This is true, but only if approval by your peers is important to you. On the other hand if you are more concerned about experiencing the approval by God, what others say will mean nothing. I have witnessed that. Let me share a few examples

I have a friend, Karen Yoder, who earned a Ph.D. in nursing. She taught at Duke University and other universities, assisted a researcher in her work. She died this spring; she was 68 YO, never having married. But she was a very plain Mennonite woman, in fact if anything, she dressed quite drab, wore a large white head covering but she was esteemed by her peers and those she served. Highly thought of, well respected.

Many years ago we met a very plain Mennonite lady in Jackson, MS who was attending midwifery school. We saw her interact with the girls from the black community, many poor and... They loved her, crowded around her talking animatedly. She had a relationship with them and dress did not interfere.

Twenty-nine years ago I applied to a Crises Pregnancy Center to work as a volunteer. The director was unsure about allowing me to work there because I looked so different but he decided to give me a chance and seeing what happens. What happened was that God empowered me to work with Him - speaking to those things that needed to be said/done. It did not take long for the others to see how my 'differentness' in no way impeded my ability to connect with my clients.

I had to deal with this issue on the personal level about looking different - I did not want to stick out like a sore thumb. No way. The Holy Spirit is so faithful...you see when He asks you to do something he will be right beside you enabling you to do his will. This is the key to faithfulness.

I'm afraid there are many things wrong with this statement, Brenda. Please allow me to give an overview of what I perceive is faulty with it:

A) Competing with other women (especially ungodly ones) is not what Jesus called us to nor is it indicative of the conduct of one who is walking in the Spirit.

B) Wearing (as you put it) "fashionable clothing"; clothing that reveals the body instead of conceals it; in order to "offer" "sexiness" (even if done in competition with others) is still **exactly** one "advertising their wares" .

They are (even if we accept your rationale) "advertising their wares" in mimicry of others doing the same.

C) Your assertion that it is low self esteem that is the cause and that "better self worth" is the solution is very dangerous and "new" thinking (in Christian thought, anyhow).

The word of God does not find our esteem of ourselves to generally be too low, nor does it encourage us to some higher sense of "self worth." I know phrases such as "knowing our identity in Christ" and the like are gaining popularity in "Christian" circles, but I find them to often be not in agreement with the gospel.

It is when we accurately esteem ourselves as (in ourselves) sinful rebels, defiled and dirty, Christ-hating, guilty and deserving of divine wrath - that we can truly believe Christ and (believing on Him) receive the Holy Spirit and live in and through Him, and thus have the experience of peace, joy and victory and not be a slave of sin (i.e: lewdness and worldliness).

So, in short: it is not a too low estimation/valuation of ourselves that causes us to sin, it is a lofty view of ourselves that is the culprit. Scripture bears witness to this truth.

Respectfully, Brenda, only unbelief would call what God commands in His word and assures He will accomplish in and through us by His Spirit, "unrealistic in the extreme." That is not the voice of Jesus which says such things.

The LORD God says to His people through Moses: "For I am the Lord who brings you up out of the land of Egypt, to be your God. You shall therefore be holy, for I am holy." (Leviticus 11:45)

Jesus says: "Therefore you shall be perfect, just as your Father in heaven is perfect." (Matthew 5:48)

Peter commands us: "...as obedient children, not conforming yourselves to the former lusts, as in your ignorance; but as He who called you is holy, you also be holy in all your conduct, because it is written, 'Be holy, for I am holy.'" (1 Peter 1:14-16)

Jesus says: "All things are possible to those that believe." (Mark 9:23)

I could go on, but I think that should suffice. The word of God is always calling us to "unrealistic" and "extreme" living that we cannot do in ourselves. That is precisely why we need Jesus and His Holy Spirit. The word of God is clear that "the just shall live by faith" and reassured His servant(s) with the words "Not by might nor by power, but by My Spirit!"

God did not create man to be his own source and supply for what He required of him. He did not create man to be sufficient in himself - man was to be what God intended him to be how God intended him to be it: by faith. Trust God and abide in His word and leave the rest to Him. Lean on Him as your source and strength. Look to Him (and be radiant, Psalm 34:5).

I am saddened to hear you have such little faith in Christ as to write off what God has required of us and Christ has provided for us at Calvary as: "unrealistic and extreme."

In "light" of ourselves they are - but not in light of Christ and the cross. He entered into our experience and died our death that we may die His death with Him and thus live His Life in and through Him by faith!

I disagree, I see far more than the women owning the blame in this poem. And the men are the leaders of the church, and as such own the greater responsibility and accountability to God (as in the case with Adam and Eve).

If we understand "virgins" or "unmarried daughters" to be under the headship of their fathers (1 Cor. 7:36-38), there may likely be some fault in the fathers (or if married, the husbands) for this behavior going unchecked/uncorrected.

Also, it is the duty of the father/husband to promote spiritual sincerity and depth and to ever beware of religious superficiality in himself and his wife/family.

Therefore, if he had been diligently faithful to this duty - it is unlikely that the "young women" mentioned above would have gotten very far along in this spiritually dangerous practice.

In the event that they are young widows, the scripture plainly councils them to remarry to prevent this type of error (1 Tim 5:11-15).

I would have to say that in the event that they are "virgins" that have no Christian father/husband to be accountable to, then they would be under the guidance and of the married women and the pastors of the church - and if they are godly and reverent, they will recognize and honor such godly men and women and willfully arrange themselves under such in the Lord.

This problem goes unchecked so long that it becomes "tradition" and one would have to believe that by this point it is open and quite bold: worldliness, perhaps sensual dress, likely the minimizing/justifying of a clamorous and unsubmissive spirit, often self-glorying dress and demeanor, etc...

At this point, it becomes the fault of the men of the church in general; especially the elders. If the fathers and/or husbands (if applicable) have not yet addressed this in-road for the flesh/Satan into the assembly; then it is the duty of the watchmen (pastors, prophets, etc) to perceive the danger and sound the alarm. They are not to address the women personally at first (in the case that they are under the headship of a man in the church), but are to go to the brother who is their head and raise the concern first. Of course some time must be afforded for him to address the situation and grace is needed, but at this point the problem has become routine and open and is metastasizing and needs to be dealt with rather speedily.

At this point it is open sin and rebellion: "pomp" and "quite a sight to see" and the church (which by the blood of Christ was already "free") celebrates some perverted and satanic form of liberty: "The church has been set free". It has also become a "stage 3" or even "stage 4" cancer as "it spread to all the women."

This can not be seen as merely the fault of women, it required the permissive silence of many men and elders in the church by this point and it signifies an even worse error in the men than the women: cowardice, which is likely caused by walking in the flesh (carnality) and likely hidden sin. This is a serious problem in the men of the church, and not the women only.

Here we see what I mentioned above: a cowardly spirit and a unfaithfulness to the Lord. And, none of us, in ourselves, are any different - therefore it is the duty of the elders and brothers to help each other and be our "brothers keeper". We must help each other keep ourselves in the love of God.

For the preacher to have gotten to this point there likely has been either a spirit of man-idolizing in the church which caused people to shy away from bringing questions or concerns to the "preacher"; or a spirit of stupor and pride which caused him to see the others as beneath him, un-discerning and thus did not take their admonitions to heart. This seems to often be a problem in unbiblically hierarchical churches where there is one pastor and the elders are a board under him.

It is not entirely clear if the "your friend" in this part means the preacher (which agrees with the "spirit of stupor and pride" that I mentioned above) or the people in the assembly in general.

I took it as the assembly in general and if this is the sense, it reveals that the cancer is now near terminal. There is a prevailing ungodly and antichrist attitude in the body at large which "calls good, evil; and evil, good". One that scoffs at holiness and the fear of the LORD. One that calls worldliness and rebellion and sin "liberty" and refers to biblical exhortations to holiness, "legalism."

At this point it has clearly become the prevailing attitude in the church: a man-centered agenda, one of humanism which "makes provision for the flesh in regards to it's lusts" (Romans 13:11-14). The church is more concerned with how a thing affects man and his feelings than how it affects The Almighty and Holy God.

The church has fallen from it's previous "steadfastness" (2 Peter 3:14-18).

The church is now thoroughly compromised and is celebrating sin and worldliness ("glorying in it's shame") and even seeking to promote the cause of Christ by advertising and promoting itself - using what it ought to be ashamed of. This is a reproach to a Holy God and Christ.

Now the tyrannical fascism of Satan oppresses and marginalizes anyone who would dare speak out. The many are self-deluded and believe themselves to be walking in love and very "Christ-like", while it attacks and slanders those through whom the Holy Spirit is truly speaking to them. It, in a figurative sense, "kills the prophets and stones those sent to her".

The "man" referred to in this verse seems to me to be in the general/generic sense: "mankind" - and speaks of the negative affect spiritual apostasy has on the world. If the church is to be "the light of the world" and "the light that is in be darkness", "how great is that darkness!"

It is trying to bring attention to the consequences of ignoring spiritual backsliding on the smallest and most embryonic level, for it has serious ramifications if left unchecked. It actually erodes ones senses and perception and resolve and courage to perceive danger and to wage war against it. It is blinding and numbing and infiltrates the heart and mind: deluding and deceiving, and puts our your eyes and enslaves you. (Judges 16)

Here we see a Satanic "freedom" celebrated - that which the Lord Jesus calls "sin" and "slavery".

I can see how the return to the immodest dress of the women can seem to place all the blame on them, but I don't believe that is the intent. I believe the intent is to draw attention to one of the ways that Satan sparked this revolution and revolt and also one way to quickly and easily perceive the spiritual condition of a local body of believers: a lack of holiness. This is often most blatant and readily discerned in the immodest and sensual dress of the women (although it can also be seen in the men).

1. girls/women should be modestly dressed, and it is the job of the parents (and father) to teach them this
2. husbands and fathers are responsible for washing their daughters (and sons) in the word and therefore guiding them in the right path.
3. Girls are not equal to boys. They are differently made and their hearts need a different form of guidance and protection. Because their roles as adults will be different, that needs to be addressed as they grow up, but most of this can be handled easily if they are first taught to surrender to Christ.
4. Husbands/fathers ought to support their families so that the mom should be able to stay at home and take care of the home and the children.

However, there are things I did not agree with here. It does not seem to represent to me the Prov 31 woman.

I think this sermon is a push-back on the American way of raising children, and it sounds really alien to me. The thought of kicking my daughter out of the home when she turns 18, or even sending her off to college in a different city at that age, is a very American thing. I did not even do this with my sons. Most girls (and boys) are not really ready to face living alone at that age, to face all the onslaught of the world. Some may be, but I think that is the exception.

I do not see why a young woman should not receive a college education (provided she can do that while remaining at home) just because she is a woman and will most likely be only a homemaker. In my opinion, that is why she needs it- she will be the educator of her children and in this age where that most likely requires homeschooling, that education will not be wasted. (I am not saying she cannot educate them without a degree-many moms do so successfully- but this is very helpful.)

Also, what happens if something happens to her husband? She will have to support the family. The preacher in this sermon said he would support his daughter and her family in a case like that, but who guarantees he will be alive to do that? A college degree is today almost a requirement to get a job that can support a family; we do not want her working at a minimum wage job if that happens.

Whether a child should be attending college is something that should be submitted to prayer. Ask the Lord to decide whether each child (girl or boy) should go beyond high school. God always knows what is best.

I will add that I have prayed and thought a lot about this before I posted and asked God for clear guidance as to whether I should say anything. I also add that I may have a bias (or different perspective?), since I am a widow with 6 children still at home, 4 of them girls. I am highly educated (I have a law degree, though not a law license at the moment), and I got all that education while my husband worked and supported me and the children. He encouraged me to study when I would have been happy to remain at home and just tend to my family. I am now tasked with taking care of the entire family and my training has served me well. There is no husband/father at home to take care of my daughters in the way that the preacher states, and my father is also gone and would not have been able to support me/us either even if he was. Whether or not I will support my daughters until they are married or whatever God has for them?

I pray this does not start an argument. I understand the heart of the speaker and I can agree with his heart. Fathers need to step up and protect/teach their daughters and wives in all areas. Fortunately, I have a husband who did.
