God knew, but Abraham's knowledge of his obedience and God's knowledge of his obedience were to be in harmony. At the risk of sounding pedantic, the answer to God's sovereignty and man's free will is found in this "God works in us to will and do his good pleasure"

I don't need to understand an abstract theory of divine power/will making contact with human will/desire. I experience it e very day as a Christian on a level that removes the abstraction and places God's will and my will in plain view of myself and others.

Now, I know there are plenty of theologians and apologists that would poopoo that little statement as immaturish low-lev el thinking.

But since I have some experience with these things, I know something too. I know they do not abstract their way into su bmission to Christ, it is a surrender of their will. I know if they will live in faith and love one another they do so because C hrist is living out his own life in them, and their carnal minds and hearts have been crucified so that there be no hindranc e.

Here is where the victory must be one, it will never be won by redefining God's knowledge base, or expanding mans libe rtarian willing.

At judgment day, when we all receive what we have done in our bodies, God will not reward us according to his abstract foreknowledge of future events. It seems to me that the misunderstanding of God's foreknowledge comes from putting the emphasis the wrong way roun d, whether that is considering God's foreknowledge as if it is ours or God's testing us as if He is testing Himself.

Todd, I never thought you were a literalist in the sense of taking a word or phrase in English in a dogmatic way. God saying "Now I know" (as Marvin has pointed out) does not equate to God not knowing, but now it has become realit y in Abraham's life and deepened the relationship between Abraham and God.

When Jesus says of the wicked "I never knew you", does He really mean He never knew who they were or anything about them? That does not make sense. Surely He means He never had a relationship with them. Similar to how "Abraham knew Sarah and she bore a son". It did not mean Abraham learned something about Sarah, it means he had an intimate relationship with her.

If God does not know everything, He is not God.

Just because we cannot perfectly explain it or fully understand it does not mean it is not true.

Can you fully explain the Trinity, or God being both transcendent and imminent, His omnipresence, etc...?

We can state these are truths from scripture, but we cannot fully understand them.

I would recommend Tozer's book 'The Knowledge of the Holy' as a good read on this subject.

"He would then be but equal in this part of knowledge to his creature; no man or angel but may thus arrive to the knowle dge of them; God were then excluded from an absolute dominion over the prime work of his lower creation; he would ha ve made a creature superior in this respect to himself, upon whose will to discover, his knowledge of their inward intentio ns should depend; and therefore when God is said to search the heart, we must not understand it as if God were ignora nt before, and was fain to make an exact scrutiny and inquiry, before he attained what he desired to know; but God cond escends to our capacity in the expression of his own knowledge, signifying that his knowledge is as complete as any ma n's knowledge can be of the designs of others, after he hath sifted them by a strict and thorough examination, and w rung out a discovery of their intentions, that he knows them as perfectly as if he had put them upon the rack, and and for ced them to make a discovery of their secret plottings. Nor must we understand that in Gen. 22:12, where God saith, aft er Abraham had stretched out his hand to sacrifice his son, â€eNow I know that thou fearest God,†as though God w as ignorant of Abraham's gracious disposition to him; did Abraham's drawing his knife furnish God with a new k nowledge? no, God knew Abraham's pious inclinations before (Gen. 18:19): â€æl know him, that he will command his children after him,†&c.

"Knowledge is sometimes taken for approbation; then the sense will be, Now I approve this fact as a testimony of thy fear of me, since thy affection to thy Isaac is extinguished by the more powerful flame of affection to my will and command; I now accept thee, and count thee a meet subject of my choicest benefits: or, Now I know, that is, I have made known and manifested the faith of Abraham to himself and to the world: thus Paul uses the word know (1 Cor. 2:2): "I have det ermined to know nothing;†that is, to declare and teach nothing, to make known nothing but Christ crucified: or else, N ow I know, that is, I have an evidence and experiment in this noble fact, that thou fearest me. God often condescends to our capacity in speaking of himself after the manner of men, as if he had (as men do) known the inward affections of oth ers by their outward actions."

"If God doth not know future things, there was a time when God was ignorant of most things in the world; for before the d eluge he was more ignorant than after; the more things were done in the world, the more knowledge did accrue to God, and so the more perfection; then the understanding of God was not perfect from eternity, but in time; nay, is not perfect y et, if he be ignorant of those things which are still to come to pass; he must tarry for a perfection he wants, till those futur ities come to be in act, till those things which are to come, cease to be future, and begin to be present. Either God know s them, or desires to know them; if he desires to know them and doth not, there is something wanting to him; all desire s peaks an absence of the object desired, and a sentiment of want in the person desiring: if he doth not desire to know the m, nay, if he doth not actually know them, it destroys all providence, all his government of affairs; for his providence hath a concatenation of means with a prospect of something that is future: as in Joseph's case, who was put into the pit, and sold to the Egyptians in order to his future advancement, and the preservation both of his father and his envious bre thren. If God did not know all the future inclinations and actions of men, something might have been done by the will of P otiphar, or by the free-will of Pharoah, whereby Joseph might have been cut short of his advancement, and so God have been interrupted in the track and method of his designed providences."

"Everything which is the object of God's knowledge without himself was once only future. There was a moment whe n nothing was in being but himself: he knew nothing actually past, because nothing was past; nothing actually present, b ecause nothing had any existence but himself; therefore only what was future. And why not everything that is future now

, as well as only what was future and to come to pass just at the beginning of the creation? God indeed knows everythin g as present, but the things themselves known by him were not present, but future; the whole creation was once future, or else it was from eternity; if it begun in time, it was once future in itself, else it could never have begun to be. Did not G od know what would be created by him, before it was created by him? Did he create he knew not what, and knew not be fore, what he should create? Was he ignorant before he acted, and in his acting, what his operation would tend to? or did he not know the nature of things, and the ends of them, till he had produced them and saw them in being? My wife and I have had this same discussion several times over the years. She contends that God knows absolutely everything. I contend that He knows all but what He has determined not to know. Let me give you the details.

Scripture says that God knows the end from the beginning. Psalms 139 (I think) tells us that all of our days are written in His book. This is how I see it. God created time and, by analogy, we are like rats in a maze. Don't take the analogy furt her than I intend it. As a rat in the maze, I am inside of time. I only see the passage I am in and when I get there, the ch oice of right or left that I can take. The maze comes to me sequentially, like time itself.

Yet God, the creator of time, sees the maze and the correct path, the beginning, the end, and each wrong turn that can be made, all at one glance. In His book of my created purpose and destiny, He sees the preordained path that I am to t ake (His perfect will for me, or the sequence of right turns that I need to take). This is what is written in His book.

Very good, Savannah, I hadn't considered that text. Gotta love that Charnock.

It seems that when God knows the decisions of men, certain men infer he will interfere or influence or bring pressure from other means, this inference seems to create a conflict where their free decisions are not free thereby implying God is coercive to men. Even if my strain of thought is not accurate, what is common is the element of quid pro quo, "I get the sense of freedom I require while God receives no bad press from 'free humans'."

The sense I have always gotten from this line of thinking is what looks to be a "protection clause"; meaning If I am not in terfered with in my decisions, I can protect God from the accusations of coercion and determinism.

Notwithstanding the excellent texts cited, if what is being created is a protection clause agreement, you would not need a single text in favor of omniscience, the unbiblical agreement falls on its own.

This is one of the rubs of diving deeper into theological issues, sometimes (I refer only to myself) what is at stake is not a doctrinal position but an emotional/psychological one. I know this for certain, its been my humbling experience when bi blical truth has exposed something about me where I was interfering with a clear presentation of scripture. But, I may be the only one.

God does not search us out to 'learn something about us" God searches us out, because...

- 1. He loves his creation
- 2. He involves himself in knowing the inward motives, decisions, feelings and ideas we have, this is not to learn from us but to show to us a God who is not a distant Deist God that has an abstract foreknowledge of our actions and thoughts, but as a wise creator intimate with his own creation
- 3. To show on Judgment day, God's judgments are not from a distant power, but a heavenly creator who first hand at the moment of your sin or your victory understood with you why you did what you did. The judgment of God is not according to foreknowledge but according to his inward searching/his evaluation, judging and discerning mind/Spirit. He will literally say "I was there when you did or said".

Instead, of learning the Fear of the Lord who searches

Jeremiah 17:10 – "l the Lord SEARCH the heart, I try the reins, even to give every man according to his ways, and according to the fruit of his doings.―

We seem to miss the intent of God's searching, is it because he doesnt know us? What blasphemy against God, I loath i t.

It is because in telling us he inwardly searches us, we will have no excuses at the bar of God, our reasoning will be unde rstood word for word...and God does this to show our rewards or our reproach is fully evidenced. We should learn to fear the Lord from these texts, instead as evidenced in failed interpretations, these falsehoods lead us to advance human po wer over God, they lead us away from the fear of the Lord toward a god that is limited, learning, incomplete, imperfect, a nd incapable. We are to glory in God in our salvation, meaning, what is important is Christ in me, and I in Christ, I am nothin g of myself but Christ is all so, as I seek to glory and honor God, it's not about what human will can chose or not chose, i ts about who God chose and what he does with those he did chose.

My brother, you are saved and I am saved not because we chose but because God had a choice about us and he deter mined to bring salvation to us...and thereby glorify himself in our salvation. Hey Marvin-

I have been involved in discussions about Calvinism/Arminianism/Whateverism on this and other forums where individua I scriptures were debated ad nauseum. I have a chart that lists all the relevant scriptures and what they mean to each c amp. But the debate rages on. Just like the eschatology debate rages on. Why? Because scriptures are not clear 100 %.

So it boils down to a matter of philosophy and how we read scripture. Take this one for example:

[&]quot;About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them, 26 an d suddenly there was a great earthquake, so that the foundations of the prison were shaken. And immediately all the do ors were opened, and everyone's bonds were unfastened. 27 When the jailer woke and saw that the prison doors were open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself, supposing that the prisoners had escaped. 28 But Paul cried with a loud voice, â€∞Do not harm yourself, for we are all here.†29 And the jailer called for lights and rushed in, and trem bling with fear he fell down before Paul and Silas. 30 Then he brought them out and said, â€∞Sirs, what must I do to be saved?†31 And they said, â€∞Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved, you and your household.†32 And t hey spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all who were in his house. 33 And he took them the same hour of the night and washed their wounds; and he was baptized at once, he and all his family. 34 Then he brought them up into his house and set food before them. And he rejoiced along with his entire household that he had believed in God."

We can take the passage at face value, or we can twist it like this:

When Paul admonished the Philippian jailer to believe in the Lord Jesus Christ and he would be saved along with his ho usehold, Paul did not know if the jailer was predestined to be saved or not, and so had to have been thinking to himself, "Gee, I hope this guy is one of the lucky predestined ones and that God is just about to grant His irresistible grace upon him, because what I've just told him to do is absolutely and utterly impossible for him to do. I may have actually deceived him--giving him a false hope-- if he's not predestined for salvation. I also dearly hope that all the members of his househ old are also predestined for salvation and that God is about to grant His irresistible grace on them as well, otherwise I m ay have deceived this jailer about them also. Maybe I should have rather just told him the truth about his total depravity and God's irresistible grace."

How could any consistent and thoughtful Calvinist tell people that they will be saved if they believe in the Lord Jesus wit hout having such thoughts go through his mind?

The NT is replete with admonitions for men to repent. On Mars Hill Paul said that God was "commanding all people eve rywhere to repent." If God predestined in advance who would go to hell and who would go to heaven (Calvin clearly tau ght this) then the commands in scripture for all men to repent is non-sensical, for only the "elect" predestined favorites of God would ever repent-- a self-fulfilling prophecy.

The idea that God created a hell of eternal torment into which he will cast those humans he created solely for that eterna I end, for His glory, is repellant. You do not think it is, because you say God can do what He wants. He can indeed- the question on the table is what He in fact does. And, my friend, He does not do that. I am not here even questioning the i dea of eternal torment. I will grant that it is true for the sake of this discussion. But the idea that God unilaterally picks a nd chooses who goes there based on His whim is the repellant part.

Abraham asked the rhetorical question "Shall not the Judge of all the earth do right?" The answer is a resounding "Yes!"

So, the Act's text. That's a great example to start.

We will take the Act's text as scripture relate it, not the twisted/your version.

When Paul preached the gospel to the lost was it how you characterized it...in terms of "who knows who's the elect, so I don't know whether to offer the gospel or to think I am deceiving them with false hope?"

I know of NO reformed preacher that offers the gospel in such an ignorant and unfaithful fashion. Who knows, there's al ways somebody on the extreme, but Im not that guy.

I have elaborated numerous times in various postings how I offer the gospel, it contains none of the silliness of the twiste d version you've portrayed.

- 1. I do not offer the gospel based on 'who I know to be elect or non-elect' no gospel preacher does this, reformed or not. This therefore excludes this characterization as false.
- 2. I do not offer in-house theological terms to sinners, I offer them the law as Jesus did, "thou shalt not steal, thou shalt n ot lie etc." So, based upon their own confession of inward guilt, they understand they have sinned against both God and man...and most will openly admit this.
- 3. While it is true man does not have the power to believe, repent or truly understand his guilt before God, God's Spirit a noints the preaching of that word and does the invisible work of conviction to convince him of his sin and his own culpability. Thereby God works upon men that they might believe.
- 4. I offer good news to men who understand they are of themselves guilty...that's bad news, but unless they understand their need my offer of provision for that need is non-sensical. I offer a sin forgiving and merciful loving God, who is callin g men to repent and believe.

So, tell me again, where I leave out repentance based upon God's foreknowledge? I don't, I do NOT preach God's forek nowledge, I preach the revealed word of God as is found in scripture, all reformed do this, so do the arminians. The only time foreknowledge is good to be included is when you tell the sinner "God knows you've sinned from the beginning, bot h you and him know in detail what commandments you've broken"

But to tell the sinner, God has elected or not-elected them is not a gospel message and has never been a gospel message in any reformed preacher live read (and live read many) Why? Because God does not predicate our gospel message based upon the preacher/church/witness/evangelist knowing the secret mind of God...or has access to the lambs book of life to read who's name is written therein.

We preach based upon the command to go into all the world and preach the gospel. That's it. Its an act of obedience to declare the good news to every person.

If some are not saved and I have offered the gospel, I have been obedient, not as you say in some twisted version. Both Arminian and Reformed do this without impunity.

Here is what I have been searching the scriptures and paying special attention to - "prepositionsâ€. Yes, the actual grammar the apostles used. This is where "sovereignty†becomes practical for me. The Holy Spirit used "cho sen vessels†who "chose†specific grammar to express their grace given understanding.

For example, much is built upon the idea that faith is â€cofâ God. The idea being that God is the source of the faith t hat is operating in man. Those who stress this, lay heavy emphasis that man is incapable of independent action and the â€cegenitive of originâ is the scriptural basis for their position.

The reason I was compelled to learn Greek is because I want to know the exact word and letter the apostles used. How else can an interpretation of a passage be tested.?! I was privileged to have an old batchelor bee keeper winter with me several years. He was self taught in Koine Greek and he often lovingly showed me how my expression was wrong by

comparing my expression to the exact grammar of the relevant passage. This introduced me into the way to test my ow n preformed thoughts and assumptions against the God guided sovereignly chosen grammar of the actual texts.

In the current discussion I have discovered that the vast majority of "prepositions†used in connection to faith are n ot in the genitive. For example "faith towards Godâ€, "faith unto Godâ€, and "faith upon God†are vastly superior in quantity than the rare "faith of God.â€

The implication for this is profound, for those who make much of faith being â€ceof God†build a doctrinal understanding upon this foundation. How can such a foundation be tested? One way is to search for the prevalent way faith is expressed in the New Testament. Without any dispute, faith is expressed not as a â€cepassive†experience originating â €ceof†God, but an â€ceactive indicative†by an individual â€cetowards†or â€ceunto†God.

Greetings!

I offer this counsel to you. The Word and prayer is enough for the Spirit to enlighten you to His Truth. All else are merely helps, yet nonetheless they may help or they may hinder.

Here's George Mueller's testimony, how he went about his search for the deep truths of God;

Before this period I had been much opposed to the doctrines of election, particular redemption, and final persevering grace; so much so that, a few days after my arrival at Teignmouth I called election a devilish doctrine. I did not believe that I had brought myself to the Lord, for that was too manifestly false; but yet I held, that I might have resisted finally.

And further, I knew nothing about the choice of God's people, and did not believe that the child of God, when once made so, was safe for ever. In my fleshly mind I had repeatedly said, "If once I could prove that I am a child of God for ever, I

might go back into the world for a year or two, and then return to the Lord, and at last be saved."

But now I was brought to examine these precious truths by the word of God. Being made willing to have no glory of my o wn in the conversion of sinners, but to consider myself merely as an instrument; and being made willing to receive what t he Scriptures said; I went to the Lord, reading the New Testament from the beginning, with a particular reference to these truths. To my great astonishment I found that the passages which speak decidedly for election and persevering grace were about four times as many as those which speak apparently against these truths; and even those few, shortly after, when I had examined and understood them, served to confirm me in the above doctrines.

As to the effect which my belief in these doctrines had on me, I am constrained to state, for God's glory, that though I am still exceedingly weak, and by no means so dead to the lusts of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, a s I might and as I ought to be, yet, by the grace of God, I have walked more closely with Him since that period.

My life has not been so variable, and I may say that I have lived much more for God than before. And for this have I been strengthened by the Lord, in a great measure, through the instrumentality of these truths. For in the time of temptation, I have been repeatedly led to say:

"Should I thus sin? I should only bring misery into my soul for a time, and dishonour God; for, being a son of God for eve r, I should have to be brought back again, though it might be in the way of severe chastisement."

Thus, I say, the electing love of God in Christ (when I have been able to realize it) has often been the means of producin g holiness, instead of leading me into sin. It is only the notional apprehension of such truths, the want of having them in the heart, whilst they are in the head, which is dangerous.
