Each person must be careful how he builds. (1 Corinthians 3:10 GW)

In other words, that which is of supreme importance is not Christian doctrine, mentally appraised and apprehended, but a living and clear spiritual apprehension of Christ. That is the work. What are you building? Are you, through a living, cle ar, inward, experimental relationship with the Lord Jesus, building a structure which comes out of that inward spiritual kn owledge? Is it by that you are growing? Or are you growing by things said and mentally judged, appraised, dissected, ac cepted, and assented to? What is the nature of the building? The work in which we are engaged, to which this phrase †ceeach man's workâ⊕ applies, is the building of Christ livingly into the very substance of our being, into the very fab ric of our lives. It is not a question of getting to know a great deal about Christianity. Let us note that. The heart of the wh ole matter is the difference between the philosophy of Christianity, of Christian doctrine and the spiritual knowledge of C hrist.

The Lord would teach us †and this is the lesson that my heart is bent upon learning, and that I would urge upon you to make your quest also †that the ground of assurance is not in our having decided for Christ, nor that we persist in the Christian life, nor that we feel strong, nor that we have certain ability as Christians and are able to do this or that. It is not the measure of our activity in the work of the Lord, nor any one of these things which constitutes our Christian life. The ese are simply the outworkings. The thing which constitutes us is that Christ is the foundation, and that we are inseparably linked with Him by faith. Everything else can be suspended as a secondary consideration until that is settled. It is as though God, if we may put it this way to try to simplify the truth, had given us His Son and had said to us: "In Him you have everything, and the first thing is not what you are, what you can do, or anything to do with you; it is what He is!" If only in the face of all you may see of a multitude of contradictions in your own life in weaknesses, and imperfections, and lack of attainment, you will persistently believe in Him as having it in Himself to bring you through to the end, you will go through in spite of all. We begin to take stock of ourselves, measure ourselves up, and say: "I am not this, and I am not that, and I am not something else; or else, I am this, and I am that, and all this goes against me." Nothing of all this is to the point at all. The totality of every divine requirement in us is in Christ.

By the grace God has given me, I laid a foundation as a wise builder, and someone else is building on it. But each one s hould build with care. For no one can lay any foundation other than the one already laid, which is Jesus Christ. If anyon e builds on this foundation using gold, silver, costly stones, wood, hay or straw, their work will be shown for what it is, b ecause the Day will bring it to light. It will be revealed with fire, and the fire will test the quality of each person's work. If what has been built survives, the builder will receive a reward. If it is burned up, the builder will suffer loss but yet will be savedâ€'even though only as one escaping through the flames. (1 Corinthians 3:10-15).

"God may allow a life-work to stand momentarily, but He will not allow anything to remain on THE FOUNDATION which is not proper building material. I can almost hear Him saying to some of those who are now building. "You may spend your whole life on that, but it will all go up in smoke. It is not suitable building material; it is not something of Christ which I have wrought by the Spirit into lives."

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What is the wood, hay, and stubble which God will not allow as building material? One may look at pastors who have spent years in gathering people in their congregation. To the visible eye it looks like something has been done. Yet God se es the human energies of men without the help of the Spirit and announces: "This is just a pile of boards. I cannot accept them unless they are over-laid with gold. And this over-laying is not of man, but a work of the Spirit." God is forced to a nnounce: "Have I not told you I cannot have this on my Foundation for it is something wrought of man. It is too earthy. I must have gold which I have wrought through pressure, through fire, through purifying."

Again, we have seen man build knowledge, doctrine, theology into people. Yet in the hour of real pressure all this which has not been translated into reality will not hold them. It is like hay and stubble they have been feeding upon, and this can never nourish the inner man nor become building material for God."

Austin himself make no bones about declaring what he believes to be a central truth to living out the Christian wa lk, and this in his assertions and the proposition that the indwelling Christ is sufficient for us. Yet, think for a moment...this itself is a proposition a piece of theology and to our danger we should never reject it.

Over the millennia we need sound theology...those terrible academics, those apologists and those bad bad theologians to keep the Church within the structure of biblical living.

Not everyone is the spiritual giant Austin Sparks is, nor do they have his knowledge to say "there's more to theology" or his experience to say "theres more than our own self-judgment".

In all of this wonderful counsel from Austin Sparks...let us not throw out the baby with the bath water as if the baby is cle ansed by sitting in a dry tub...

The Church faces more than just bare knuckled persecution, it faces liars, false teachers and false prophets too, and the y destroy just like persecutors.

I seek to encourage us all to recognize God's Church needs its academics just like it needs its best intercessors and spir itual guides.
