judgment is voiced against His people Â- natural and spiritual, Jew and G entile Â- who are intent on catering to their own wants, seeking blessings for their own souls, instead of laying to heart t he universal spiritual need of this catastrophic hour of divine retribution.

"Be ashamed, O ye husbandmen; howl, O ye vinedressers...because the harvest of the field is perished" (Joel 1:11).

God is dealing sharply now with His people. It is the hour when the husbandman, with fan in hand is preparing to purg e His floor, gather His wheat into the garner and burn the chaff (on the wheat) with unquenchable fire (Matt. 3:12).

Witness the stir and activity on the ranch in the harvest of the grain. Early morning rising, sweat and toil in the heat of the day. As in the natural, so is it in the spiritual.
