Christianity 'close to extinction' in Middle East

Christianity faces being wiped out of the Â"biblical heartlandsÂ" in the Middle East because of mounting persecution of worshippers, according to a new report.

The study warns that Christians suffer greater hostility across the world than any other religious group.

And it claims politicians have been Â"blindÂ" to the extent of violence faced by Christians in Africa, Asia and the Middle East.

The most common threat to Christians abroad is militant Islam, it says, claiming that oppression in Muslim countries is of ten ignored because of a fear that criticism will be seen as Â"racismÂ".

It warns that converts from Islam face being killed in Saudi Arabia, Mauritania and Iran and risk severe legal penalties in other countries across the Middle East.

The report, by the think tank Civitas, says: Â"It is generally accepted that many faith-based groups face discrimination or persecution to some degree.

"A far less widely grasped fact is that Christians are targeted more than any other body of believers.Â"

It cites estimates that 200 million Christians, or 10 per cent of Christians worldwide, are Â"socially disadvantaged, haras sed or actively oppressed for their beliefs.Â"

"Exposing and combating the problem ought in my view to be political priorities across large areas of the world. That thi s is not the case tells us much about a questionable hierarchy of victimhood.Â" says the author, Rupert Shortt, a journali st and visiting fellow of Blackfriars Hall, Oxford.

He adds: Â"The blind spot displayed by governments and other influential players is causing them to squander a broade r opportunity. Religious freedom is the canary in the mine for human rights generally.Â"

The report, entitled Christianophobia, highlights a fear among oppressive regimes that Christianity is a "Western creed Â" which can be used to undermine them.

State hostility towards Christianity is particularly rife in China, where more Christians are imprisoned than in any other co untry in the world, according to the report.

It quotes Ma Hucheng, an advisor to the Chinese government, who claimed in an article last year that the US has backe d the growth of the Protestant Church in China as a vehicle for political dissidence.

Â"Western powers, with America at their head, deliberately export Christianity to China and carry out all kinds of illegal e vangelistic activities, Â" he wrote in the China Social Sciences Press.

"Their basic aim is to use Christianity to change the character of the regime...in China and overturn it." he added.

The Â"lionÂ's shareÂ" of persecution faced by Christians arises in countries where Islam is the dominant faith, the report says, quoting estimates that between a half and two-thirds of Christians in the Middle East have left the region or been ki lled in the past century.

Â"There is now a serious risk that Christianity will disappear from its biblical heartlands,Â" it claims.

The report shows that Â"Muslim-majorityÂ" states make up 12 of the 20 countries judged to be Â"unfreeÂ" on the ground s of religious tolerance by Freedom House, the human rights think tank.

It catalogues hundreds of attacks on Christians by religious fanatics over recent years, focusing on seven countries: Egy pt, Iraq, Pakistan, Nigeria, India, Burma and China.

It claims George BushÂ's use of the word Â"crusadeÂ" after the September 11 attacks on New York created the impress ion for Muslims in the Middle East of a Â"Christian assault on the Muslim worldÂ".

Many Moslens are coming to faith in Christ, some through dreams and visions, and becoming part of an evangelistic house church movement.

The best example is Iran. In 1979 there were less than 500 believers in Persia under the Shaw. After the Islamic revolution there was a gospel revolution. Now there are conservatively about 100,000 believers in Iran. Some put the estimate at over one million followers of Christ in Iran. These are Moslens who have converted to Jesus and meet in networks of house churches.

Traditional Christianity that may be found in structured churches may be on the decline in the Middle East. But the gosp el, if anything, is spreading and many are coming to salvation in Jesus.

My sister, just wanted to give the other side of the story.
