Havok- I have made several using Audacity which you can download for free. It is audio only, not video. Easy to use but the process itself is time consuming because you have to "cut" the clips you want to use out of the sermon which means you have to make notes of start and stop times of the clips; and if you insert music of course you have to make it match up and not drown out the sermon track. I really like making them but it is a many hours time commitment.

The Fire on the Altar site recommended Audacity which is why I used it.
