"Do not return evil for evil.†(1 Pet 3.9 , Rom 12.17 , 1 Thes 5.15) "Overcome evil with good.†(Rom 12.21) "Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave room for the wrath of God; for it is written, †Vengeance is mine, I will repay, says the Lord.'†(Rom 12.19)

We are specifically called to follow Jesus example of suffering love and non-retaliation. (1 Peter 2.21). Jesus died for the life his enemies. (Rom 5.8, 10) Jesus gave this as the specific reason to love our enemies, "so that you may be so not your Father who is in heaven" (Mat 5.45) -- to be like him!

God will take care of us and is fully capable of handling those who do evil. We should not fear people, even those who could kill us (Matt 10.28).

Mt 5:44 But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, 45 so that you may be sons of you r Father who is in heaven; for he makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the u njust.

Lu 6:27 But I say to you that listen, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pra y for those who abuse you. 29 If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also;

e is aggressive violence, and defensive violence. The latter is simply the use of sufficient force to terminate the threat, it is nothing like the violence that seeks to hurt another for one's personal gain.

It is so interesting that the gospel accounts of the kindly acts of healing and wisdom defining the earthly ministry of our p recious savior also include the temple cleansing. As a friend of mine once posted on Facebook,

"Sometimes, 'What would Jesus do?' involves a whip and some crashing tables."

Non-violent responses of lovingkindness are always best, but sometimes that is not an option.

While there is no understanding from the scripture that violence is the preferred method of spreading the gospel, there is no similar call to mindless pacifism either. When Peter uttered a death sentence to Ananias' wife Sapphira, she was just standing there lying to him. "The feet that just carried your husband out of here are standing outside waiting to carry you out too."

Peter obviously did not kill her. But his words became the authority for God to carry out the death sentence on her. It is chilling, to think that the law of God is in effect at all times and authority over life and death are given into the hands of b elievers according to their faith.

I think back a half century to the discussions we young soldiers had late into the night before we made that long flight to Vietnam where we would face... something. We were all conscientious objectors being trained as medics and all had ou r ideas of "what I would do if..." One kid named D'Angelo was adamant, he would not kill anyone under any circumstances.

He ended up earning a high medal for "relentless and accurate fire on the enemy protecting his wounded captain and the other wounded men with him."

My story was much less dramatic, I held the rifle in firing position as another man crawled out onto the battlefield to retrie ve an injured comrade. I didn't fire, but would have without hesitation. I relive that moment nearly every day.

You do what you have to do when your faith is real. No, you do not carry around the authority to kill people but there may be a moment when God lends you that authority for special circumstances. It may be a gun, a baseball bat, or a word of faith to stop a demon from an act of violence. Be careful not to judge other Christians who have responded to the Holy Spirit in a flash of time, not enough time to even think. If your heart is filled with Christ, zeal for His temple will consume you and you will receive whatever you need to carry out His will in that moment.
